

Five Stand-Pat Demos On House Rules Group

WASHINGTON (AP)—Five Democrats regarded as likely to go along most of the time with the wishes of party leaders in the House were nominated Thursday to serve on the legislative-guiding Rules Committee.

The recommendations by the Democratic Committee on Committees are subject to approval by the House—a formality since the Democrats are in the majority.

During the Roosevelt and Truman administrations, a coalition

of Southern Democrats and Republicans on the House Rules Committee sometimes bottled up bills which the leadership backed.

Except in unusual circumstances, all bills cleared by the legislative committee must go through the rules group, which determines when they shall be debated and, to some extent, under what procedures.

These and other Democratic committee assignments were made by the party's Committee on Committees, comprised of Democratic members of the House Ways and Means Committee.

The new members tapped for service on the Rules Committee are Delaney of New York, Trimble of Arkansas, Thornberry of Texas, Bolling of Missouri and O'Neill of Massachusetts.

They will serve with the three Democratic holdovers—Howard W. Smith of Virginia, chairman; Colmer of Mississippi and Madden of Indiana—and with four Republican holdovers—Leo Allen of Illinois, Clarence Brown of Ohio, Ellsworth of Oregon and Latham of New York.

There were no surprises in the committee assignments, freshmen members taking what the veterans did not bid for.

4 Builders Pay For 'Windfalls'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Housing officials have reported tentative settlement to recover more than one million dollars from four builders who allegedly piled up "windfall profits" in government-insured housing projects.

The agreements, reported to the House Appropriations Committee last Monday, apparently marked the first success in a drive to get back possibly many millions of dollars.

The committee Thursday disclosed the settlement reports which gave no hint as to identity of the four builders or where the profits are located.

Sen. Capehart (R-Ind.) has estimated that builders made 500 million to one billion dollars of excessive profits by getting government insured mortgages for amounts larger than the cost of rental housing projects and pocketing the difference.

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Probe Congress Of Civil Rights

WASHINGTON (AP)—A convicted former Washington state Communist told a Subversive Activities Control Board hearing Thursday of attending two Communist Party meetings at which the Civil Rights Congress and its activities were discussed.

The witness, Mrs. Barbara Hartle, said also that a picket line sponsored by the Civil Rights Congress in October 1948 to picket Al Canwell, then chairman of the Washington Legislature's House Un-American Activities Committee, had been organized by the Communist Party.

"The Civil Rights Congress sponsored the picket line. The Communist Party organized it," she told board member David J. Coddaira.

Mrs. Hartle was brought here from the women's reformatory at Alderson, W. Va., where she is serving a sentence as the result of her conviction at Seattle in 1953 of conspiracy to teach and advocate violent overthrow of the government.

Any taxpayer who has retirement income of less than \$1,200 (shown on line 1, Schedule K) should complete Schedule K as follows:

(1) Although line 2 of the schedule states "Enter here amount shown in line 1 or \$1,200 whichever is lesser," the taxpayer should enter \$1,200 in line 2 in all cases.

(2) Although line 5 states "Balance (line 2 minus line 4)," the taxpayer should enter such balance or the amount shown in line 1, whichever is the lesser.

Directors of Internal Revenue have been advised to assist taxpayers in making the correct computation of the retirement income credits. Instructions have also been issued to correct those returns that are found to have been filed in error.

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Correction in Income Tax Return Cited

A more liberal interpretation of the retirement income credit provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 than is reflected in the individual income tax return now being distributed was announced today by Commissioner of Internal Revenue T. Coleman Andrews.

Accordingly, Schedule K of Form 1040, the Individual Income Tax Return for 1954, will not produce the correct retirement income credit for certain taxpayers.

Individuals affected are those with actual retirement income of less than \$1,200, who also receive excluded annuity or pension income and, in the case of individuals less than 75 years of age, compensation for personal services in excess of \$900.

It is estimated that the change will benefit approximately 100,000 taxpayers currently filing their income tax returns for 1954 by increasing their retirement income credit.

At the dinner meeting to be held at the Marion hotel at 8:30 Senator John C. F. Merrifield will speak on "The Function of State Government in Occupational Licensing."

On the program Friday is a film at 9 a.m., a forum discussion at 9:30 with Senator Lee Ohmart and a visit to the legislative session at 10 o'clock.

In the afternoon the nurses will hear a talk by Representative Jean Lewis on "Legislators View of the Community Responsibility of the Nurse Citizen. The workshop will conclude with a discussion of "Strengths and Weaknesses of Oregon Nurse Practice Acts."
