San Diego Padres Win 7th Straight

Sacs Blasted by
8 to 2 Count;
Bevos Lose

The steamrolling San Diego Padres beat the Sacramento Soons 8-2 Friday night for their seventh straight Pacific Coast League win.

The league-leading Padres, with a 4-0 series record, will be seeking their 18th victory in 19 games Saturday night.

At San Francisco, Gene Bearden won his sixth consecutive game as the Seals won Los Angeles 5-3. Seattle walked Portland 11-2, and last-place Hollywood beat visiting Oakland 7-2.

Seattle got three runs in each of the first two innings, clouting three Beaver hurlers for a total of 14 hits. In the first, Carmen Mauro and Monty Basall singled, Bill Glynn walked, Bob Balena scored two runs with his single. Glynn scored on Joe Ginsberg's fly. The same combination did the damage in the second, Portland tallied when Joe Taylor fled to bring in Artie Wilson in the third, and in the fifth Dick Whitman scored on Ed Mickelson's single.

San Diego blasted out four runs in the first on five hits allowed by John Briggs. Al Federoff singled, Milt Smith doubled, Earl Rapp walked, Dick Sisler, Ed Bailey and Dick Faber all singled.

The visitors added another in the sixth and three more in the eighth. Rookie John Carmichael pitched his fourth win in a row. The Soons scored once in the fifth when Jackie Tobin singled in Rich Myers, and again in the ninth off Nanny Fernandez' double.

Captain Jim Moran batted out three of the Seals' 11 hits, and Bob DiPietro drove in three runs with a single and a double. The Angels led 2-1 in the second on singles by Steve Biko, Bob Coats, Jim Fanning and an infield out.

The Seals went ahead 3-2 in the third and got the deciding run in the fourth.

Cal Hogue and Bob Garber allowed the Oaks only two hits, against 10 given up by three Oakland pitchers. The Stars, ahead 3-2 in the seventh, added three more in that frame.

George Metkovich pounded a long fly that scored John Jorgensen for Oakland in the first, and Joe Brovia, who had doubled, tallied in the sixth as Neal bounced into a double play.

NEW YORK (UP)—Fearless Friley's facts and figures:

One of the baseball season's best races within a race will be run between the Yankees' Bob Turley and Cleveland's Herb Score for the American League strikeout crown and Bob Feller's record.

Turley, going into Friday night's game against Baltimore, had 69 strikeouts in 62 innings. Bob Score's tally was even better with 66 in 56 innings. Feller's mark is 348 in 371 innings, set in 1946.

The coaches of the five Northern Division schools at a meeting Friday voted to dispense with preliminaries Saturday morning.

Although Oregon was installed as the top-heavy favorite earlier this week, the Ducks' stock took a sharp downward dip Friday with the announcement that shuttler Jack Moad had been stricken with poliomyelitis at Eugene.

Moad had been expected to give Oregon a second-place finish in the shot put.

Also out was Bill Link, Washington State's 800 star, who suffered a pulled leg muscle.

Oregon and Washington were figured as the one-two finishes with Washington State, Idaho and Oregon State finishing in that order.

It's been more than a decade since any manager of the Chicago Cubs could put in a call to the bullpen with confidence. But Hal Jeffcoat, headed for the minors as a washed up outfielder a year ago, almost has skipper Stan Hack relaxing in a rocking chair these days.

PORTLAND (UP)—Dick Whitman, the former University of Oregon star centerfielder now burning up the Pacific Coast League with his bat, is realizing a long-time ambition in playing for the Portland Beavers.

Whitman, who through Thursday night had hit safely in 23 straight games and was hitting .364, was a member of Howard Hobson's dream outfield of himself, John Bubalo and Bill Carney in the early 1940's at Oregon. Bubalo, rated by many as the top prospect of the trio, went to medical school instead. Carney has played with Portland and still plays semi-pro ball.

Whitman took the long way around to get to Portland. He played with Brooklyn and Philadelphia in the National league and with Dodger farm clubs.

The subject of Whitman brings up another great Oregon centerfielder—George Shaw, who still has to decide whether he wants to play football or baseball. If he signs with a major league baseball club, he probably would not be allowed to play baseball. If he signs with the Baltimore Colts who drafted him as a football player, he probably would not play major league baseball. Maybe he could sign with the Portland Beavers and still play both.
