Planners Take Stand for Conventional Sidewalks

Strong opposition to curb sidewalks was voiced by the Salem Planning Commission Tuesday night as it advised and sent to the City Council a report urging the council to establish a standard policy of placing sidewalks one foot outside the property line.

The commission further recommended that sidewalks be constructed at the time of a street improvement and be made a part of the assessment. A delay in building sidewalks was suggested until 25 per cent of the lots fronting upon the street in a given block have been improved.

A variance to the policy of no curb sidewalks was favored only when the topographical conditions made improvement costs unreasonable.

The commission action came after its street committee had made a study of a City Council ordinance bill which would permit curb sidewalks in the East Englewood area.

Reasons Listed
Five reasons were cited why a policy against the construction of curb sidewalks should be adopted. These reasons include difficulty of widening the streets in the future because property owners have a false sense of ownership in the strip between the property line and sidewalk; additional cost to taxpayers when widening becomes necessary; tendency to shut off street intersections by planting hedges and evergreens in the right of way thereby creating traffic hazards; children running off the sidewalks directly into the street and developers of property outside the city would not recognize building setback requirements in anticipation of such a policy when the area is annexed into the city.

The commission recommendations will now go to the City Council which will consider the ordinance bill to permit the curb sidewalks in the East Englewood district.

Hearing Previously Held

The ordinance was drawn up after a public hearing was held by the council to determine the wish of the residents of the area. At that time many of the residents asked that curb sidewalks be allowed in the area.

In other action the commission favored changing the zoning of a portion of four lots on Bellevue Street between Winter and Summer Streets from R-4 to C-3 zone.

EAA to Study Salem Tower

Official Tells Norblad Air Traffic Survey To Be Made

While commerce is being withheld on the re-establishment of a tower at the Salem airport it is apparently being given consideration.

Rep. Walter Norblad has been informed by P. D. Lee, administrator of the Civil Aeronautics Authority, Washington, D. C., that a traffic survey is to be made here.

The letter to Rep. Norblad reads: "Reference is made to your

letter of August 29, 1955, enclosing a clipping and a photograph of a recent accident at Salem, Oregon, and requesting that steps be taken to re-establish tower service at Salem.

"Although we must withhold any comment as to the possible cause of the accident until after the investigation has been completed, we have requested our Los Angeles regional office to conduct a traffic survey at Salem as soon as possible.

"We will advise you further when the results of the traffic survey have been received."

19th Century Art Accepted

Featuring the meeting of Salem Art Association this week was acceptance of two works of art from the 19th century.

One is a bronze statue of a youth representing Cupid, cast about 1875 by the sculptor, J. Coutin of Rome. It was given by an anonymous donor, the gift arranged through Thomas Colt of the Portland Art Museum.

The other gift is a large oil painting called LaCulla by Robert Herdman of the Royal Scottish Academy, painted about 1885. It will replace the "Descent from the Cross" which was hung at the rear of the main hall at Bush House on loan. Both paintings are from the collection of George Guthrie.

During August, 818 attended visiting days and special events at Bush House. Of this total, 161 came the day of the Art Fair, August 27. This function brought in \$150 for the Salem Art Association.

The annual fall membership rate reduction is now on, the membership committee reported. Under this policy, new memberships from November 1, 1955 to December 31, 1955 will be \$3.50 instead of the regular \$5.

Current shows at the museum are the non-objective paintings of Louis Buncie, the picture of the month by Nadine Nunn and the pitcher collection. After October 10, the Buncie show will be succeeded by an exhibition of another Portland artist, John Waddingham.

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
