

Violence and Injury At Sperry Plant Again

For the second day, violence and injuries were reported Thursday at the strike-bound Sperry Gyroscope plant at Lake Success, N.Y. And there appeared little progress toward immediate settlement of any of the nation's major strikes.

CIO Electrical Workers resumed mass picketing at the Sperry plant and two men were reported injured. Several autos were damaged.
