SCANDINAVIAN WAFERS

Ingredients: 2½ cups sifted flour, ½ teaspoon baking powder, ½ teaspoon baking soda, ¼ teaspoon salt, ½ teaspoon cinnamon, ½ teaspoon nutmeg, ¼ teaspoon ginger, ¼ teaspoon allspice, ¼ teaspoon cloves, ½ cup (¼ pound) margarine, ½ cup firmly packed light brown sugar, ½ cup dark corn syrup, ¼ cup buttermilk.

Method: Sift together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger, allspice and cloves. Stir margarine, brown sugar and corn syrup together in a saucepan over low heat until sugar dissolves; bring to a boil; boil 3 minutes; cool until syrup mixture is warm to the touch. Add sifted dry ingredients and buttermilk alternately to syrup mixture. Turn out onto waxed paper and pat into a flat layer; cover and place in refrigerator freezing compartment until stiff enough to handle. Use floured pastry cloth with floured stockinette covered rolling pin; roll out ¼ of dough at a time very thin—less than ¼ inch. Cut out with round 2½-inch cookie cutter. Place 1 inch apart on greased baking sheets; bake in moderate (375 degrees) oven until wafers are well browned all over—8 to 12 minutes. Remove to cooling racks with spatula.
