

## New Art Exhibit up at Bush House



On exhibit in the Bush House, Salem Art museum, during the month of July will be a group of paintings and pictures in other media by Henry Lewis, of Eugene. This is Mr. Lewis' 11th one-man show, and is retrospective in character, showing examples of work done during the past five years. Mr. Lewis' purpose in selecting the works shown is to demonstrate

his experiments with various media. The show is arranged according to the year in which the work was completed. Mr. Lewis holds both a B.S. and a M.F.A. degree from the University of Oregon. He also studied at the University of Michigan, in Morelia, Mexico, which is the locale of some of his paintings. Mr. Lewis has taught at the Eu-

gene Art Center for the past four years, and has exhibited widely in the Northwest region. He has shown in invitations as well as competitive shows, which have netted some rewards. Bush House is open daily, except Mondays, from 10 a.m. until noon, and from 2 p.m. until 5 p.m. The public is invited to see the exhibits on display.

## Burns Man Admits Tax Evasion Charge

PORTLAND — Ray O. Applegate of Burns, Ore., pleaded guilty to two counts of federal income

tax evasion Tuesday and was fined \$1,000 in federal court here. The government contended Applegate did not report some \$7,000 income in both 1948 and 1949. Applegate's attorney said that his client would file amended returns to show that he earned only from \$4,000 to \$6,000 more than the

original returns indicated. Between 1913 and 1950, federal, state and local government expenditure in the United States multiplied more than 22 times from \$3,100,000,000 to \$69,500,000,000, says the Twentieth Century Fund.

Most of the widespread thunderstorm activity over the southeastern states has diminished although light showers continued during the night over the Carolinas. Showers also were reported in the Missouri River Valley.

Heaviest rainfall during the night was nearly 2 inches at Augusta, Ga., and nearly 1 inch at Richmond, Va.

Hot and rather muggy weather prevailed over much of the southland with temperatures during the night in the 90s in the Southwest desert region.
