

Ex-Con Hunted For Killing of Four-Year-Old

Note Claims Child Was Victim of Accident On Swing

WEST GREENWICH, R. I. (AP)—Police today were seeking an ex-convict in the death of 4-year-old Deborah Conlon, whose bedsheet-wrapped body was found in a shed Saturday.

A murder warrant was sworn out for William H. Crough, 29, of Waltham, Mass. Police said he has a "long prison record," including a six-year Massachusetts prison term for armed robbery.

The child, one of three children of Mrs. Beatrice Conlon, 30-year-old divorcee, died of internal injuries. It was reported by Medical Examiner Arthur E. O'Lea.

Mrs. Conlon said Crough, also divorced, had been staying with her and her children. She added that they planned to marry in January.

Police said a note was found near the child's body in the shed back of her home. They said it told that the child was hurt in an accident on a swing and that Crough tried to revive the child believe him because of his police record.

The note added, police said, that Crough tried to revive the child but gave up when he realized she was dead.

State police found the child's body during a search after Mrs. Conlon reported her missing on her return home Friday from her job as a waitress.

Ike's Gettysburg Neighbors Settle Back to Normalcy

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP)—After a rousing reception for President Eisenhower, the citizens of Gettysburg have settled once more into the "business as usual" attitude they have maintained toward the President since he purchased his farm here.

Satisfied by the hale appearance of the President at the official reception, Gettysburgians seem determined to permit him the privacy he needs to continue his march back to good health. As a result, when the President comes down to his office in the Gettysburg post office, little knots of people gather discreetly on the street to view the proceedings. Rarely are there more than twenty or thirty townspeople in the area.

There is, however, an air of excitement in this battlefield town. Gettysburgians are elated that President and Mrs. Eisenhower returned here for his convalescence. His health is the main topic of conversation, and there is continued speculation about the length of his stay.

The distinguished visitors to the President's farm draw some curious spectators to the airport. But the routine which brings such government leaders as Secretary of State Dulles, Presidential Assistant Sherman Adams, Gen. Alfred Gruenther and others here has become matter of fact.

One center of attention is the White House press headquarters in the converted auditorium of the Hotel Gettysburg. Presidential Press Secretary James Hagerty has permitted visitors to view the press area outside conference periods and most citizens have taken advantage of the opportunity.

On the whole, Gettysburgians are trying to insure by their quiet cooperation that the emergency White House operations will run as smoothly as possible.

Smith to Become Acting Governor

Oregon Senate President Elmo Smith is due to arrive in Salem Tuesday from John Day to serve as acting governor during the absence of Gov. Paul L. Patterson.

Gov. Patterson will be out of the state attending a national meeting of municipal officials, agenda of which will include him as a speaker. Mrs. Patterson will accompany the governor.

Maryland Bans Segregation in National Guard

Gov. McKeldin Issues Abolition Order to Commander

BALTIMORE (AP)—Segregation was on its way out in the Maryland National Guard today after an abolition order by Gov. Theodore R. McKeldin.

Maj. Gen. Milton A. Reckord, adjutant general of the state unit, said he would "issue the proper directives" today to carry out the governor's order.

McKeldin instructed Reckord to "initiate without delay all such steps as are necessary to bring an end to racial segregation in the organization of the Maryland National Guard."

Guard officials said Maryland is the first Southern state to drop racial barriers in its military service.

A group of 15 Negro officers who formerly served in the Maryland Guard recently announced plans to ask a Federal District Court ruling against Guard segregation.

The Negroes said they were integrated with regular Army units while serving in Korea but preferred to remain on inactive duty upon returning home rather than rejoin segregated Guard outfits.

McKeldin's directive said, "The awaiting of court action would result only in an unnecessary delay."

About 150 Negroes in two all-Negro transportation units in Baltimore will be affected immediately by the order. The units are the only Negro components of the state Guard's 28 units.

Col. Liles on Trial for Aid To Foe as PW.

FT. LEWIS, Wash. (AP)—A 12-man military board convened here Monday to hear testimony in the court martial of a West Point graduate accused of collaborating with the enemy while a prisoner of war in Korea.

Lt. Col. Paul V. Liles, 38, of Birmingham, Ala., said in a pre-trial interview he would plead innocent.

Liles, now a special service officer here, was captured by the Chinese Communists Oct. 28, 1950, and was eased more than two years ago.

He is accused of advising prisoners to give military information to the enemy to avoid being starved, and of taking part in Communist indoctrination and propaganda programs and making disloyal statements.

Some 80 witnesses will testify at the trial which the Army said would last about a month.

FETE POLIO VICTIM

MOLALLA—Paul Holman, confined in Veterans hospital with polio, was brought home for the weekend, with a birthday dinner party the highlight of the weekend.

His birthday was Friday when his wife, his mother and father-in-law Art Husbands, drove to the hospital with gifts and words of cheer. For the past two or three weekends, Holman has been brought home to be with his family, returning Sundays so that his treatments may not be missed. Members of both families gathered for the birthday dinner.

Ex-Card Held In Murder of Mother-in-Law

TAVERNIER, Fla. (AP)—Conklyn Meriwether, 37-year-old carpenter and former baseball player, was held without bond today in the hatchet slaying of his paralyzed mother-in-law and the wounding of two other persons.

Meriwether, who was on the St. Louis Cardinals roster in 1946, was taken to the Monroe County Jail at Key West after the killing in his modest bungalow home at Tavernier yesterday afternoon. No charges have been filed.

Pence Justice "Bob" Cunningham said Meriwether killed Mrs. Martin Ellen Mills, 41, a paralytic for nine years, and injured his father-in-law Charles Mills, 55, and his brother-in-law Paul Mills, 16. Both men suffered head wounds.

Meriwether's wife Ruth, 28, fled to a neighbor's home with their three small children.

Meriwether threw the hatchet into some bushes and was seen running down in front of the house when deputies arrived. Mr. Meriwether said her husband was subject to violent rages.
