**Hood River Grand Jury Grills Cruelty of Police**

HOOD RIVER — A grand jury lectured Hood River police Wednesday for the way they treated Robert Easley, 48, harvest worker from Klamath Falls, who died after a fight here July 9.

The grand jury said police picked Easley up without arresting him on a proper charge, and, after a cursory medical examination, kicked him out of town and told him not to come back.

"This was a basic violation of Robert Easley's constitutional rights and is a practice that cannot and will not be tolerated," the report said.

Easley died July 10 in a hospital at The Dalles from a punctured lung. The grand jury earlier indicted another harvest worker, Doss Matchen, on a manslaughter charge, accusing him of kicking and beating Easley here.

The grand jury said police were called after the fight in which Easley was injured. They took Easley to the Hood River Hospital, where a nurse and an extern examined Easley beside the police car, the report said.

The nurse and extern agreed Easley might have a fractured rib, but said he would be all right if he rested quietly, the jury reported.

The nurse and extern later said they thought Easley was under arrest and was going to spend the night quietly in jail.

Instead, Easley was taken to the city limits and told to leave town, the report said. The grand jury also took note of a deathbed statement from Easley that said the police kicked him when he did not

move fast enough to please them. The two policemen involved, Robert Schultz and Donald Sticher, denied they kicked or otherwise hurt Easley.

A motorist picked Easley up on the highway later, and took him to the hospital at The Dalles.

The grand jury said that neither Easley nor the police asked that he be admitted to the Hood River hospital, but added:

"However, the grand jury feels that when persons are brought to the hospital for examination, and hospitalization is needed or requested, the medical personnel there should be extremely careful to see that whoever accompanies the injured person understands fully and completely what further care and treatment the injured party needs."

**Rioters in Saigon Disavowed by Diem**

SAIGON, South Viet Nam — Premier Ngo Dinh Diem Thursday disavowed the persons who sacked two Saigon hotels Wednesday and said the government "has taken energetic measures to prevent the renewal of these incidents."

The anticommunist premier made a nationwide radio broadcast a few hours after the United States protested failure to protect American lives and property in a wave of violence on the anniversary of the Geneva armistice accords. The demonstrators caused a million dollars in damage.

**Pact Covers Santiam Route**

The Marion county court has been presented with an agreement covering that portion of the Santiam highway extending from Stout creek near Mehama to the Mission street entrance into Salem. The agreement was prepared by the state highway department and takes care of the county roads that are crossed by the highway.

The state highway commission

is expected to let contracts for the Stout Creek-Mission street section of the highway in the not distant future, although no announcement has been made in this connection. The new route will involve virtually all new construction. It parallels three present roads on the north for a distance west of Stout creek in the direction of Stayton, then veers off over a northwesterly course crossing the Stayton-Sublimity road, north of Stayton. The improvement involves 23.9 of construction.

The section of the Santiam highway between Lancaster and Airport roads has been completed, but barricades had not been removed early Thursday. However, some motorists have been using the route. The entire project is a part of the Federal Aid Secondary road system, involving the U.S. government, the state and the county. The county is not called upon to assist in the financing.

When the 23.9 miles have been completed the Santiam highway will have been improved all the way from Mission street to Bend. By 1965 it is expected there will be about eight million men between the ages 20-25 in the United States.

**Police Post Tests Slated**

August 4 and 5 have been designated by the City Civil Service Commission as dates for examinations to select a new police captain and police sergeant. Both oral and written examinations will be given.

Eligible to take the test for captain are four sergeants while 20 patrolmen have the amount of service required to take the sergeant's examination. Promotional eligibility had expired when Capt. Stanley

Friese died early last month. Sgt. Joseph Schuetz is now an acting captain and Patrolman Elwood Hewett is an acting sergeant.

Results of the tests to be given will set up an eligibility list for future vacancies.

Oral examinations will be conducted August 5 by Police Chiefs Cecil W. Fruit, Corvallis and Vern Hill, Eugene.

Deadline for submitting applications to the test is August 2.

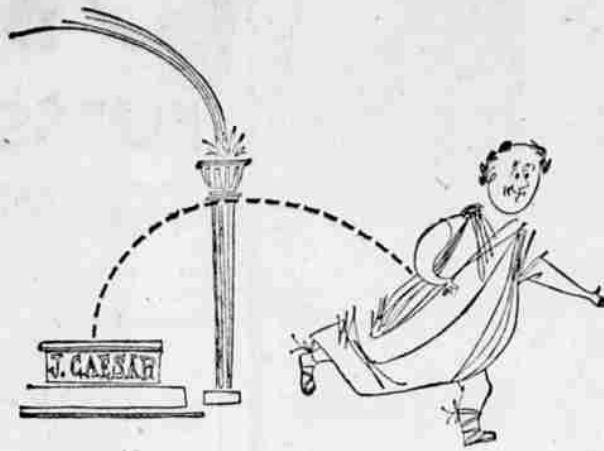
