970,000 Shots Of Lily Vaccine

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Public Health Service Thursday released approximately 970,000 shots of polio vaccine produced by the Eli Lilly Co. Surgeon Gen. Leonard A. Schele, said this brings to approximately 3,950,000 shots the amount of polio vaccine approved since revised testing requirements were adopted May 26. About 1,600,000 shots—cubic centimeters—of this total was produced by the Eli Lilly Co., an Indianapolis firm. The vaccine will be turned over to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis for distribution. The service reported meanwhile that 565 new polio cases occurred in the country for the week ended July 16. It said this represents a 40 per cent increase over the previous week, but noted the increase is not "greatly different" from those in comparative weeks over the last five years.

Lions Choose Edward Majek

Edward Majek, local insurance broker, has been named deputy district governor for the western Oregon district of Lions clubs, according to an announcement made during the weekly luncheon program of the Salem Lions club Thursday noon at the Marion. Majek will serve during the 1955-56 fiscal year. President William Leeper appointed Daryl Jones to the position of lion tamer, succeeding Jack Jones, who is being transferred to southern California by the J. C. Penney company. Eric Bergman of the Oregon Travel Information division of the state highway commission, presented one of the late motion pictures covering scenic spots of the state. He said the department had a budget of \$275,000 which was used in attracting visitors to the state. Last year tourists left \$125,000,000 in Oregon he said. May Balance 1956 Budget

WASHINGTON (AP)—Prospects are improving that the Eisenhower administration may achieve its prime domestic goal—balancing the federal budget—in fiscal 1956, the bookkeeping year which is just three weeks old. Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey reported yesterday that fiscal 1955 ended June 30 with a deficit of \$4,192,000,000. But rising prosperity was pushing up tax collections. Even though federal spending last year ran a billion dollars above the forecast made by President Eisenhower, the deficit was 300 million dollars less than Eisenhower anticipated. And the trend of tax collections was still sharply upward as the fiscal year closed. One high administration official said erasure of the \$2,400,000,000 deficit officially estimated for the new fiscal year is possible with good luck.

Salem Students At Hawaii U.

HONOLULU, Hawaii—Fifty-six residents of the state of Oregon are enrolled in the six-week summer session of the University of Hawaii. Among nearly 4,000 students attending the "Sun, Surf, and Study" summer program are Salem residents Darlene Gortmaker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry W. Gortmaker of 2050 Market Street, and Charlen Woods, daughter of Mrs. Marjorie J. Woods of 975 Imperial Drive.

A graduate of Oregon College of Education, Miss Gortmaker is taking courses in Basic Skills in Pre-school-Primary Education and in Dances of Hawaii. She is making her first visit to the islands. Miss Woods, who is a home economics major at Oregon State College, has chosen classes in economics, weaving, and hula dancing for her summer study.

Each year an increasing number of students from mainland United States, representing nearly every state of the Union, come to Hawaii to participate in the summer program of the University. These students find the University's summer session a unique way of combining travel and recreation with study and college credits. About one-fourth of the summer enrollment is from the mainland, and fourteen foreign countries are also represented.

The office of Student Personnel has planned a lively round of parties, entertainments, lectures, and tours to temples, museums, a sugar mill, and various points of interest. Sailboat parties, coffee breaks, receptions, dances, Hawaiian Night, and the Intercultural program will enable students to become acquainted with one another. Newcomers to the Islands will be introduced to the old Hawaiian sport of ti-leaf sliding.

Plant Grows at Independence

INDEPENDENCE—The National Plywood plant has added a second shift and the future outlook is bright. Already great progress has been made in the four months the Plywood Cooperation has been in operation. With the addition of the second shift according to Tom O'Connell, general manager of the cooperation, the plant now has an annual payroll of nearly one half million dollars. Logs for the mill are coming from Beacon Rock, Wash., Skamania county, and are towed down the Columbia river and the Willamette river and reloaded at Oswego and taken to the plant by rail. Plans are underway to add the third shift as soon as possible.
