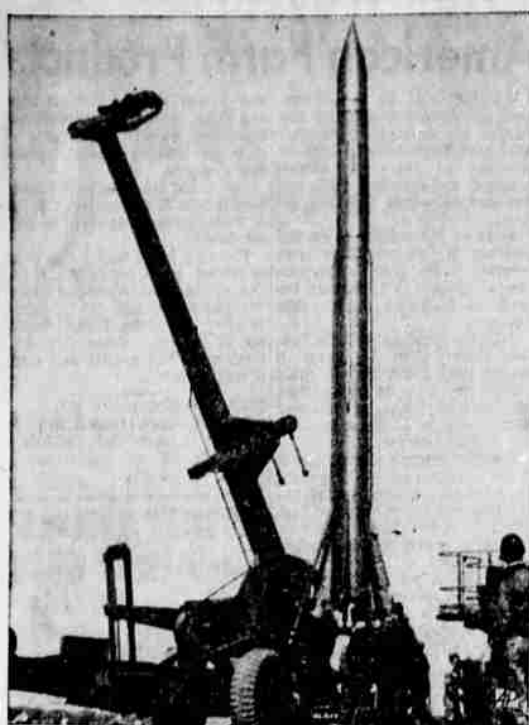


THE CORPORAL READIED FOR FIRING

Churches Deny Having Free Operation in Italy

ROME, (AP)—Evangelical churches, including the Church of Christ, denied Saturday they are permitted to function freely in Italy.

Speaking through their joint legal office, the churches replied to a statement issued Friday by the Italian Ministry of the Interior. This had declared that "any religion is authorized to operate in Italy without need of any particular recognition."

It added that "the Church of Christ, since the end of the war, has always operated freely in Italy." The statement was issued by Guido Bisori, undersecretary

in the Interior Ministry, which controls non-Roman Catholic denominations in Italy.

There were repercussions abroad. J.R. Chrisolm, minister of the Church of Christ, announced in Brownfield, Tex., he will go to Washington Tuesday to present to the State Department "documentation" of his church's situation in Italy.

The Interior Ministry's statement was hit by the legal office of the Federal Council of Evangelical Churches in Italy as having been made "for purely publicity reasons."

The council represents the Waldensian, Baptist and Methodist churches, the Evangelical Italian Missionary Assn. of La Spezia, the Christian Adventist churches and the Assemblies of God in Italy.

Bomb Wing to Leave for U.S.

TOKYO (UP)—The first elements of the battle-hardened 17th Bomb Wing, the first reserve air wing to fight in the Korean War, have left for the United States, the Air Force said today.

Eight B26 Night Intruders, escorted by two four-engine B29 Superforts, left Johnson Airbase near Tokyo Friday en route to Hurlburt Air Force Base, Fla.

The 17th is the former 452nd Bomb Wing, a reserve unit stationed in California. It was called to active duty shortly after the Korean War began and was moved to Japan in November, 1950.

The remainder of the wing's personnel will leave for the U.S. by surface transportation. The unit is commanded by Col. H. F. Bronson Jr., of Tacoma, Wash.

Fire Destroys Dallas Home

DALLAS — Fire of unknown origin destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Cordell, 606 E. Academy street, here early Sunday morning.

Fire Chief Walter Young said the blaze was discovered by a night patrolman at about 2 a.m. By the time the Dallas volunteer fire department arrived on the scene the blaze was not controllable.

Neither Mr. nor Mrs. Cordell was at home at the time of the fire which also destroyed all of the furnishings in the two-story frame house.

Price Support Program May Have to Take Licking

WASHINGTON (UP)—The administration's agriculture price support program is in trouble and may be headed for a licking in the Democratic 84th Congress.

The numerous individuals who hope to see a radical farm-labor party develop as a major factor in American politics are among those watching farm support developments with much interest.

A farmer-labor lobby of tactical A-bomb force is giving Congress the kind of a working over it seldom gets.

Outlook Good For Housing

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—The outlook for new housing in the Western states is good, activity is higher than a year ago and the year's new starts will exceed 1954 and probably 1953 in the opinion of directors of the Federal Home Loan Bank of San Francisco.

This forecast was given at a news conference Friday by directors from California, Nevada, Oregon, Montana, Utah, Washington and Wyoming, here to attend the annual meeting of stockholders.

Frank S. McWilliams of Spokane, chairman of the board, said there is no indication that housing activity will be overdone in the area in view of the continuing population gains and the steady increase in information of new families.

Kirk Reynolds of Portland agreed that housing activity is on the increase.

