Rain Spell Hampers Training Attempts

Past Three Games Cancelled by Weather; May Get First Sacker

NAPA, Calif.—(Special)—Manager Hugh Luby today is entertaining the idea of leaving for Salem two days early if the Salem weather forecast is encouraging. It's a cinch no good is being accomplished in Napa by trying to wait out a determined rain spell.

Luby this morning called around the Oakland and Sacramento valley to try to find a dry field somewhere and called Eureka on their weather situation. Even in that area, where the Senators are to play twice this week-end, they reported 1.67 inches of rainfall in the last 24 hours.

May Come Direct

Luby said that chances are that if the Senators can't play at Eureka, they will go directly to Salem.

The "occasional rain" forecast for today and Friday was being borne out in the Salem Senators spring training site with 20 mile winds being thrown in extra. The result was a gloomy face on Manager Luby, whose players have done their exercise moving from one chair to another in the hotel lobby.

Not since last Saturday have they played a game and they've had less than two hours of outside activity.

Today's Game Called

Wednesday's two games with Wenatchee and the Napa All-Stars were postponed and so was today's rematch with Wenatchee. The Chiefs, training at Petaluma, were to leave for home today ahead of the previous plans because of the rain. Friday, originally an open date for Salem, was designated for making up the Napa contest but it will take plenty of sun to make the Napa field playable. Luby offered first baseman Dick Travers a contract yesterday and is expecting an answer today from the rookie, who played his college ball at Sacramento Juc.

PCC-TV Plans On Five Games

Conference Schools to Vote on Television Pact This Week

SEATTLE (AP)—Plans for televising Pacific Coast Conference football on five Saturdays next fall have been completed but are being kept secret until the conference can express an opinion.

It was learned Wednesday the proposals of the conference TV committee will be submitted to member schools and a mail vote probably will be taken prior to the conference meeting at Portland, Ore., in May. The National Collegiate Athletic Assn., also must approve.

In addition to the five regional dates, three West Coast teams will be seen on national television. The Ohio State-Stanford game at Palo Alto, Calif., will be shown Oct. 1 and the Southern California-UCLA game at Los Angeles Nov. 19.

Al Masters of Stanford was chairman of the conference committee which met here to draw up the program.

Cuban Defeats Jimmy Carter

Zulueta Predicts He'll Take Lightweight Title Easily

WASHINGTON (AP)—"For the championship, I take him easy," Cuba's Orlando Zulueta said Thursday after winning a 10-round split decision from lightweight champion Jimmy Carter Wednesday night.

Carter, whose title wasn't at stake in the bout over a national television hookup, didn't have a word to say. But his manager, Willie Ketchum, made up for it. "What a lousy decision," Ketchum howled. "Jimmy beat him. He beat him good."

It was the old story of a puncher, Carter, against a boxer, Zulueta. Jabbing with steady consistency, Zulueta frequently showed contempt for Carter, the heavier hitter, and actually was outslugging him at the final bell.

Both fighters were over the lightweight limit. Carter at 137, Zulueta at 137½, but the Cuban said he was confident he could win the title at the legal limit.

Santee Still Seeks Record

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP)—Wes Santee, America's greatest distance star, says he feels the 4-minute mile will be within his grasp Saturday if weather conditions are good.

The long-legged lad from the plains of western Kansas hopes to beat the world record of 3:58, set by Australia's John Landy last year, in the 30th Kansas Relays here Saturday.

The only other man to run the mile in less than 4 minutes is Dr. Roger Bannister of London who had a 3:59.4.

"I think I'm ready to unwrap a good one if the weather is right," Santee said today.

NAPA, Calif.—Disillusioned again by California's un-Californian weather which rained out Tuesday's game at the University, we weren't going to leave the dripping campus without a story of some kind. After all, when the boss sent us into the sunshine he expected something besides notices of rainouts. So we looked up the University of California baseball coach, George Wolfman, and visited the Bears' spring football practice. One was dry, the other wet but undaunted.

Wolfman is an old friend of Hugh Luby's, having played as catcher for the old San Francisco Missions of the Pacific Coast league in 1934 and 1935—just before Luby came out to the PCL. "I watched Hugh play for Oakland many years and got to know him real well," Wolfman said.

Wolfman later coached at Mission High in S.F. and after coming to U. of California coached such major leaguers-to-be as Jackie Jensen and Sam Chapman. This year's Bear nine is weak defensively, having lost four to USC, splitting with UCLA and losing exhibitions to teams of Major Stars and Minor Stars. They beat USC, Santa Clara, Oregon State, Oregon, Stanford, Chico State, San Francisco State and Cal Aggies.

National Open Scheduled In 'Frisco; New Rules Prevail

NEW YORK (UP)—The U.S. Golf Association today announced dates and sites for qualifying rounds for the 55th U.S. Open championship and under this year's new restrictions, Slammin' Sammy Snead and a host of other former champions will have to go through the preliminaries.

Championship play is scheduled for San Francisco, June 16-18, while the trials in 25 cities this year, will be staged on June 6, except for Los Angeles and San Francisco, where a heavy entry is anticipated. The Los Angeles trials are set for June 2-3 and those at San Francisco are scheduled for June 6-7.

Those Exempted
In previous years, all former champions and all who finished among the low 20 in the previous U.S. Open automatically were exempt. This year, however, only the last five individuals to win the U.S. open title and last year's low 10 are exempt, along with winners of certain other U.S. and British titles.

Exempt from qualifying, as the last five individuals to win the Open crown, are defending champion Ed Furgol, Ben Hogan, Julius Barnes, Cary Middlecott and Lew Worsham, Lloyd Mangrum, a former champion, is exempt as one of the low 10 finishers a year ago.

Also exempt from finishing among the low 10 in 1954 are Gene Littler, Dick Mayer, Bobby Locke, Tommy Bolt, Shelly Mayfield, Freddie Haas and amateur Billy Joe Patton.

U.S. PGA champ Chick Harbert and U.S. Amateur champion Arnold Palmer, now a pro, also are exempt for winning those crowns, along with Peter Thomson of Australia, British Open champion, and Doug Bachli, also of Australia, the British amateur champion.

Salt Lake City and Seattle were added as qualifying sites while nine others were dropped because fewer entries are expected from eastern points with the championship scheduled for the Far West. Dropped were two of three in the New York City area along with Rochester and Roy, N.Y.; Des Moines, Iowa; Oklahoma City, Nashville, Tenn.; Houston and Midland, Tex.
