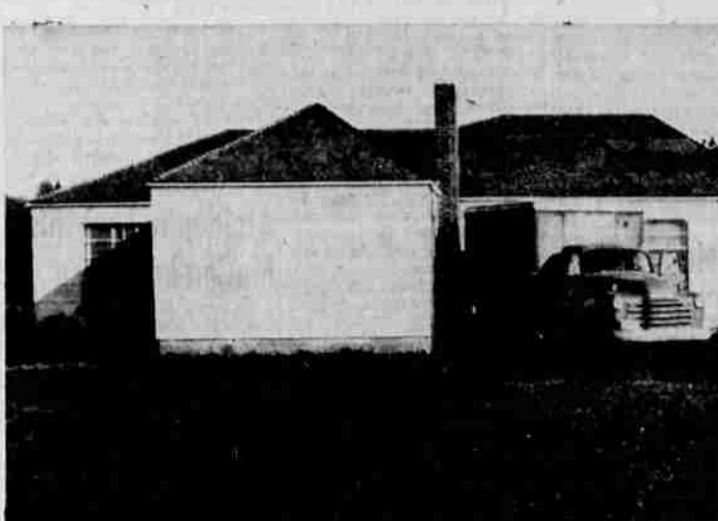

\$250,000 Fire In Milwaukee

MILWAUKEE (U) — A seven alarm fire—one of the worst in Milwaukee's history—raged out of control for 3 1/2 hours Monday morning before being conquered by more than 200 firemen laboring in sub-freezing temperatures and against wind gusts ranging up to 30 miles an hour.

The fire, of undetermined origin, broke out in a furniture store in the business section of a north side residential area, and the store owner estimated his loss at \$250,000. No one was killed. Two firemen were hurt. One was overcome by smoke. The other suffered a hand wound.
