Dynamic Man To Be Salem U.F. Speaker

Thad McCarty of Oakland, Calif., who will be kickoff speaker at the United Fund's annual luncheon, opening its canvass for \$205,000, is a dynamic leader in his community and an outstanding speaker, says C. A. Kella, secretary of the U.F.

McCarty is a native of Florida and a graduate of the University of Alabama. He is married and has two children. He is president of a company that manufactures a seating posture device.

His activities include presidency of the board of trustees of his church, chairmanship of two successful building fund drives, past presidency of the Oakland Council of Churches, committeeman for the National Conference of Christians and Jews, area warden in civil defense, president of the San Francisco-Oakland Rubber Institute, Salvation Army advisory board, a director of the East Bay Children's Hospital, president Travelers Aid Society of Alameda County, member of the county civil service commission, chairman of the historic committee for Oakland's centennial, a past "man of the year" in Oakland, board member of the Oakland United Fund, co-chairman of the advance gifts department, chairman of the speakers' bureau, campaign chairman and president in different years.

This will not be a dinner meeting but will be held in one of the local school auditoriums to accommodate a much larger crowd. Dr. Durant's visit is to be March 19.

Evacuation Test To Block Traffic

The Portland business district will be closed to vehicular traffic next week during the city's evacuation test, the Oregon Civil Defense agency said Wednesday.

The test, lasting one to two hours, will be held on Sept. 27, 28 or 29.

Motorists headed toward Portland will be given leaflets asking them to stay out of the test area. At more distant points from the city, State Police will distribute maps showing how to by-pass the test area.

More than 200,000 persons will be moved out of the Portland central district during the test.

Three Missing On Auto Trips

SPOKANE, (AP)—Authorities of Washington, Idaho and Montana searched Wednesday for a California rancher unreported since Sept. 12 when he left Yakima, Wash., en route to Kalispell, Mont., for his three children.

Kalispell Sheriff Dick Walsh advised officers here nothing has been heard of Edward W. Plummer, 38, Kelso, Calif., since he left the home of his sister, Mrs. Betty D. Young.

Walsh said Plummer was to drive to the home of his parents in Kalispell to pick up his children and return them to California for the school term.

The sheriff also asked for help in locating a young couple who left Spokane for Hungry Horse, Mont., Aug. 11 and are unreported. Walsh said there has been no word from Mr. and Mrs. Ray Phillips since they left Spokane with their baby to go to Hungry Horse for two other children who had been left with friends.

Mentioning the possibility of "fool play" in the disappearance of Plummer, Walsh said a Spokane man recently was forced off the highway near Libby, Mont., and severely beaten by four men.

Dead Judge's Note Sends Man to Pen

BOSTON (AP)—Anthony Cantilupo was sentenced to prison yesterday to serve a 2½-to-3-year sentence prescribed by a judge who died weeks ago.

Cantilupo, 34, was convicted of slashing a woman's dress in the subway station. Before imposing sentence, Superior Court Justice Frank E. Smith looked over the man's record.

He found this notation, written by the late Chief Justice John P. Higgins, after Cantilupo had been arrested in connection with a similar slashing in 1954.

"If this man is brought back into court or surrendered for any reason, he is to be sentenced to State Prison for 2½ to 3 years."
