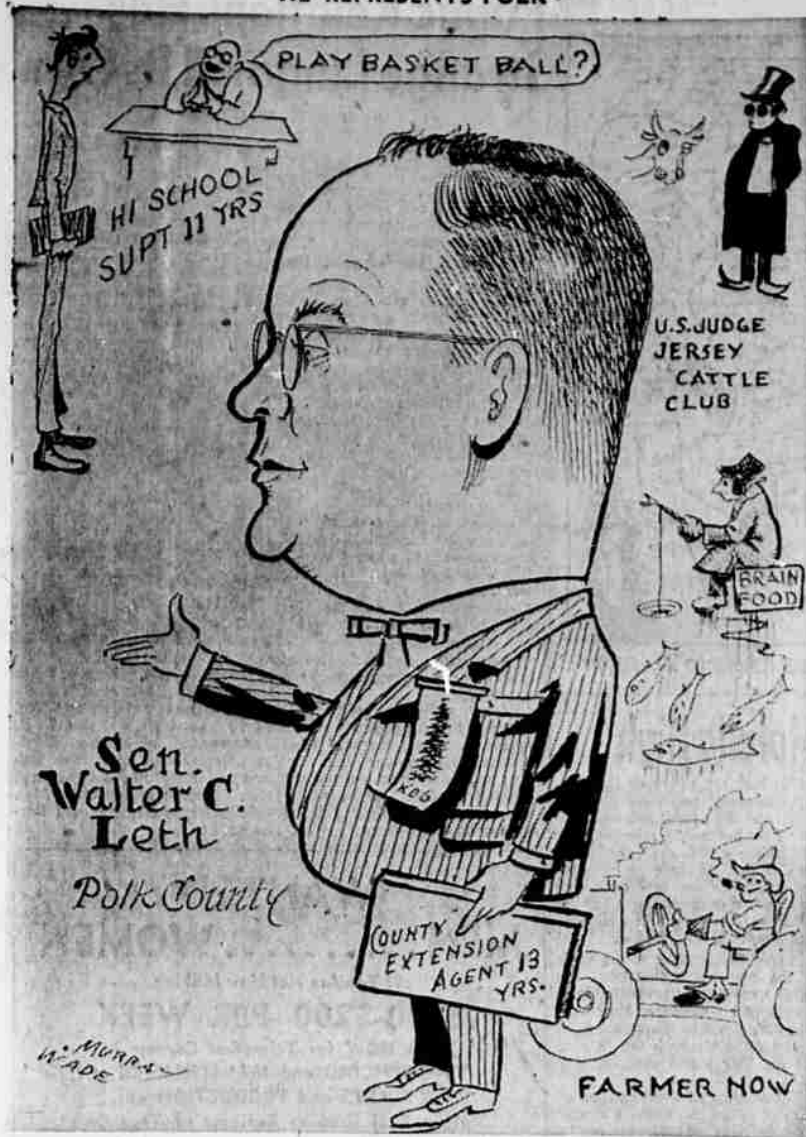




Spring Fish Runs Tabulated at Falls

Annual tabulation of Willamette river spring fish runs was started at the Oregon City falls last week by the Oregon fish commission.

No chinook salmon were logged over the falls last week, however 45 steelhead were accounted for according to Earl F. Pulford, fish commission biologist in charge of Willamette counts. High water has forced a temporary halt in the count, but operations should resume late this week.

Pulford said the Willamette count normally starts in mid-April. The 1955 count was started a month earlier to obtain more complete information on spring steelhead migration in conjunction with an overall Columbia river steelhead study being conducted by the fish commission.

Some Teen-Agers Oppose Reducing Voting Age to 18

All teen-agers don't think the voting age should be reduced from 21 years to 18.

They divided sharply on the question Saturday at a Senate Resolutions Committee hearing on a proposed constitutional amendment for voting at 18.

After Sen. Mark Hatfield, Salem, sponsor of the bill, argued that there is no logical reason for a 21-year limit, the young people started their argument.

Barbara Mahoney, 16, Hermiston High School junior, brought up the issue of taxation without representation. To prove her point, she said that many 18-year-olds are paying income and property taxes.

But Dave Barrows, 19, Berkeley, Calif., a sophomore at Willamette University, declared that the 18-year-olds shouldn't vote unless they also are assigned other rights and duties, such as signing contracts and serving on juries. He said they also should be made liable under the law for actions.

Kent Hotelling, 19, Eugene, a sophomore at Willamette, opposed the bill, too. He questioned whether people had enough sense to vote intelligently at the age of 21.

A statement that teen-agers don't

have sound judgment was made by Gordon MacPherson, 18, senior at Willamette High School.

The measure would amend the Constitution. If the Legislature passed it, the people would vote on it at the general election in 1956.

Sen. Hatfield said a poll of Oregon high school students showed that 61 per cent of 5,000 boys and girls favor it. Of 610 of their teachers, 53 per cent were for it.

