

### Holt Pays for Irish Nurse's Global Flight

PORTLAND (AP)—Irish Kathleen Cowan has the gratitude of Oregon farm Harry Holt. He gave her an airplane trip around the world.

The Irish born missionary nurse helped Holt shepherd 12 tiny orphans from Korea to foster homes in the United States. They arrived here last week.

Holt and his wife took eight of the orphans into their roomy Creswell, Ore., farm home, adding them to their family of six. The other four went to three families in Oregon, Texas and Michigan.

From the time Holt went to Korea in April to adopt eight orphans Mrs. Cowan helped him. When the time was set for the return trip she flew along to help care for the children, none older than three. She saved her vacation to make the trip after four years in the Far East.

"Because Mr. Holt wanted to do something nice for me," she said, "he bought me a round the world plane ticket."

A Portland air line office said a ticket around the world would cost about \$1,700 on a first class flight.

The nurse will go back to Korea where she works for the Northern Presbyterian Mission in Korea and World Vision, Inc., a philanthropic organization.

But she'll stop off along the way to visit her parents in Belfast, Ireland. She expects to leave from Seattle next week.

New chairman of the Salem Boy Scout district is E. W. Rector, Salem public accountant, who was elected Wednesday night.

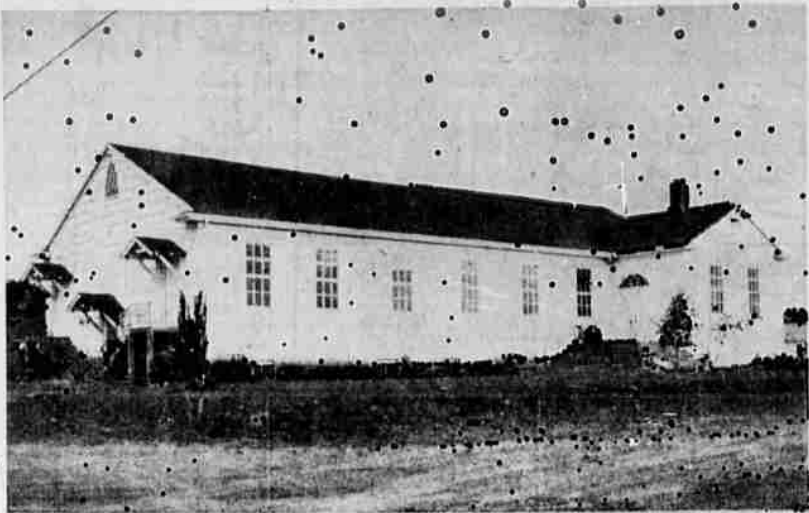
He is to appoint operating committees for the district.

### Dedication Services Sunday At Keizer Community Church

Plans for a new church building, started back in 1947, will be realized Sunday at 3 p.m. when dedication services for the new Keizer Community Church will be held in the new building at Commercial and Elizabeth streets.

Rev. Robert Goertz will speak at the dedicatory service at which all friends and members are invited to inspect the new facilities.

Church members first constructed a basement which was completed in January, 1949. Since that time they have held services in the basement, adding to the upstairs portion each year. The property is now valued at more than \$35,000.

The present Keizer Community Church was formed in 1945 and is operated entirely by its membership, which now numbers over 200. Seventeen teachers, besides officers, are used in the Sunday school department.

The new structure has 3600 square feet of floor-space in addition to the basement. Of particular interest is the church auditorium, which is finished in mahogany with other furniture to match. Plans call for completion of landscaping and a curb sidewalk around the street side of the grounds.

Hagen First Minister The building program was not without its setbacks though. Construction was hampered during the winter of 1948 when the first basement walls, not properly reinforced, caved in. After they (the church) made sure of the cement work, first services were able to be held in the basement portion on January 23, 1949.

Lyle R. Hagen was first minister for the then-named American Sunday School union, which was changed to the present name in 1945. He was followed by Loyal Vickers, who in turn was followed to the pulpit by Rev. Jesse W. Baker.

In March, 1943, Peter J. Becker took over as representative of the American Sunday School union.

He was replaced in 1945 by Rev. David Hamm and his wife Evelyn, who now are in missionary work in Chile. In early 1947, Lee Wans accepted the ministry and filled this position until June, 1952. The present church was started while he was in charge.

### Factory Has Open House

LEBANON—Open house is being held all day Friday and until noon Saturday at the Willamette Fibre and Chip Board plant which has recently expanded and modernized its operation.

The plant is located on highway 20, 10 miles southeast of Lebanon near Sweet Home. The operation is producing a board of multiple uses, such as roof sheathing, interior walls, floors, ceilings and furniture. It machines well and has been used in squares to create a tile effect.

At the open-house, visitors will see the new office building which is constructed of this material known as Rezwod. It is made of waste materials. Plant processes also will be seen and refreshments served.
