Class Work, Activities Follow Annual Pledging

The convention thought is from the text, Luke 17:6, in an urge to: "Increase Our Faith."

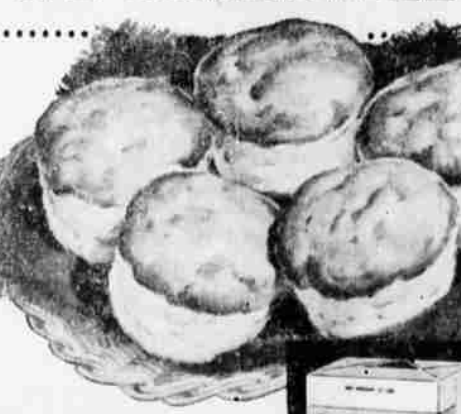

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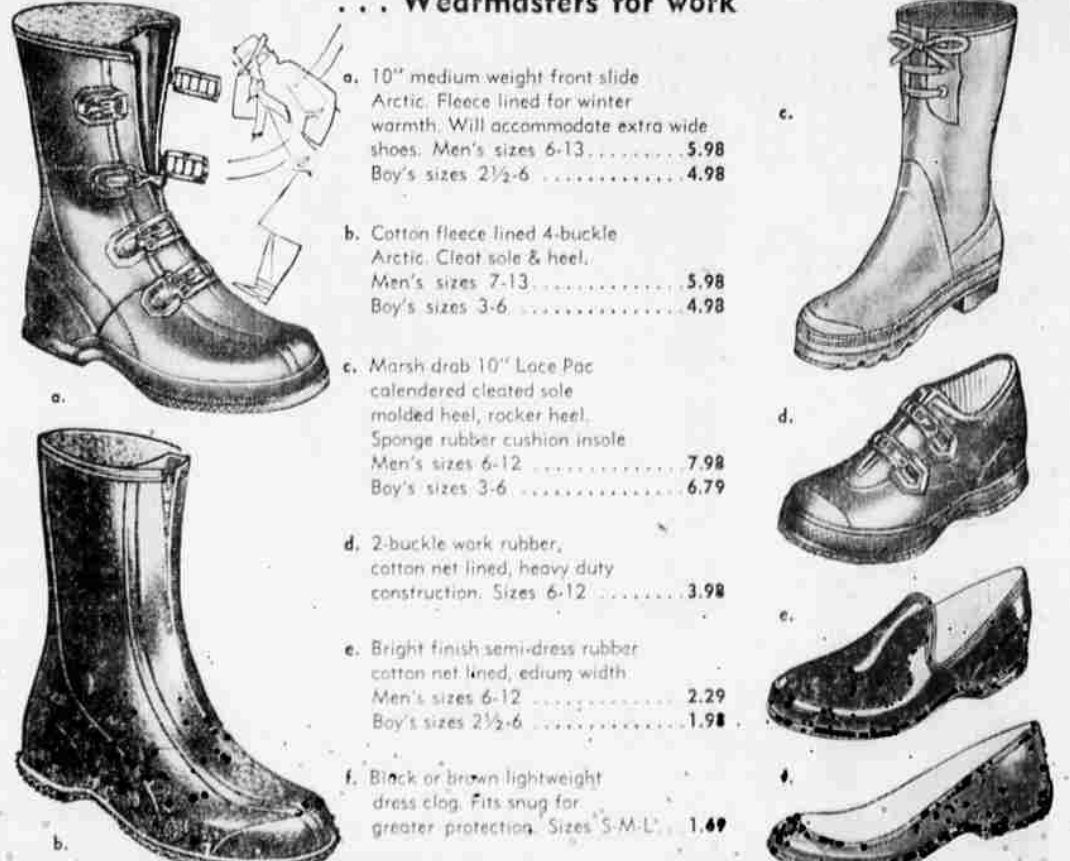
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
