55 Patients At TB Given Beauty Work

Fifty-five patients at Oregon Tuberculosis Hospital received free services Sunday from Salem beauticians, and sometime this week Salem high school girls will hear talks on cosmetology as a career.

It is part of the Salem observance of National Beauty Salon Week, extending through next Saturday, which was officially proclaimed in Oregon by Governor Paul Patterson.

At the tuberculosis hospital 49 of the patients were given permanent and hair sets and six chose haircuts. Fifteen Salem operators went to the hospital to do the work. On the institutional welfare committee were Virginia Kellogg, chairman, Erich Laetsch and Vern Eggers. Institutional welfare is part of the organization program and is done in all cities where public institutions are located. All the solutions used at the hospital were donated by the jobbers.

It is estimated that more than a quarter of a million free beauty treatments will be given to patients and inmates of various welfare institutions during the special program, and thousands of members of the National Hairdressers and Cosmetologists Association donate their services.

National Beauty Salon Week is dedicated "to more beautiful women."

In Salem the speaker to the high school girls is Miss Sandra Bodeen, chairman for all local activities is Mrs. Lee Sutter.

Report Adverse on Bill For UF Pay Deductions

A bill to authorize state payroll deductions for United Fund contributors will go to the senate floor with a "do not pass" recommendation.

The senate committee on state and federal affairs voted down a motion of Senator Pat Lonergan that the bill be approved with Senator Mark Hatfield, chairman of the committee and Lonergan the only senators voting for the motion.

Senator Robert Holmes, of Clatsop county, who opposed the bill, said his opposition was not to be considered any reflection on the United Fund.

"As a matter of fact I am

chairman of the United Fund in my county," he said. "But I feel that if we open the state books to this worthy organization, in succeeding legislatures, other worthy organizations will seek the same privileges."

Senator Stewart Hardie said that he did not feel justified in voting to send the bill to the senate floor with a "do pass" recommendation but would vote for sending it without recommendation. Sen. Lonergan then made a motion to pass the bill out with an adverse report, and the committee unanimously voted for the motion.

Sen. Lee Ohmart, author of the bill, appeared before the committee and urged its approval.

A new milk bill, regulating prices at producer level, is being prepared for introduction in the house food and dairying committee consideration.

Rep. Elmer Deetz of Canby and Rep. Joe Rogers of Independence said intention of the bill is to place a floor on the milk prices in the event distributors launch a milk war. The fear is that in such a case the farmer would bear the brunt of the fight, the two representatives said.

In the proposed bill, the minimum price would be based on the average paid farmers in the three neighboring states rather than on the cost of production which the sponsors contend varies from farm to farm.

The bill would provide that each distributor set up a pool for its producer. Negotiations would be made for an annual contract on a base quota for fluid milk.

"This would assure a producer a minimum amount he could ship each day," Deetz said. At the end of the year new quotas would be set up based on production during the four lowest shipping months.

Retail prices would not be controlled under the proposed bill, Deetz said.

Senate Honors Robin Maaske

The Oregon Senate, upon motion of Walter Lett of Polk County, stood and observed a moment of silence Monday morning in tribute to Robin J. Maaske, president of Oregon College of Education, who died at his desk Saturday night.

Leth said in speaking of Maaske, "Perhaps the time and place of his death are indicative of the long hours he devoted to state service."

Funeral services for Maaske will be held Tuesday at 2 o'clock, at Monmouth in Campbell hall on the college campus.

Accidental Shot Hits MaComber in Leg

An accidental gunshot wound caused the hospitalization Sunday of a Salem youth with a flesh wound of the right leg.

Harold Wayne MaComber, 855 North 18th street, was released from Salem General Hospital Sunday evening to his home.

The 16-year-old youth was targeted shooting with two friends along Mill Creek east of Salem when the accident occurred, state police said. The bullet came from a .22 caliber rifle held by Don Thurman McLain, 14, 3340 Monroe avenue. McLain and the third youth, James Miller, 15, 2175 North Liberty street, helped MaComber to the highway nearby. State Patrolman Arthur Jinks was flagged down as he drove by. He took them to the hospital.

The youths told Jinks that McLain had the gun cradled in his arm, pointed downward at an angle. The sun apparently had a very sensitive trigger, Jinks said, and it went off when shaken or jarred, hitting MaComber in the leg just above the ankle. The shot went through the fleshy part of the leg, chipping the bone, hospital authorities said.

The incident happened about 10:30 a.m. along Mill Creek near the Salem by-pass, police said.
