**Salem Businesses Entered by Thieves**

Burglars broke into two neighboring businesses early Monday morning but apparently got only about \$15 for their efforts, it was learned.

Entered were the Cherry City Milling company and Wiedler's Salem Laundry in the 300 block of South High street.

The safes in both places were attacked, city police said, but entry was gained only to the milling company safe. The \$15 was missing from there in the form of \$10 in change and \$5 in bills. Only the inner door of the safe was locked, police indicated, and the lock to that was punched out by the thieves. Entry to the building was through a window facing a neighboring parking lot.

The knob and dial were knocked out of the laundry company safe and a hole punched through behind the dial but the punch stuck in the door at that time and the burglars apparently couldn't get it out, officers said. Nothing was reported missing from the laundry, either in money or clothes, police said. Method of entry into the building was undetermined.
