Freshman Winners of Annual Feast of Song

It was the 47th annual Freshman Glee, and the Freshmen won it.

They haven't done it very often in the history of the Willamette University classic, but they did it handily Saturday night with a top composition and 345 points accorded them by the judges.

"Jason Daddy" was the title of the freshman song, with a Willamette historical theme. The sophomores took second place with 320 points and the seniors third with 319. And the juniors are paying off all day Monday with stunts rather humiliating to the third year class and some dunkings in the Mill stream. Pointwise they made only 286 in the opinion of the judges. Two years in a row now the juniors have got this dubious distinction.

Music for the freshman song was written by Dave Louthan and words by Louthan, Carolyn Reynolds and Connie Clark. The class formation on the stage was an ex-cort that actually rocked. Basis for judgment was originality of words, music and presentation, including marching formation, diction and sound effect.

Title of the sophomore song was "Facin' Jason," with formation showing the eyes of Jason Lee. "Live and Learn" was the senior song which got them a placement only a point behind the sophs. The formation was a question mark superimposed on a red heart.

The losing juniors made their bid with a song called "Dear Folks," and the formation was a big envelope. The song appealed to parents about the multiple problems of a college student's life. As usual a packed house greeted the contesting classes. After the music had been heard and the judges were at work the crowd was entertained with a variety show, including impersonations by Don Stoffer and Bill Nelson, a trumpet trio and girls' sextette offering a former Glee winning song, and a comedy pantomime by Willie Thompson and Bob Payne.

The Freshman Glee banner was presented by Dr. Daniel H. Schulze. This was the dramatic moment, preceded by the usual studied jockeying just to keep 'em all guessing. But when the announcement of the winners was finally made the freshmen broke for the stage to claim the banner and pandemonium ruled.

The Glee manager was Mac Baker and he was assisted by Bill Walsh. Ten former Glee managers were present and were introduced.

\$150 Million Pay Hike For Postal Workers Up

WASHINGTON (AP)—A 150-million-dollar pay raise for postal workers headed toward a House vote today.

In advance of House action, President Eisenhower said he would view with "gravest apprehension" any further additions to

the 7½ per cent average increase provided by the postal pay bill.

He noted that the postal increase will set the pattern for 1,300,000 civil service employees. This bill is still in committee.

The President's views, contained in a letter Saturday to Chairman Murray (D-Tenn.) of the House Post Office Committee, clearly implied a probable veto of any bigger increase.

They also underscored a statement last week by Chairman Philip Young of the Civil Service Commission that the government cannot afford more. It already faces the need of financing government-wide employee benefits totaling more than a billion dollars a year, he said. These are raises and other benefits proposed and pending.

The House pay bill called for a minimum 6 per cent and an average 7½ per cent raise. It also reclassified pay schedules, with higher new pay grades for some 300,000 carriers, clerks and mail truck drivers.

The administration had proposed a 5 per cent minimum and 6½ per cent average pay hike.

But as the bill came before the House, strong opposition developed among members favoring additional things a 10 per cent figure approved by the Senate Post Office Committee.

The Senate, in recess today, will consider its own proposal later in the week.

The House bill was called up by Speaker Rayburn of Texas on a take-it-or-leave-it basis, with all amendments barred.

Rep. Moss (D-Calif.) leader of the bigger increase forces, said before the House acted that he was "quite confident" it would vote for the right to offer amendments.

Chiros Session Ended Sunday

A tri-district convention of the Oregon Association of Chiropractors concluded with a series of board meetings Sunday. The convention began Saturday noon and about 100 attended.

In one of the more interesting sessions of the meeting laboratory rats were dissected under direction of Robert Pfeiffer, Western States Chiropractic College student from Portland, in a study of vitamin deficiency. Dr. Linden Launer, head of the physiology department at the college, lectured on the subject. The president of the college, Dr. Ralph Feiler, was among convention speakers.

Dr. Mel Higgins of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, president of the board of trustees of Western States College, spoke on the part physiotherapy has had in the chiropractic profession, and he stressed the strides made in its development.

Dr. Forrest Goddard of Salem outlines clinical procedures and office practices. A banquet concluded Saturday's meetings.

Dr. John Ahlbin of Salem was general chairman of the convention.

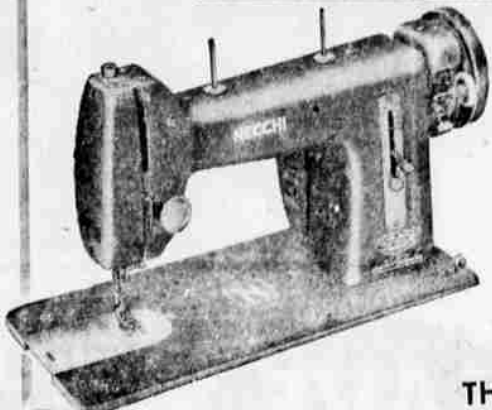
