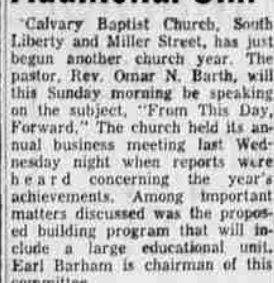


Baptists Plan Additional Unit
