Bridges' Trial Nearing End

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Attorneys are expected to wind up their final arguments Thursday in the Harry Bridges citizenship trial. Testimony ended Wednesday with the longshore union leader on the stand.

The government charges that Australian-born Bridges, in order to gain United States citizenship, swore falsely in 1943 that he was not nor had ever been a member of the Communist Party.

The case is being tried before Federal Judge Louis E. Goodman without a jury.

Bridges testified briefly Wednesday that his International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union prohibits political discrimination.

644 Killed in Fight on Rebels

CALI, Colombia (AP)—President Gustavo Rojas Pinilla says 644 Colombians were killed in one province alone during the past three months of his government's efforts to stamp out rebellious elements.

In a speech last night marking Colombia's Independence Day, Rojas Pinilla gave this breakdown

of the dead: Liberals 87; Conservatives 492; armed forces 65. The President charged the insurgents are inspired by Communist elements and aided by dissident politicians and criminals.

Dr. Sam Loses Appeal for New Trial, Enters Prison

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—The dark gray walls of Ohio Penitentiary held a new prisoner today.

He wasn't anybody special as far as prison authorities were concerned, just another number—98,180—with gray prison pants, blue and white striped shirt and a cap. But there was something about this prisoner—Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard—something that attracted a horde of newsmen and a score of other persons when he arrived at the penitentiary yesterday afternoon.

Dr. Sam, as newspapers had headlined his name across the country, was convicted last Dec. 21 of the murder of his pregnant wife Marilyn, 31. Her battered body was found early July 4, 1954, in the bedroom of their Bay Village, a Cleveland suburb.

The 31-year-old osteopath denied his guilt throughout the long trial. He said his wife was killed by a "bushy-haired" intruder who also had attacked him and knocked him

unconscious. Tuesday an appellate court in Cleveland had turned down his second appeal for a new trial.

Now comes the waiting—at least, 10 years—before Sheppard will be eligible for parole on his second-degree murder conviction. He will spend the first 10 days at the penitentiary in a quarantine ward where he will be given tests to determine what work he is best suited for.

There is speculation that because of his medical background he might be placed in the prison doctor's office. He wouldn't be able to practice medicine, of course, but he could help out as an assistant.

Meanwhile, his attorneys are preparing to take his case to the Ohio Supreme Court. Sheppard already owes \$4,562.43 in criminal and appellate court costs for the trial and subsequent appeals. A court clerk noted. And his attorney bill must be paid "within a reasonable time," the clerk added, or a lien will be taken against his real or personal property.

Sheppard spent almost a year in Cuyahoga County Jail awaiting the outcome of his case, a year that will not count toward his prison term.

Sheppard was taken here by car, handcuffed to another prisoner, Michael Jacko, 47, a Cleveland robber. With them were two Cuyahoga County deputy sheriffs, Mike Uccello and Dave Yetira.

Uccello stepped out of the police cruiser first, followed by Sheppard and Jacko. Flashbulbs popped as Sheppard, clasping a book of poetry and a large picture of his son Chip, walked about 20 yards to the prison entrance.

A newsmen asked Sheppard if he had anything to say. Sheppard did not answer.

"He seemed to enjoy the ride after being cooped up in the county jail so long," said Uccello. "He was a good prisoner."

Atom Ship Bill To Be Reported

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Price (D-Ill.) said Thursday it "definitely is not" his intention to "bolt up" bills designed to speed construction of this nation's first atomic-powered merchant ship.

Price heads a subcommittee to which the parent Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee Wednesday shunted all bills dealing with such ships.

The full committee did this after again rejecting 11-5 an attempt to send to the Senate floor for action President Eisenhower's atomic "peace ship" proposal. A 12-4 vote then sent all pending atomic merchant ship bills to Price's subcommittee on research and development.

Chairman Anderson (D-NM) of the full committee said he did not consider this meant all these measures were dead for the 1955 session. He said it was hoped the subcommittee could come up with an early recommendation.

Price, in an interview, echoed this view and said his subcommittee might open hearings Monday.

Queen May Ban Duke's Auto Driving

LONDON (AP)—London newspapers said Thursday Queen Elizabeth II may ban her speedy cousin, the 20-year-old Duke of Kent, from driving an automobile.

The Duke, seventh in the line of succession to the throne, now is in a hospital recuperating from his third auto smashup in 13 months. He has been driving three years.

His third mishap occurred a week ago but the news only leaked out Tuesday.

NEW YORK (AP)—Two gunmen invaded a Bronx workshop for the partially disabled yesterday in a vain bid for a \$5,600 payroll. They fled empty-handed after a blazing gun battle with a guard.

One of the gunmen, shot in the left shoulder, was rabbed minutes later by an off-duty policeman.

Also wounded in the shooting were the guard, Gerald Elliot, 40, and a woman clerical employee, Lottie Friedlander, 40. All were reported in good condition.

Some 130 sewing workers, almost all suffering from tuberculosis or heart ailments, hit the floor as gunfire echoed in the halls of Altra Workshops, Inc., run by the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies.

Thirteen shots were exchanged between the guard and the two stickup men.

About 20 minutes after the payroll was brought in Asst. Manager Harold Rogot was supervising two women employes making up pay envelopes.

Elliot noticed the two gunmen as they approached, and yelled out:

"Drop your guns."

The gunmen began to fire.

Elliot returned the fire until the thugs whirled around and fled the building.

Patrolman James Rozakis, seven times cited for bravery on the police force at the age of 24, saw the two as they were fleeing.

He drew his revolver and chased them, first in his car then on foot, until he cornered one.

Police identified him as Dominick De Gennaro, 30, Schenectady, N.Y., recently released from Clinton State Prison at Dannemora, where he served time for robbery.

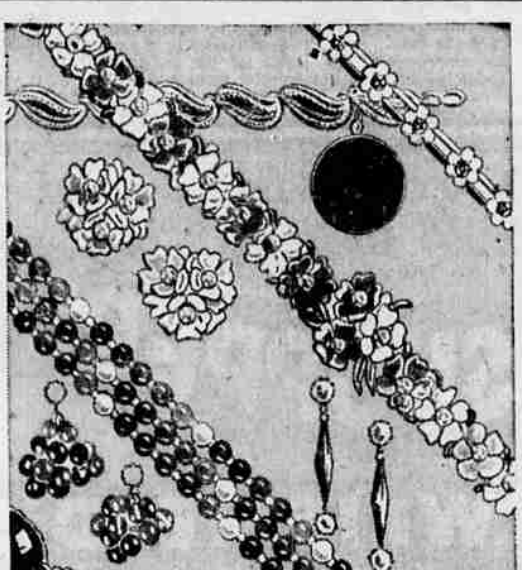

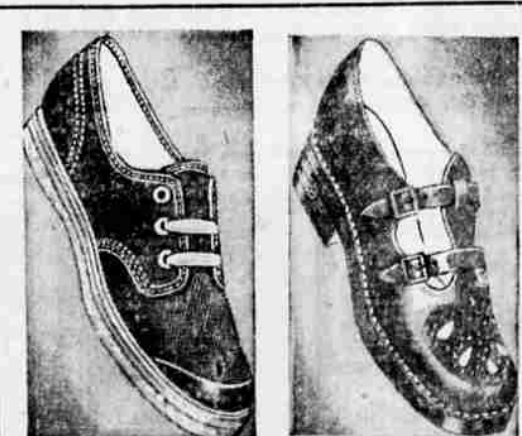
