FORMER O.S.C. COACH LEFT HIS MARK

The two seasons the late Joe Pipal coached football at Oregon State college he left his niche. Mr. Pipal died Wednesday night in Los Angeles, credited with devising the lateral pass while at O.S.C. in 1916 and 1917. He was beaten 27-0 by Oregon's great Rose Bowl team in 1916 but beat Oregon 14-7 in Portland in 1917 in an upset win scored in the first few minutes. Perhaps Pipal is best remembered for bringing to O.S.C. from California a little back, Tuffy Conn, one of the greatest in Beaver history. There only one season, 1918, and ineligible for conference games as a freshman, Conn played in the non-conference games.

When Whitman played at Corvallis it was 0-0 at halftime before Conn came in to spark four Beaver touchdowns. His outstanding feat, perhaps, was to recover a fumble in the Nebraska game in Portland behind the Beaver goal line and to run 104 yards for a touchdown. Nebraska won, however, 17-7. Conn took a better offer at Penn U., but didn't stay there long and played pro ball in Ohio after World War I.

ODDS AND ENDS

Jerry Walling, big, economy-sized tackle from South Salem, has picked University of Oregon for his campus home. Oregon also will get quarterback Herb Juran, guard Larry Newsom and fullback Salsbury, we are told. Oregon State is getting a keg of dynamite in Duane Marshall of St. Helens, the well-built and fast halfback who also is state shot-put champion. Watch him go in the Shrine game Aug. 20. Incidentally, tickets for that may be purchased from Shrine members, not at Wicklund's. Chuck Puhlmann plans to play football at O.C.E. this fall again. Puhlmann is well-known around Waters Field, where he is a jack-of-all-trades, and well-known to O.C.E. coaches, who liked his speed and toughness on the freshman team last year. We watched him Thursday night playing shortstop for Ray & Wilma's softball team and he made stops look easy. "Routine plays," he laughed.

Pete Estrada, who played outfield for Salem Senators in the early part of the 1954 season, hit three home runs in the same game, one a grand-slammer, for Pocastello July 29. He drove in eight of his team's nine runs. ... Aldon J. Wilkie of Newberg, who entered the grand champion bird of the Multnomah County Fair (a Rhode Island Red cocker), pitched for the Salem Senators in 1952 and also is an ex-major league hurler.

We never thought Eugene would have to worry about attendance, but the Emeralds and Yakima drew only 805 fans last Sunday to a doubleheader. The Emeralds have a goal of 30,000 for August, but will have to average 3201 for the remaining eight dates to make it. ... Portland Beavers will play an exhibition against Eugene next Monday. Eugene is idle Aug. 21 and 22 and you can guess who plays the Emeralds right after the rest—Salem, of course. ... Joe Finley, Salem Motorcycle club member who won the 10-mile Coast novice event at Portland recently, suffered a painful injury while practicing on the club's track last week. He hit a rock, took a spill and pinched a hand between the handlebars and the ground and had to have part of his little finger amputated.

Ex-Washington sharpshooter Don Heinrich, former Oregon State linebacker Bill Austin, ex-Washington State star Wayne Berry and former Whitworth fullback Bob Ward will see starting action.

Heinrich and Austin will be in the Giants' starting offensive line-up and Berry will be on the starting defensive unit. Ward is slated to see considerable action as a fullback.

The Packers have an all-veteran backfield this year, headed by quarterback Tobin Rote. Last year the Giants defeated the Packers 38-27 in an exhibition, the only time the teams met in 1954.

KLAMATH FALLS — The Salem Merchants advanced into the fourth round of the annual state women's softball tournament here Friday by scoring two wins, one over defending champion Klamath Falls.

The Merchants, undefeated in three games, met Oswego, paced by former Erv Lind star Thelma Carlson, tonight.

Friday night the Salem girls downed Klamath Falls 7-3 after scoring a 3-1 win over Albany in the afternoon. Oswego advanced with wins over Roseburg, 2-1, and Oakridge, 3-0.

In the afternoon game Marge

Hurley held the Albany team to four hits and Betty Schroeder, who pitched the team's open round win over Rogue River, had a triple, double, and a single.

The Merchants scored a single tally in the first and added two more in the third. The lone Albany run crossed the plate in the seventh.

Last night once again Hurley came through with the win. Klamath Falls went ahead 1-0 in the top of the first but the Salem girls scored three times in the bottom half of the initial inning to take the lead.

But in the top of the sixth Klamath Falls tied the score with a pair of runs. In the bottom half of the inning Salem scored a single run to go ahead and then in the seventh Leona Hass homered with two runners aboard for some insurance runs.
