They Say Today

QUOTES FROM THE BY UNITED PRESS

BALTIMORE, Md. — Gov. Theodore R. McKeldin on desegregation of the Maryland National Guard, the first such action by any state south of the Mason-Dixon Line: "We will no longer keep negroes out of white units or whites out of Negro units. They will serve in the same units, effective immediately. I don't think we'll have any trouble."

LONDON — Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont) on the 1956 presidential race: "As I'm a Democrat, I think that Mr. Stevenson is the outstanding candidate — and Sen. (Estes) Kefauver is likely to be vice president."

NEW DELHI, India — Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru on India's foreign policy at a banquet honoring Soviet Premier Nikolai A. Bulganin and Communist Party chief Nikita S. Khrushchev: "If peace is sought after, it has to be by the methods of peace and the language of peace and good will."

WASHINGTON — Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass) on his attack against the McCarran-Walter Immigration Act: "Regarded as an affront to the entire world by leaders of every major religious group, this formula disregards one of the fundamental prepositions upon which this nation is founded — all men are created equal."

WASHINGTON — Republican National Chairman Leonard W. Hall on Adlai Stevenson's first speech as a 1956 Democratic presidential candidate: "The people know he is talking bunk. We note that he has taken up Harry Truman's line on special interests, but is silent on the corrupt forces that infested the Fair Deal."

TOKYO — Japan's Prime Minister Hatogiyama resigned Monday along with his 16-member cabinet. But he's expected to be back in office Tuesday. The 72-year-old premier stepped down to pave the way for a reshuffling of the cabinet. The new members will be chosen from the new Liberal Democratic Party, formed last week.

Tabloid Scolds Actresses for Baring Necks Before Royalty

LONDON — The tabloid Daily Mirror Monday delivered a frontal attack on pretty film stars who sport plunging necklines before Britain's royal family.

"The bare fact is," said the paper, which claims a daily circulation of about 4 1/2 million, "that film stars' necklines at these royal functions are sagging daringly below the Pimms line of modesty."

"The Pimms line is a mark prominently painted on a vessel's hull to show how deepy she may be loaded."

The Mirror, usually not adverse to publishing pictures of a shapeless figure, pointed an editorial finger at two of the country's cutest cuties, blonde Diana Dors — Britain's answer to Marilyn Monroe — and pert-nosed Jackie Lane, both of whom recently appeared before members of the royal family in extremely low cut evening gowns.

Jackie showed up before the Duke of Edinburgh, husband of Queen Elizabeth II, at a movie premier last week wearing the most daring dress of the season — one that opened down the front from her neck to her trim waist.

"The loose laced bodice of her dress gaped open and downwards into a startling revelation of the bosom," said The Mirror.

Ten days earlier Miss Dors appeared at a "royal command" film performance and was presented to the Queen and the Duke.

"Her high and mighty bosom," said The Mirror, "was so amply displayed one feared she could easily burst out—laughing."

The Mirror added: "Royal premiers are now occasions for highly competitive double exposures, where a deep breath is dangerous, a curtsy a disaster."

Fire Destroys Hubbard Mill

HUBBARD—Fire of undetermined origin Saturday night destroyed Roy's Feed and Supply Mill here at an estimated total loss of \$30,000.

The store was operated by Roy Houghman whose stock of an estimated \$10,000 value was covered by insurance, the building was owned by Dr. Todd Gilmore of Portland. It has been estimated it would cost \$20,000 to replace the building.

High lines of the Portland General Electric near the mill were cut by crewmen, plunging Hubbard into darkness for three quarters of an hour.

Firemen from Woodburn responded to the call for help from Hubbard department. A freight train passing through Hubbard at the time of the fire delayed the fire truck for a matter of five minutes, Fire Chief Clarence Friend said.

The fire was discovered by Roland Houghman, brother of the operator, who had just arrived from Eureka, Calif., for a visit.