Mill Creek District Rejects Consolidation

SHERIDAN — Voters of the Mill Creek school district rejected consolidation with the Sheridan school district by a vote of 23 to 8 in an election last week. Sheridan school district voters approved the consolidation by a 45 to 1 vote.

Increased tax millage levy was reported to be the major reason for the rejection. Despite the total majority favoring consolidation, the two districts will not be consolidated because the Mill Creek district, whose residents circulated the petition, rejected the consolidation.

dom gets. The administration side is lobbying, too, but seems to lack the oomph of the farmer-labor operators. The present operation is an example of logrolling in high gear.

Flexible Plan Rejected

The House Agriculture Committee already has rejected the administration's program of flexible farm price supports. The committee bill will be a high 90 percent guaranteed subsidy. The deal is being put on congressmen from city constituencies. Here is how the National Farmer's Union puts the situation:

"Both the AFL and CIO are buttonholing 'city' congressmen to urge votes for 90 per cent of parity supports. Two main reasons for the strong labor fight for farm supports are:

"(1) Concern about falling employment in industries dependent upon farmers' buying power.

"(2) The hope of reciprocal support from farm district congressmen for increasing the minimum wage to \$1.25 an hour."

A Deadly Technique

That you vote for my bill and I'll vote for yours method is what is called logrolling or backscratching in the halls of Congress and it is a deadly technique when really powerful blocs are using it.

Some farm organizations are going along with the administration. But the left wings of the organized farm movement and of organized labor are marching hand in hand against the White House.

The mighty voice of President John L. Lewis of the United Mine Workers of America remains to be heard.

Some lobbyists favoring the administration's present flexible support program hope to talk of persuading Lewis to speak loudly for his organized consumers against higher farm price guarantees.

Budget Study At Molalla High

MOLALLA — Numerous requests came up for acceptance or rejection at the recent board meeting of Molalla union high school. Rev. Harold Mackey, representing Molalla Ministerial Association, asked for use of the auditorium for Easter Sunrise services. Permission was granted, providing no admission charge or offering was taken. Provisions were also made for the janitorial service.

Use of the auditorium for Molalla Area Gospel Crusade also was approved, with the same provisions. Use of the old gym was granted for Audubon Garden club annual flower show, set for June 4, under the same arrangements.

Expenses were allowed the FFA instructor to attend the state convention in Medford, March 15-19. The board voted to renew the \$1,000 burglary policy on the safe.

All contracted personnel were rehired and the annual increment allowed on the salary schedule. For the home ec rooms, permission was granted to trade in two sewing machines for new ones. Approval of a contract was given for students from Oregon City who are finishing their senior year.

A preliminary study of the needs of the budget was completed and dates were set for presentation to the budget committee March 29. The budget will be advertised April 7 and April 14; with the hearing set for May 9 and election, May 13.

The evening's business wound up with all members signing a sample diploma, the signatures to be transferred to the actual diplomas, thus eliminating the need of signing each diploma, as in the past.

NEW YORK (UP)—"I like the diagonal nod." (Maybe, think of myself as the captain of a ship.) The advertising executive said solemnly, and anyone up on his Madison Avenue lingo would know that he meant:

"If we lose this account, I'm sunk."

Such colorful metaphors, exchanged at lunch tables and sprinkled into inter-office memos, are fast becoming a professional trademark of the public relations man, press agent and ad exec.

I. Orrin Spellman, advertising manager for Holiday Magazine, has collected some of them and provided his own translations. Here are some samples:

"You will remember." (You have forgotten.)

"Giving him the picture." (A long, confused and inaccurate statement made to a newcomer.)

"He's in conference." (I don't know where he is.)

"Passed on to higher management." (Pigeonholed in more sumptuous offices.)

"Under consideration." (Never heard of it; or, the papers have been lost.)

"Under active consideration." (I'll try to find the papers.)

"Have you any remarks?" (Tell me what it's all about.)

"Can you drop down and put out a small brush fire?" (Help, help! Snowed under.) (Only able to take two hours for lunch.)

"The diagonal nod." (Maybe, think of myself as the captain of a ship.)

"Let's dumb it up." (Do it the client's way.)

"Put the saddle on the right horse." (Let's do it my way.)

"A growing body of opinion." (Two district managers agree.)

"Opinion widely held." (Two division managers agree.)

"Opinion is unanimous." (The president thinks this is the answer.)

"Let me fill you in on it." (Here's how to spell the name of the product.)

"We'd better up-date you on this matter." (I forgot to tell you, we've discontinued that line.)
