Many Salem, OSC Stars Listed With Bend

The Salem Senators, 13-2 victors over the Bend semi-pro team in an exhibition game at Bend Tuesday night, return home for an 8 p.m. clash with the same Bend team.

The Loggers, loaded with four former Salem American Legion stars and another player who attended junior high school in Salem, will start Lowell Pearce against the Senators tonight.

Pearce, a star for the Salem high school several years back and a pitcher on the legion team that went to Hastings, Nebraska, was a regular starter for the Oregon State varsity this spring.

In a pre-game ceremony Friday night, when the Senators resume Northwest League play with Yakima at Waters Field, the first half championship pennant will be raised.

Also Friday night will be IGA Food Stores night with a special program and prizes. Saturday night's game starts at 8 p.m. instead of 2 p.m. and Sunday's pair of games will begin at 6 p.m.

Sunday's change is because of a conflict with the Soap Box Derby.

The two Jantze boys, first baseman Phil and catcher-outfielder Curt, will also be in the line-up. Phil was one of the leading hitters in the Northern Division for OSC and Curt played with North Salem.

The fourth former Salem star is Twink Pederson, a second baseman, who played at Salem high and also was a legion standout. Tommy Hunt was an all-around star at Leslie junior high before moving to Bend.

Last night the Senators banged out 16 hits of two Bend hurlers and had three homers. Salem scored four runs in the first inning and also had a big sixth inning when five runs crossed the plate.

The homers for the winners were by catcher Harv Koepf, pitcher Bill Whitson, and outfielder Floyd Robinson. Robinson's homer came in the ninth inning and was far over the right field fence.

Bend scored single runs in the eighth and ninth of the third Salem pitcher, second baseman Mel Krause. The runs came on homers by Gene Stott, former Eugene high star, and third-sacker Hasmussen.

Innings and Whitson came on to Bill Walsh hurled the first five pitches in the sixth and Krause in the eighth. Krause had four hits to pace the winners.

The attendance was slightly under 1,000.

Sacramento snapped Lou Kretlow's string of scoreless innings at 28 straight Tuesday night but his Seattle teammates staged a 4-3 come-from-behind victory to keep the fireballing right-hander undefeated in the Pacific Coast League.

The Solon runner who crossed the plate in the fourth inning at Sacramento was the first to score on Kretlow since he joined the Rainiers from the Baltimore Orioles last month. Sacramento picked up another run in the sixth but Jerry Zuvella, up from Wenatchee of the Northwest League, put the Rainiers in front in the eighth with a 400-foot triple that scored two runs. Zuvella scored on Vern Stephens' single to give Kretlow his fifth victory. The win tightened Seattle's grip in second place.

First-place San Diego had a big inning in whipping Portland 7-4. The Padres pushed across five quick runs in the first inning and coasted to victory. Nine San Diego batters went to the plate before Dick Waibel relieved Bill Werle. The Beavers' ace southpaw, and put out the fire.

At Los Angeles, Oakland split a doubleheader. Los Angeles won the seven-inning opener 4-1, with southpaw Joe Hatten scattering 8 hits. Oakland won the nightcap 5-1 behind Chris Van Cuyk's 5-hit pitching.

Except for one thing, the San Francisco Seals could be proud of their big second inning in their doubleheader with Hollywood. The Seals tallied 10 runs in the second frame of the nightcap, their biggest inning since World War II. But all were unearned.

Five Hollywood errors did the trick. San Francisco won 12-5. Errors also were a big factor in the seven-inning opener, which Hollywood won 3-1. Three Seal miscues led in two Star runs.

Clay Courts Net Tourney Nears Midway

Veteran Bitsy Grant Sentimental Pick Over Trabert

ATLANTA (UP) — Top-ranked Tony Trabert and little veteran Bryan (Bitsy) Grant were to resume their sentiment - packed match today as the weeklong National Clay Courts tennis championships neared the halfway mark.

For Wimbledon champion Tony Trabert, the match was only another in the climb to his second Clay Courts title but the partisan crowd was pulling for Grant to give his younger opponent a tough battle.

Grant, who snared the first of three Clay Courts crowns in 1930, the year Trabert was born, showed flashes of his old brilliance Tuesday but could not match the Trabert power while piling up a 6-2, 1-0 edge before rain halted play.

The little shotmaker, for whom the tourney courts are named, broke through Trabert's serve in the seventh game of the first set to win by a love score but the rest of the match was virtually a foregone conclusion.

Grant said afterwards that Trabert was "not the player (Don) Budge was. But Tony isn't the player he used to be either. He's not fighting himself and everyone else. He's the champion now and he has that confidence."

Trabert, who breezed by Willis Ervin, Augusta, Ga., 6-0, 6-0, in his first appearance in the tourney, was to meet stiffer opposition should he get by Grant in the person of Mike Green of Miami, the nation's second-ranked junior player.

Second-seeded Ham Richardson of Baton Rouge, La., also took the courts for the first time Tuesday and advance quickly to the fourth round by a bye, forfeit and a 6-2, 6-2 decision over Barry MacKay, Akron, Ohio.

Other seeded players advancing without much trouble were Eddie Moylan, Trenton, N.J.; ranked No. 3; fourth-seeded Bernard (Tut) Barzen, San Angelo, Tex., the defending champion who wrestled the title from Trabert last year.
