Church Opens Fund Campaign With Dinner

Presbyterians Told of Building and Campaign Plans

The largest congregational dinner in the history of Salem's First Presbyterian church heard their \$300,000 building fund campaign explained Sunday afternoon at an affair that was postponed from Thursday evening on account of the weather last week.

The group dined in the two cafeteria dining rooms in the new South Salem high school. Then tables were removed and the entire group met in one room for the several talks. More than 100 church women had telephoned the entire congregation Thursday after the postponement was decided upon. Only four cars showed up that night, so thorough had the check been.

Arthur Bates, chairman of the campaign, explained how it will be conducted. An advance gifts committee of 50 men will try to secure pledges for about two thirds of the amount from some 200 families. The entire committee for the solicitation will comprise approximately 200 persons.

"If you want to know how much you should give no one will tell you," Bates said. "This is up to you. You know best. And this won't be a high pressure solicitation."

Charles A. Sprague, chairman of the building council which with its sub-committees is helping the architects plan the new structure, told of progress in this work, but he said no one knows yet what the church will look like. The planning hasn't gone that far. Stanton, Bowles, Maguire and Church of Portland are the architects. Stanton helped plan the present building at Winter and Chemeketa back in the twenties, which has been sold to the state.

Other speakers were Robert Ellstrom, chairman of advanced gifts; Mrs. Arthur Bone, who told

of the special interest of the women in the new church; Nancy Weeks and Allan Stevens Jr. spoke the interest of the youth of the church. Dr. Paul Poling, pastor, was the master of ceremonies and gave the prayer.

The church has more than \$270,000 in liquid assets derived from the sale of the present structure to the state, together with ground in the east half of the nearby block bounded by Chemeketa, Cottage, Court and Winter streets, in which the new church will be built. Whether it will face Court on old Bishop property bought from Willamette Univ. or face Chemeketa or Winter from northeast corner of the block has not yet been decided. The church owns, clear of debt, ground that cost it approximately \$140,000. It expects to erect a new building that with furnishings will cost near \$600,000.

The advanced gifts committee has scheduled its first meeting Wednesday evening, after which active solicitation is expected to begin. Charles Crist of the firm of Marts and Lunedy of New York will direct the campaign.

Driver Slightly Injured When Car Drags Him

OREGON CITY (AP) — Tony E. Warre suffered only minor injuries despite falling out of a fast-moving automobile, being dragged 50 feet, and then being run over at the neck by a rear wheel.

The 27-year-old Estacada man was on his feet and walking when police arrived to investigate. They sent him to a hospital for treatment of cuts, bruises and possible rib fractures.

George Hull, 17, a passenger, said that Warre was driving the car about 70 miles an hour when the door flew open and Warre fell part way out.

The car left the road, plowed into a 50-foot hedge, and then stopped against the front porch of a house. The house was not damaged seriously.

3 Disgruntled Generals Held In Argentina

Tank, Armored Car on Guard at Government House

BUENOS AIRES (AP) — The Argentine government of Provisional President Pedro Aramburu moved into its second week today with an apparent drive under way to nip any plots by disgruntled generals.

A tank and an armored car took up positions behind the government house after authoritative reports that the new regime had put "out of circulation" three of Argentina's best known generals. These reports said the government planned to ease a fourth officer out of the country with an ambassadorship.

The tank and armored car, bristling machine guns and cannon, were the only extraordinary security measures evident, however.

The new government hurled its first major obstacle last week in crushing a last-ditch general strike called by the old Peronista leadership of the General Confederation of Labor.

Aramburu and his associates apparently were moving just as forcefully to assure control of the army.

Authoritative sources said Gen. Leon Justo Bengoa and Gen. Juan Jose Uranga were arrested by soldiers yesterday. They said Lt. Gen. Julio A. Lagos, army commander in chief, had been "convinced" that he should ask for retirement.

It also was reported that Gen. Dalmiro Videla Balaguer, present federal administrator of Cordoba province, might be named ambassador to Italy.

All four men were leaders in the September revolt which ousted Juan D. Peron as president. Bengoa was named army minister after the revolt but quit the post Nov. 9, four days before the Aramburu forces seized control and forced Provisional President Eduardo Lonardi out.
