4 Starters Become Questionmarks Saturday

Question marks hang heavily over Coach Ted T. Ogdahl today as he meditates on his list of "borderline injuries," hampering the Willamette Bearcats.

Since Ogdahl is the football coach, bumps, bruises and sprains are things he has to live with and today he has four would-be starters on the question mark list for Saturday night's game here against Pacific.

The trend, though, is toward having a full strength squad for the Bearcats' second Northwest conference game. End Dean Benson was practicing Thursday despite a three-week-old fracture of a foot bone, having it well-padded. He will see some action.

Coates Injured—Guard Vern Coates, who jammed his neck in scrimmage this week, will be replaced by Chuck Koani when the opening whistle toots. Bobby Zoelch, perennial starting halfback, has a bruised arm but should be in there running around. If not, a freshman flanker, Jerry again, will be in there, a lad who has been out with a hip injury.

Fourth starter mentioned is Gerry Kangas, end who injured a knee at College of Idaho. In his place will be Keith Harris, formerly a reserve quarterback. Jermy McCallister, once an end who passed so well against the Coyotes, now occupies the reserve quarterback.

French passes well and always has the running threat offered by Bobby Galyas, 150-pound junior from Perth Amboy, N.J. Galyas won the conference 100-yard dash last spring in 9.9, which indicates his breakaway ability.

Miami Favored To Beat TCU—MIAMI, Fla. (UP)—One of the big questions of the current football season may be answered tonight when the University of Miami entertains Texas Christian University before 45,000 or more fans in the Orange Bowl.

The question: Why has Miami, winner of only one in three games, been favored over TCU by three to six points when the Texans have won four of five against respectable opposition?

Miami lost to Georgia Tech in Atlanta 14-6, trounced Florida State 34-0, then was blanked by Notre Dame 14-0.

The Texans whipped Kansas 47-14, Texas Tech 32-0, Arkansas 26-0, and Alabama 21-0, before falling to Texas A&M last Saturday in a 19-16 thriller.

TURNER MEETS YOUNG CUBAN—NEW YORK (UP)—Isaac Lagart, a 22-year-old lightweight who comes from Kid Gavilan's home province of Camaguey and hopes to follow in his countryman's footsteps, makes the jump to the big time tonight against experienced Gil Turner at Madison Square Garden.

The young Cuban, latest idol of the metropolitan area's Latin-American set, is a 5-5 underdog. NBC will broadcast and telecast the 10-rounder at 9 p.m. EST.

PCC Football in Backstretch; 3 League Clashes Scheduled

Stanford-Huskies Game Feature Attraction

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS—West Coast football moves into the back stretch of the 1955 race this weekend with Pacific Coast Conference action taking the spotlight from inter-sectional activity for the first time.

Three conference clashes are on the Saturday slate and two have a definite bearing on the championship. A pair of inter-sectional and a backyard battle between two strong independents wrap up the mid-October schedule.

The top PCC tilt match Stanford against Washington at Seattle and Southern California against California at Berkeley. The third pair Washington State and Oregon State at Corvallis.

As usual, a Friday night game at Los Angeles puts the show on the road. Friday night's clash between UCLA and Iowa once was billed as a possible Rose Bowl preview. But the Big Ten Hawkeyes have been a disappointment.

Oregon goes to Arizona for a Saturday night non-conference contest and San Jose State entertains arch-rival College of the Pacific. Idaho, beaten five straight times, has an open date.

Stanford vs. Huskies—Stanford, still seeking its first conference win, will throw the best passing offense against the Huskies' second best aerial defense. The Indians have averaged 129 yards a game overhead while Washington has limited its foes to a modest 76. The Huskies, with sophomore Sandy Lederman reinstated as second-string quarterback, need a fourth triumph to remain deadlocked with UCLA for the league lead.

Third-running Southern California presumably gets a soft touch in California. The young Bears, who looked to be improving, slumped to a 21-0 shutout by Oregon last week while the Trojans were belting Wisconsin. The only hope at Berkeley was that the team would become fired up by campus criticism of Coach Pappy Waldorf and the squad.

Neither Washington State nor Oregon State has a finger in the title action, but both are eager for a second conference triumph and the game should be close.

OREGON NEEDS WIN—UCLA, scored by a second-half Stanford spurge a week ago, is expected to go all-out against the Hawkeyes, who have been clubbed by Wisconsin and tied by Purdue in Big Ten play. A Bruin win would give the PCC a 4-2 holge over Big Ten opposition. Oregon needs a victory over Arizona to maintain over-all inter-sectional superiority for the Coast. In 17 games, PCC teams have won only eight.

Sequeira Ranks 4th In Net Yards Gained

Holt 2nd Among N.W. League Passers

Windy Sequeira, Willamette university halfback, ranks fourth this week in net yards gained in Northwest conference statistics and second in yards-per-carry.

The snar from the Hawaiian Islands has gained 222 yards for an average of 7.9 in four games. Willamette, College of Idaho and Lewis & Clark have reported three games. Linfield five, Pacific three and Whitman two.

Gary Collins of C. of I. has most net yards, 384, while Mel Gillette of L. & C. has 344 yards. Gillette averages 10.1 yards per carry.

Tom Parrish of Linfield has gained 28 yards by passing, far in front of second place Benny Holt of Willamette, with 16. Best completion percentage is by Gil Robinson of Whitman, .835.

Collins also leads in punting, with an average of 26.3. Scoring leader is Gene Flippin of Lewis & Clark, 36, just ahead of Collins' 35.