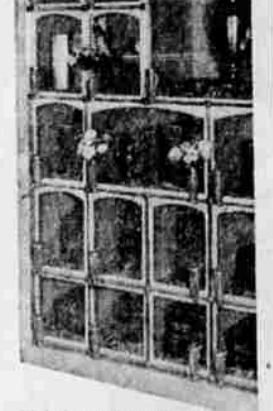

Republic of Lebanon Host to American Mayors

BEIRUT, Lebanon — The mayor of Lebanon, Ore., and his wife were watching the last television show at night in their home when the phone rang.

"The Republic of Lebanon," said a caller from nearby Salem, "has invited you there as a guest of the government. Are you going?" "I don't know where it is, but I'd like to go," answered Mayor Ralph Scroggin. And that was the beginning of a fantastic adventure that took him and his wife 9,000 miles from home to a land of palm trees, oriental dancers and biblical antiquities.

Scroggin was invited because he happened to be mayor of a town named Lebanon. The same invitation went to 23 other mayors of Lebanons in the United States as a feature of a special "year of tourism" being promoted by the Arab Republic of Lebanon at the eastern end of the Mediterranean.

Seven mayors accepted. All had their first inkling of the story from an Associated Press cable, which arrived two weeks ahead of air-mail invitations. The mayors or their delegated representatives came from Lebanons in New Hampshire, Oregon, Nebraska, Indiana, Tennessee, Ohio and Missouri.

The mayors were given a dazzling reception by the Lebanese government. President Camille Chamoun, Prime Minister Sami Solh, the mayors of most Lebanese cities and scores of other dignitaries received them. On many occasions,

guards of honor welcomed them. The small-town mayors far from home learned here the world is not as big as it looks. On a visit to the U. S. aircraft carrier Lake Champlain in Beirut Harbor, commanding officer Capt. F. A. Hannegan told mayors he had a little surprise for them. The little surprise was seven men from the U. S. Sixth Fleet who also called Lebanon, U. S. A., home. Several were old friends of the mayors.

Two of the visiting mayors were of Lebanese origin—Dr. Frank M. Baddour of Tennessee, and George Fawaz of New Hampshire. Fawaz left Lebanon at the age of 17 and still speaks Arabic fluently. Baddour had a tougher problem. He hadn't seen Lebanon since he was 4.

"Nobody who speaks English understands my Southern accent," he complained, "and no Arab can understand Tennessee Arabic."

Each mayor was given a small cedar from the ancient cedar groves of Lebanon to plant in the city square of his town.

Dr. R. W. Froehlich of Lebanon, Mo., is temporarily heading a new organization formed by the travelers—the "Mayors of Lebanon, U. S. A. Assn." Charles Harris of Lebanon, Neb., has offered his city of 250 population as the logical central meeting point for the first convention.

Valley Pack Changes Name

Valley Packing Company, which has operated in Salem for 33 years, has changed its name to Cascade Meats, Inc.

The announcement was made Saturday by G. F. Chamber, president, who said there would be no change in ownership, officers or business.

To identify the company with its advertised brand name, "Cascade" is the main reason for the change in name, Chambers said.

Organizers of the company in 1919 were F. W. and W. H. Steusloff of Steusloff Bros. meat market, Curtis B. Cross of the Cross meat market, and the Ladd & Bush Bank. The plant was set up at the north edge of the city on a street that has since come to be known as Valpak Road. Purpose of the organization was a modern meat packing plant for the mid-Willamette Valley that would offer a market for livestock produced in this region.

It has fulfilled its purpose and expanded. It gives a steady market for cattle, sheep and hogs, and has to buy heavily in hogs from the mid-west because Oregon swine production does not meet the demand. The firm's gross last year was \$4,000,000, its payroll \$400,000, and animals killed totaled about 44,000.

The company markets both fresh and cured meats, all processed under federal inspection. Mainly its area of distribution is western Oregon and southern Washington. It uses three trade

2 New Ways to Use American Farm Products

WASHINGTON — Government scientists, searching for new ways to use American farm products, have come up with such innovations as two-way stretch bandages and dehydrated potatoes that—surprise—taste just like potatoes.

Some of the results of applied research in food and fiber were reported to the House Appropriations Committee in Agriculture Department testimony made public Saturday.

Take the bandage with the two-way stretch. You just wrap it around your finger and it sticks without any tying or taping. First developed for the Army, this new cotton bandage is about to come into commercial use.

The government's scientists have stolen a march on the Egyptians by developing a new type of cotton they say is the equal of high priced imported Egyptian cotton. It's being grown now in the Far West.

Now about potatoes. Seems no one thought to dehydrate them by leaving a little space between the drying drums. Scientists reported that by adding a little milk or water, the dehydrated product tastes "practically the same as freshly mashed potatoes."

way to can rice so it stays nice and flaky. They've also produced something called "waxy rice"—good for making cookies, gravy and custards.

For those who don't like rice, scientists have worked out a form of parboiled wheat to serve as rice substitute.

There's a lot of work being done to prevent bread from going stale. One of the most promising methods discovered thus far is quick freezing when the bread comes out of the oven. Bread will stay fresh up to two months that way, it was reported.

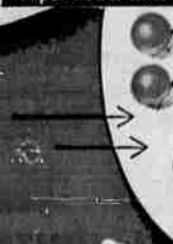
