Cominform Abandonment Is Predicted by Nehru

Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru, the "neutralist" leader of India, has made the surprising prediction that Soviet Russia may abandon its notorious "Cominform."

If that happened, it certainly would be a step toward reducing the world tensions which the Big Four heads of government are discussing in the Geneva "summit" conference.

Nehru said in a press conference in New Delhi, the Indian capital, that the Cominform—the Communist Bureau of Information—did not fit in with the Russian-neutralist idea of "co-existence" between East and West. Hence, he added, the logical conclusion is that the "Cominform" will "automatically go."

Nehru is just back from a long visit to Moscow, and he may know something.

World Tension
President Eisenhower, in his opening statement at the Geneva conference, named Communist subversion as one of the chief causes of world tension which ought to be discussed.

The Cominform, which the

Kremlin formed on October, 1947, is one of its chief instruments of subversion. It replaced the old "Communist International" which Russia abandoned during World War II as a supposed sign of good faith.

Another of the issues which President Eisenhower suggested for discussion is the freeing of the Soviet satellite countries.

He even received some mild support from Nehru on this question. Admitting that the satellite problem did exist, Nehru said that each country should be treated separately, in a peaceful manner and in accordance with the wishes of the peoples concerned. He added that the questions could be considered better when other cold war tensions had faded.

Nehru undoubtedly was right about that. The President made it plain that all he wanted to do was to discuss this issue among others, not to negotiate on it.

Won't Forget
But it is evident that the United States government is not going to let the Kremlin forget the satellites.

Further, the United States regards as satellites Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia as well as the other Communist-ruled countries of Eastern Europe.

Russia occupied these little Baltic republics in 1940, by agreement with Nazi Germany, and incorporated them into the Soviet Union. But the United States never recognized the Russian grab. It still recognizes diplomatic and consular representatives of the three countries in the United States. President Eisenhower, in a statement made in June, 1954, at a rally of Lithuanians, Latvians and Estonians in New York, said that the United States is "resolved to continue to do all that we can to establish in the world conditions under which these countries will regain and retain their freedom."

\$10,250 Judgment For Condemnation

Businessmen Eye Geneva Developments for Peace

NEW YORK (AP)—Businessmen hope—as distinguished from expect—that Geneva will produce some positive pledge of more peaceful times and a token step toward relaxation of curbs on world trade.

If it does, a reaction might come quickly in the stock market: first, a bullish attitude toward "peace" stocks and a bearish look at "war" stocks; and then a more reasoned appraisal of the chances of greater lands, and of profits for many companies.

But trade between the East and West is another question. In calling for a world economic conference, Russia apparently would like to boost such trade. But many American businessmen take the view that the most that can be expected, if the cold war is side-tracked, would be a moderate and gradual rise in East-West trade.

Russia's satellites and Western European countries might revive their prewar trading — if the Communist lands become economically healthy enough to produce the goods they promise.

has many things Russia wants but Russia has few things to trade that this country wants.

And the things that Russia wants most — heavy machinery (which might be used for making military goods rather than consumer goods), strategic chemicals and metals — the United States isn't disposed to let them have. The chances seem slim that a peace reassurance enough to change the U.S. attitude will come out of Geneva.

Trade between the East and West already has perked up some recently. It is currently the highest in three years, but is insignificant in comparison with total U.S. foreign trade.

In the first three months of this year the United States exported to the Soviet bloc about three million dollars worth of tobacco, wool rags, foods, clothing and inedible tallow. But total U.S. exports run around 14 billion dollars a year.

From the Soviet bloc the United States imported 17 million dollars worth of goods in the first quarter. Total imports from all lands this year should be around 11 billion dollars.
