OSC Will Try New Surprise For Saturday

Stanford to Be Foe in Portland Night Contest

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis—Oregon State's black-garbed football warriors, who impressed everyone but themselves in last Saturday's 23-0 victory over Brigham Young, will attempt to surprise a favored Stanford night in Portland's Multnomah stadium.

Kickoff time for the 25th renewal of the Stanford-OSC series is 8:30 for 8 p.m., and ticket manager Jim Barratt of Oregon has predicted a crowd of "at least 20,000" for Portland's first college game of the year.

A great deal of interest centered about the Orangemen in their first outing, especially since they sported both a new coaching staff and an offensive formation brand new to Beaver grid fortunes. The 3000 fans who sat on in Parker stadium as the Beavers rolled over BYU were not disappointed.

Bruce to Start
OSC romped to five touchdowns that counted, and three more that were nullified by 13 penalties to the over-eager band. Only one injury resulted from the onslaught, but that one proved crucial to Oregon State. Tailback Joe Francis, the hula-hipped Hawaiian sophomore, sprained an ankle early in the contest, and during the practice week has been almost out of action.

Head coach Tommy Prothro said that he hoped to have Francis in the starting lineup Saturday night, but was making plans in the event the triple-threat was unable to play.

Transfer Bernard Bruce, who ran and passed for 90 yards against the Cougars, will move into the top spot with fullback Lamar Zachary, being groomed for possible fullback duty. Also Ray Westfall, who didn't even suit up for the game, may be back in harness. Westfall was No. 2 quarterback last year's 7-0 triumph. Beavers, who can handle all three departments, run, pass and kick.

Few chances
Prothro said that he contemplated few changes if any in the lineup that started against BYU. That lineup had Dan Narasimhan and Norm Thiel at ends; Howard Boettgenbach and John Wilt at tackles; Bob Riggert and Vern Kilson at guards; and Larry Stevens at center. Don Spiegel is slated to open at quarterback. Francis, Bruce and Sam Wesley at fullbacks, and Tom Berry at tailback.

Reserve tickets at \$2.50 remained on sale at all Beaver ticket agencies, and Barratt said that plenty of good seats remained.

A Willamette graduate, he should be remembered for his placing second in the two-mile event at the Northwest Conference in 1954. While at Stanford he took track courses from Stanford coach Frank Weierhauser.

Mrs. Fisk Wins Opening Match

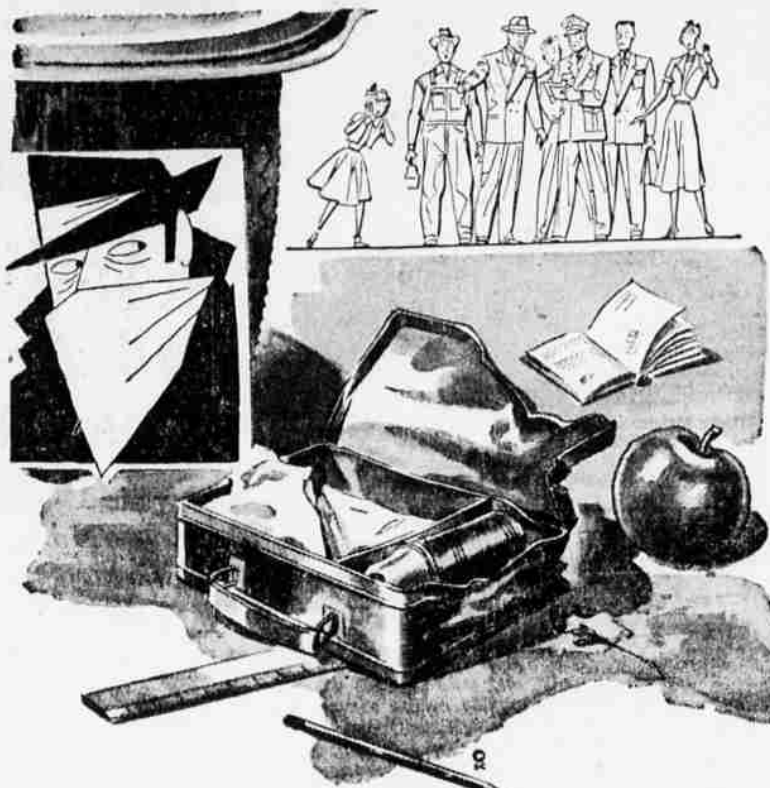
