

High Court Affirms Award to Defunct Firm's Stockholders

The Oregon Supreme Court today affirmed a Multnomah County Circuit Court decree awarding Marjorie Ladd Barnes and certain other stockholders of the defunct Eastern and Western Lumber Co. a judgment against four of the officers and directors of \$352,496.

The judgment in addition allowed interest from Oct. 23, 1945 and for further sums representing dividends and interest.

The Supreme Court, in another opinion held that Multnomah county lawfully assessed personal and property taxes upon machinery and equipment in the Reynolds Aluminum Company's Troutdale plant for the tax year 1950-51.

The company contended that the value of its personal property should not have been placed on the assessment roll as of Jan. 1, 1950, as it did not complete acquisition of the property until after that date.

However, the company had accepted in December, 1949, a so-called letter of intent from the U.

Mrs. A. R. Tartar, who has more than 120 varieties of old roses at her home on Garden Road, discussed the flowers.

Timber Sale Hearings Set

OREGON CITY — The Pacific Northwest's November hearings on federal timber sales policies will be a joint House-Senate affair, Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore) said here Wednesday.

He said he had just learned that the House Government Affairs Subcommittee on Natural Resources had arranged to join with the Senate Interior Subcommittee. The schedule has been revised, he said, the meetings running from Nov. 14 at Redding, Calif., through Dec. 2 at Spokane.

Speaking at the Rotary Club luncheon here, Neuberger said it would be the "first full dress congressional hearing conducted on this vital issue in the field for many years."

He said the hearings were necessary because of an impending "crisis" in the lumber industry in which many locally owned mills would be forced to close unless federal timber became available to small operators.

The hearing schedule, Redding, Calif., Nov. 14; Klamath Falls, Nov. 15; Medford, Nov. 16; Roseburg, Nov. 17; Eugene, Nov. 18; Seattle, Nov. 21-22; Aberdeen, Nov. 23; Stevenson, Nov. 25; Portland, Nov. 28, 29, 30; Spokane Dec. 1-2.

Couple Fined For Obeying Court Order

PORTLAND — Circuit Judge Virgil Langtry said Wednesday a Clarkston, Wash., couple had been fined \$250 at Astoria for obeying an order of his court. "It's a flagrant miscarriage of justice," he said.

It happened after the couple, Mr. and Mrs. Smith, got temporary custody of Willis Lester Russell Jr., 2, who was a ward of the court here.

They took him to their home after, Langtry said, promising to return the child when the child's father came up for trial on a charge of beating it with intent to kill.

They did return the child, but before that the child's mother filed a custody suit at Clarkston and Judge Thomas G. Jordan of Astoria County, Wash., ordered the child kept in that state.

Langtry said Judge Jordan fined the couple \$250 for contempt for bringing the child here. Langtry said he couldn't understand why and "it's terribly hard on the Smiths who were merely acting in good faith." The child is their nephew.

The father was acquitted of the assault charge last week.

First Treatment of Lakes Set Sept. 28

PORTLAND — The State Game Commission said Tuesday that rehabilitation of Thompson Valley reservoir as a fishing site would start Sept. 28 with rotenone treatment of the 600-acre water area.

This is one of five bodies of water to be rehabilitated this year. The others are Lake of the Woods, and Malheur, Warm Springs and Beulah reservoirs.

All will be restocked with rainbow trout after about three months.
