Pair Nabbed For Attacking Girl, Age 13

Officers from the Marion County sheriff's office and the Salem police department were in Roseburg today to take custody of two men charged with the criminal attack of a 13-year-old Salem girl.

Daniel Haller, 19, and Arthur Davis Huddleston, 24, were arrested by Douglas County sheriff's deputies Tuesday shortly after the Marion County sheriff's office notified the Douglas authorities that the two men were believed to be on a bus traveling from Albany to California.

The two men were accused of attacking the girl September 10 after they induced her to enter their auto near the Salem by-pass as the girl was returning home from a movie.

The young men were learned to have embarked on the bus after police questioned Fred V. Fowler, 27, of 473 Washington street, who police said admitted taking the two men to Albany to catch a bus.

Fowler was detained by police for questioning after he was observed entering Huddleston's car which had been left in Salem. Police had established a "stake out" on the car earlier Tuesday after it was located near Airport Road.

Bail was set at \$5,000 on each of the accused.

This message, Life relates, reported that German Gestapo chief Heinrich Himmler had notified the Swedish Red Cross that Hitler was dying of a brain hemorrhage. Himmler proposed to surrender German forces on the Western front to Gen. Eisenhower while continuing the war against Russia on the Eastern front.

Truman replied, "I think he (Himmler) should be forced to surrender to all three governments, Russia, you and the United States. I don't think we ought to consider a piece-meal surrender."

Churchill agreed and the two sent substantially the same messages to Stalin to inform him of Himmler's offer and their decision.

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with an administrative credential becoming mandatory as of July 1, 1956 for all Oregon school administrators.

Requirements for these credentials entail preparation over and beyond that required of teachers both in kind and amount, and much of it at the graduate level, Putnam said.

Earl Pallett, secretary of the Board of Higher Education, gave a report showing that the supply of elementary and secondary teachers had increased since the wide distribution of training facilities in state institutions was effected in 1953.

At that time the state legislature extended teacher training for elementary teachers to the University of Oregon, Oregon State college and Portland State college in addition to the three colleges of education which had been the sole source of elementary teacher training in state institutions.

Secondary teacher training which had been confined to only Oregon State College and the University of Oregon was extended to Oregon College of Education, Southern Oregon College of Education, Eastern Oregon College of Education and Portland State.

The report submitted by Secretary Pallett showed that in 1952 a total of 490 elementary teachers were certified from the three colleges of education while in 1953 a total of 677 were certified. It is estimated that in 1954 625 elementary teachers will be certified from the six institutions and 761 in 1955.

While the program of high school teacher training has not been in effect at the colleges of education long enough to show any material effect as yet, the increase in this category was made by University of Oregon. In the case of the university, certification of secondary teachers grew from 245 in 1952 to 300 in 1955.

Travis Cross, assistant to the chancellor, furnished some slides prepared by the American Association of Collegiate Registrars showing the enrollment tidal wave in the elementary schools throughout the nation, caused by the huge increase in births during the depression years.

This tidal wave, as depicted by the slides, is already reaching the high schools and will in a few years rush into the institutions of higher learning, with the result that enrollments in such institutions will in many cases be double the present enrollment and in the majority cases predict increases of from 30 to 60 per cent.

Fritz had been held in the Soledad prison in California since his apprehension in June.

Teacher Shortage Results in Granting of Temporary Permits

Faced with what was described as "an acute teacher shortage" the state Board of Education Wednesday approved 18 temporary teacher certificates, the majority of individuals teaching in remote sections of the state.

In all cases the request for the temporary permits came from local school authorities in

half of individuals who had not sufficient academic credits to warrant a permanent teaching certificate.

However, local school authorities in each case appealed to the board on the grounds that it had been impossible to obtain the services of certificated teachers and unless the temporary permits were granted, the operation of the schools would be upset.

Freshman registration at the Oregon Technical Institute at Klamath Falls showed a large increase at the opening of the fall term, it was reported at the meeting. On the second day of registration 500 freshmen registered as compared to 381 on the second day of the fall term a year ago.

The board approved appointments of four vocational rehabilitation counselors requested by C. F. Feike, director of the vocational rehabilitation program in the state. The four were Ron Hammett, Charles D. Anderson, E. Kirk Brunton and Herbert S. Schnare.

Appointments to the state advisory committee for the Oregon Technical Institute approved by the board included the following: Glenn Sands, Echo, of the Oregon Farm Bureau, representing the public; Dan Krotz, Eagle Point, Veterans of Foreign Wars; Harley Libbey, Jefferson, Oregon State Farmers Union; Mrs. Leigh Gustison, Medford, Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers; and Al Teller, Portland, Oregon Building Congress.

A new dormitory at the Institute was named Buchanan Hall in memory of the late Maurice Buchanan, who served as assistant supervisor at the Klamath Falls Institute. William R. Morris, former assistant supervisor of the department of education, was appointed to fill the position formerly held by Mr. Buchanan.

Appeal Notice By Loder Bros.

Notice of appeal of a Marion County Circuit Court decision which denied an injunction to halt picketing in front of their business was filed today by Loder Brothers.

The Salem automobile firm had attempted to get an injunction against Lodge 1505, International Association of Machinists, and its officers and the Salem Trades and Labor Council and its officers to halt the picketing.

The injunction was denied by Circuit Judge Val Sloper on August 4.

There has been picketing of the Loder Brothers business by the machinists union since about November 15, 1954.

To Agriculture Dept.

Don L. Parker, with the attorney general's office on assignment to the State Industrial Accident Commission for the last seven years, was transferred this week to the State Department of Agriculture as attorney.
