

Senators Blanked 3-0 in Opener of Eugene Series

Bill Storti Blanks Locals on Two Hits

Dials Slated to Face Emeralds in Tonight's Clash; Wortham Loses

EUGENE—The elevator goes both ways rapidly for the Salem Senators, who have moved from fourth to second and back again the past two days of the Northwest league season. The direction was downward this time on the basis of a 3-0 loss to Eugene here Friday night before more than 2000 natural rivals who cheered on the razor-sharp pitching of George Storti.

Storti, righthander from the Red Sox chain, now has a 2-0 record because he still what have been two hits, struck out eight and walked only one—Floyd Robinson in the ninth inning. He had the benefit of three unearned Emerald runs which his team manufactured on five hits, seven walks, three errors and a passed ball.

Salem took advantage of every situation, too, completing five double plays in which shortstop Gene Tansell played a role every time.

Tonight, Manager Hugh Luby has named Bill Dials (3-4) to meet lefty Berlyn Hodges (3-0). A doubleheader Sunday at 1:30 will finish the series, with Bud Francis and Bill Whitson probably handling the ball throwing for Salem.

Next week the Senators will be off its diet of league games, being idle Monday through Thursday before being host to Yakima. Luby said that he has

arranged an exhibition for Tuesday night at Salem against the University of Oregon. It was Hodges who beat Salem (and Dials) in the second game of the opening series April 27. Storti had been named to face the Solons in the third game, which was rained out. Storti now has an earned-run average of less than four-tenths of a run, while Hodges has 0.27—a tough pair to face on successive nights.

Wortham Gets Loss

John Wortham suffered the loss as the Salem starter who left the game in the fifth trailing 2-0. He had given up two hits one unearned run in the first inning and got into trouble in the fifth by walking the leadoff batter, Whitey Thompson and serving up a single to Ran Romero after a passed ball had put Thomson on second. When he walked Ron Jackson, Luby summoned Bill Walsh, his No. 1 relief pitcher.

Eugene's third run came in the seventh because Storti doubled deeply to the centerfield wall and scored when Jackson's grounder found a tunnel under Tansell's legs after two were out on a double play initiated by Tansell.

That first inning Emerald run came when Jackson, the league's leading hitter, singled and tallied on Granny Gladstone's grounder through the box.

None Beyond Second

Gladstone, a former Portland Beaver, got two of Eugene's five hits. Only Salem hits were a single by catcher Harvey Koepf in the third inning and a double by Tansell to right field in the fourth. The Senators had only four left on base, testifying to the tight play of Manager Cliff Dapper's boys.

As a matter of fact, Salem got only Koepf and Tansell as far as second and none went farther.

There were more than 75 Salem fans sitting in a special section behind first base. Forty-one went on a chartered bus sponsored by the Senators Boosters club and stirred up the rivalry by heckling, and being heckled, by surrounding Eugene fans.

Wenatchee Rolls Out Big Guns In 9th

The Wenatchee Chiefs came through "lastest with the mostest" Friday night to keep their Northwest Baseball League victory skein intact.

The Chiefs made it five in a row by rolling out their big guns in the last of the ninth to whip Spokane, 11-10, and maintain their five-game lead over the rest of the pack.

At Eugene, the Emeralds' George Storti fashioned a 2-hitter to whip the ineffective Salem Senators, 3-0. Lewiston clubbed Yakima, 11-4, at Yakima in the other league game played.

The Chiefs grabbed off an early lead over Spokane, only to see the Indians take the advantage with a brace of runs in the seventh and in the eighth.

Wenatchee scored four runs in the bottom of the eighth and then was put strictly behind the eight ball when Spokane blasted through for six runs in the top of the ninth.

The undaunted Chiefs whipped back, with six runs on four hits and three walks to pull the game from the loss column back into the win line.

The contest was marred at its conclusion by an enthusiastic brawl in which players from both squads joined with reckless abandon. Edo Vanni, Wenatchee's manager, apparently started the fistfights with a remark that one of his players had been tripped by a Spokane man at third.

The slugfest resulted in nothing more than a few bruises.

Storti aided his own cause at Eugene with a double in the seventh inning. He scored Eugene's third run on an error. It was the second straight victory of the season without a setback for Storti.

Yakima's Bears and the Lewiston Broncs battled on even terms in the hit department, with 12 apiece, but the Broncs collected their safeties where it counted.

The big inning for Lewiston was the ninth when four singles, a stolen base, a walk and a sacrifice fly tallied up to four runs.

Yakima threatened seriously only in the eighth frame when triples by Gene Jacobs and Dez Charouh, a single and a sacrifice fly produced three runs.

Saturday's schedule has the same tandems playing. Tri-City is idle this go-round.

A and B Meets Continue At Corvallis; Medford Favorite

CORVALLIS (UP)—The 29th annual Oregon High School track and field meet continued here Saturday with championship action in both class A and B divisions.

In Friday's events six records were shattered—two in class A competition and four in the B division for smaller schools.

In the A qualifying events, St. Helens' Duane Marshall, topped the shotput record with a throw of 58 feet, 2 1/4 inches. Jack Moad, Medford, held the old mark with his 1933 toss of 57 feet, 8 1/2 inches. Moad, now a University of Oregon star, was stricken with polio this week.

Albany's Bob Amble broke the discus record with a throw of 161 feet, 6 1/2 inches. That was nearly five feet better than the mark he set last year.

In B competition records were set in the two events which were completed Friday. Martin Sharp of Eagle Valley added a full inch to the high jump mark with a leap of 5 feet, 11 1/4 inches. Bob Babb, Days Creek, threw the javelin 137 feet, 6 1/2 inches to better the old mark by more than 16 feet.

B qualifying records were established by Don Trautman, Condonia, the 440-yard dash, 51.9 seconds, and Bob Duncan, Moro, the 180-yard low hurdles, 20.9.

Defending champion Medford, which qualified 10 men in nine of the meet's 14 events, appeared to be the favorite. Portland's Roosevelt High qualified in six events.

A total of 52 schools were represented in the championship action.

Salem Voted H. S. Tourney

One 1956 Basketball Event to Come Here; A-1 in Eugene

CORVALLIS (UP)—The Oregon School Activities Assn. Friday selected sites for the three 1956 high school basketball tournaments. All will be held the week of March 12-17.

The class B tourney will go to Baker, the A-1 meet to Salem and A-1 continue at Eugene.

Each of the eight districts in the A-1 tourney will be represented by its two top teams. Portland, which has two districts, will be invited to three teams. The other districts will go to the winner of a playoff between the two teams gaining third place in districts 5 and 8.

Earlier the OSAA's delegate assembly voted 11-10 to continue the prep baseball championship playoff next year.

In another action the assembly voted 15-5 to submit an amendment to eliminate the annual football playoffs.

The playoffs will be underway, however, before the association can take action on the proposed constitutional change at its next meeting scheduled for November.

A spokesman said the 15-3 vote was not necessarily an indication that playoffs were generally opposed. The vote merely was to have the amendment drafted for consideration, he said.
