Probe Sabotage On Seattle Nike

SEATTLE — A team of investigators from the Portland office of the Army Engineers began checking Monday on vandalism done Friday night to a Nike guided-missile installation at Lake Youngs, southeast of Seattle.

A Cisco Construction Co. spokesman said several hundred dollars damage was done to electrical equipment. A subcontractor, the Schultz Electric Co., Pasco, is installing the equipment.

The site has been picketed since Oct. 23 when the AFL-District Council of Carpenters called a strike in a dispute over travel pay, welfare benefits and Saturday overtime. Work has continued despite the pickets.

The installation should be completed in about a month.

Steam Replaces Electric Power

SEATTLE — The "big three" aluminum companies and most of the Bonneville Power Administration's other industrial customers were using steam-generated electricity Monday to supplement their supplies from the federal agency.

A 35 per cent cutback in power sold by Bonneville on an interruptible basis became effective Monday. About 130,000 kilowatts of steam-generated power were being used to enable the aluminum reduction plants and other industries to continue normal operations. The Puget Sound Power & Light Co.'s Shuffleton plant at Renton is providing 30,000 kilowatts. Pacific Power & Light Co. plant at Portland and the Navy Yard plant at Bremerton are producing about 50,000 kilowatts.

Peiping Tactics Provocation

NEW YORK — Secretary of State Dulles said Monday the tactics of Chinese Communist leaders "may prove more dangerous and provocative of war than those of the Russian Soviets."

Dulles addressed the Advertising Club of New York. He said the "aggressive fanaticism of the Chinese Communist leaders" bears "a certain parallel to that of Hitler."

Declaring that Chinese Red leaders are "dizzy with success," Dulles distinguished between their methods and those of the Russians.

"The temperament of the Chinese Communists is different," he said, "and while in the long run the Soviet method may prove more formidable, yet in the short run, the Chinese Communist method may prove more dangerous and provocative of war."

Dulles said that while he drew a somber picture of the Chinese Communists, "it is no means a hopeless one," adding: "With national unity under the calm and strong leadership of President Eisenhower, I remain hopeful that peace will yet prevail."

Five-Day Sentences For 3 Accused Men

Five-day county jail sentences on petty larceny charges were levied Monday on three men currently serving similar sentences on vagrancy charges.

Byron W. Strout, Siletz, Archie Emil Foster, Beatty, and Wallace Foster, Klamath Falls, were given the sentences Monday in Marion county District court. The men stole some gasoline from a Salem truck firm last week and were arrested by city police when found sleeping in and under vehicles in the lot.

They are currently serving out five-day sentences for vagrancy in the Salem jail.

Store Moved Twice, Destroyed by Fire

DAISY, Wash. — A mercantile store, moved twice to avoid destruction by water and rock slides, was destroyed by fire Sunday with the loss estimated at \$30,000.

George Cranston, owner of the store in this Stevens County community overlooking Lake Roosevelt, first moved the store because of backwater from Grand Coulee Dam. He moved it again because of the threat of slides. The store and an attached warehouse were both wiped out. Firemen were hampered by a lack of water. The fire apparently started in the basement.
