

CAP Squadron Will Organize

The first of several flights to be organized in the surrounding area as part of the Salem Civil Air Patrol program, a squadron will meet Thursday night at the Silverton armory for its organizational meeting, squadron commander Wilber Garrett announced Wednesday.

Some 50 interested boys and girls of CAP Cadet age, along with many parents, are expected to be on hand for the organization of the first flight of the squadron outside the immediate Salem area, he said. The squadron presently consists of two flights.

A temporary Flight Leader and other officers of the group will be chosen at the Thursday meeting, Captain Garrett said, and a training program will be set up.

The first major project of the group will be to build a radio station and get it on the air as part of the state-wide CAP network for use in search and rescue work and as part of the Civil Defense setup. Parts for the radio will come from present squadron supplies, from the Portland Air Force Base and from individual members, he said.

Other flights will be formed in this area in the future as part of the squadron, Garrett said. The next towns scheduled for organizational meetings are Dallas and Woodburn.

The Silverton meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. at the armory. Youths interested in studying and participating in one or more of the various phases of aviation are invited to attend, he said.

Little Salem Girls Subject Of Hearing

Two little Salem girls born of an American mother are scheduled to be the subject of a deportation hearing in Portland Thursday.

Sarah Lucia Venegas, 8, a Salem first grader, and her sister, Maria Elena, 6, have been charged by the government with overstaying their visitor permits.

Their mother is now a Spanish major at Willamette university. She is Mrs. Sarah Venegas, 27, the former Sarah Carolina Morse, who was born in Salem and attended high school here.

She was married in Mexico at the age of 17. If she had not left this country until she was 21, the children would have retained U. S. citizenship.

Mrs. Venegas was granted a divorce and given custody of the children last year in Marion county Circuit Court. She says she cannot get passports for her two daughters because their father would not authorize them.

Sens. Wayne Morse and Richard Neuberger have introduced a bill in congress to permit Sarah and Maria to stay in this country.

Auto Hits Parked Car, Driver Fined \$250

A Salem driver was arrested for driving while intoxicated after his car was involved in a collision with a parked car on the 2000 block of Center street about 11:15 p.m. Tuesday, city police reported.

Officers said the car of Gordon Carter Gilbertson, 856 Breyer street, struck the rear of the parked car of E. Merritt Larsen, 2070 Center street, doing extensive damage to both cars.

An officer who heard the crash arrived at the scene as Gilbertson was trying to back his car from the curb and park it at the curb, he reported. Gilbertson was the only person involved in the collision, the officer said. He was uninjured.

Gilbertson pleaded guilty to the charge Wednesday in Municipal court and was fined \$250.

Health Council to Have Friday Meeting

A postponed meeting of the Marion County Health Council will be held at the Marion hotel at noon Friday.

The program, based on the subject "What How and Who of Mental Health," will include Dr. John Meadows, in charge of the out-patient clinic of the state hospital; Mrs. Arnes Booth, county school superintendent; Ruby Bunnell, executive secretary of the Marion County Tuberculosis and Health association; and Richard Goetz, pastor of the Keizer Community church. Mrs. Bernice Yearly, in charge of the nursing program of the county health department, will act as moderator.

The county health department is awaiting further instruction in connection with the vaccination program for the control of polio. It is probable the program here will follow the one suggested that the third shot not be given until sometime next fall. However, no accurate information in this connection has been received.

3 Vehicles Damaged At 14th and Center

Three cars, including a city patrol car, got extensive damage in a collision at the intersection of 14th and Center streets Wednesday morning, city police reported.

The accident happened, investigating officers said, when a south-bound car driven by Clarence Emil Ruberg, 1785 S. Main street, started to cross Center street in front of a city patrol car driven by Officer Duane Lehr, 3225 Abrams avenue. The patrol car struck the side of the Ruberg car, flipping it around and into the car of Walter Meyer Wood, which was on the south side of the intersection awaiting clearance to get onto Center street, officers said.

Ruberg told officers he did not see the eastbound patrol car and started to cross behind a west-bound bus as it cleared the intersection. He was cited to court for failure to yield the right of way.

No one was injured in the melee, police said, but all three vehicles got extensive damage. The incident occurred about 8:05 a. m., they said.

Portland to Handle P.O. Payroll Accounts

Effective April 16, much of the payroll accounting of the Salem post office will be handled by the controller's office of the division of accounting in Portland, reports Postmaster Albert C. Gragg.

Computation of time and the amount due each employee will be handled in the Salem office, but the punch cards will be sent to Portland for processing. The checks will be mailed from there. The new arrangement will not eliminate any worker in the Salem office.

Approximately 178 persons are employed under the jurisdiction of the Salem post office, involving a payroll of about \$60,000 a month. In addition another \$5000 is paid out for the use of vehicles and services covering special delivery and mail trucks.

Ferguson Advanced To Engineer Post

Edgar O. Ferguson, 1645 Bonnie Way Drive, Salem, is being promoted from transitman to resident engineer here this week, according to R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer.

The position will involve responsibility for location and construction on various assigned projects in the Salem area.

Ferguson began with the highway department in 1941 and has previously held the positions of head chairman and inspector. He has served at various locations in the state including Fossil and Tillamook. He served three years in the army during World War II.

Additional Judges For 3 Counties Voted

Three bills to give additional circuit judges to Multnomah, Lane and Douglas counties received approval in the Oregon Legislature Wednesday.

The House passed and sent to the Senate two measures to increase the number of judges in Multnomah County from 9 to 13, and in Lane County from 2 to 3. Douglas County, which now has one judge, would get two under a bill approved by the Senate and sent to the House.

The Senate passed and sent to the House Wednesday a resolution asking the Unemployment Compensation Commission to study the question of whether employees of the state and local governments should be covered by unemployment insurance.

The governor's advisory committee recommended that such coverage be given, but the Legislature has taken no action on the proposal.

Senate Passes Bill To Abolish FEPAC

A bill to abolish the Fair Employment Practices Advisory Committee was passed by the Senate Wednesday and sent to the House.

The committee, which is appointed by the governor, advises the state labor commissioner on enforcement and education under the FEP law.

The bill provides that the labor commissioner, if he wishes, can appoint his own advisory groups.
