Hot and Sticky In Wide Areas

Midsummer's hot and sticky weather clung to wide areas from the Rockies eastward to the Atlantic Coast today.

The Weather Bureau didn't predict any immediate relief. In some areas, forecasters said, temperatures probably would be a little higher today. They ranged from the 80s to above 100 again yesterday in the hot belt.

Readings were near and above 100 degrees for the fifth straight day yesterday in parts of Montana, with the nation's top marks of 106 reported at Miles City and Glasgow. In the Southwest desert region, the day's high was 104 at Yuma, Ariz.

Higher temperatures were reported in the central and northern plains with nighttime marks in the 70s and 80s. They were in the 70s in the South, the Ohio Valley and most of the Great Lakes region. New England and most of New York state had pleasant weather with temperatures ranging from 57 at Portland, Maine, and 64 at Albany, N.Y., to 69 at Boston.

There was some scattered rainfall.

Dr. H. Boyd Hall, Texas Conference president of the National Assn. for Advancement of Colored People, called it "the most perfect decision that has been issued in any of the 48 states."
