

Engineers Revising '308' Project Plan

Footo Cites Loss Of Sites for Dams

PORTLAND — Army Engineers are trying to find new, upstream water storage sites in the Columbia Basin because 50 per cent of the planned storage has been lost in delays and in proposed low dams at Hells Canyon, John Day, and elsewhere.

Brig. Gen. L. H. Footo made this report Monday in an address prepared for delivery at the Nand Empire Waterways Assn. annual meeting.

Footo, North Pacific division engineer, said the engineers were revising the 308 report, made in 1948, as a master plan for Columbia Basin power development, flood control and navigation.

Footo said the main flood control plan provided for some 27 million acre feet of usable storage at various sites. But because of some indicated changes in plans for projects, the total would be reduced to 13½ million and it is necessary to look for other storage sites.

One of the projects, Libby Dam, has been delayed pending negotiations with Canada. Another, Glacier View, was not authorized because of opposition by recreation and wildlife interests.

Services for Reed Tuesday

Funeral services will be held at the Virgil T. Golden chapel Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock for George Richard Reed, late resident of Turner, and a Salem resident as a boy and young man who died at the Stayton hospital Saturday.

Rev. Robert McIlvenna will officiate at the service and interment will be in the City View cemetery.

Reed had been hospitalized since Thursday after he suffered a stroke at the home of his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. M. F. Webb. He had resided with them for the past 17 years.

Born in Seattle, Wash., February 4, 1875, Reed, with his parents, Charles Richard Reed and Anna A. Reed, came to Salem to make his home as a boy and the family resided on North High street. He left Salem in 1902 to go to Portland and was a carpenter and contractor there until his retirement. Reed moved from Portland to Salem following the death of his wife, Nora Edith Reed, in 1938.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Zella N. Webb of Turner; three grandchildren, Bonnie Schuetz of Turner, Beverly Branch of Dallas, Oregon, and Donna of Salem; and seven great grandchildren.

ROSEBURG — Police here are attempting to establish the whereabouts of the owner of a new car impounded in violation of a parking ordinance a week ago.

Through the National Auto Theft Bureau, it has been learned the car isn't stolen, Police Chief Stanley Olson said.

The bureau found that the registered car owner is Claude E. Davis, Pecos, Texas. But Pecos police said Davis has moved from that city.

The keys still were in the ignition when police here moved the car. A check of hospitals and other public agencies failed to turn up Davis.

The car had been parked near a Roseburg hospital for two days before it was impounded, Olson said.

Papers in the vehicle indicated Davis is an oil man.

Ann Woodward Quits Hospital

NEW YORK (UP) — Mrs. Ann Woodward, who accidentally shot her sportsman husband to death last month, left a hospital today.

The blonde former model has been hospitalized since Oct. 20, the day she shot her husband, William Woodward Jr., to death in their Oyster Bay, Long Island, N.Y., home. Mrs. Woodward, mother of two sons, said she mistook her husband for a prowler.

Dr. John M. Prutting, Mrs. Woodward's personal physician, said last night that the attractive socialite had recovered sufficiently from the shock of the tragedy to return to her home.

200 Hunt for 'Ghost Plane'

CARLISLE, Pa. (UP) — Search parties today resumed their hunt for a "ghost plane" believed down in the rugged mountains north of President Eisenhower's Gettysburg farm.

The search by some 200 civil defense workers and volunteers in the desolate mountain terrain was postponed at 2:30 a.m. because of darkness and extreme cold.

A woman plane spotter reported a "large plane" in distress Friday night and said she saw a flash and heard what she thought was a crash.

A summer resort caretaker also reported hearing a plane flying very low and apparently in trouble.

Two sailors passing through the mountains later reported seeing a yellow signal flare.

Mr. and Mrs. John Kelly reported sighting a second yellow flare Sunday night and the search shifted south of Dillsburg, Pa.

Dale Murphy, Cumberland County civil defense director, said the hunt was narrowed to a triangular section covering some 10 miles of treacherous mountain terrain blanketed by about five inches of snow.

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SNOW AND COLD Plague North

EUGENE (UP) — A frozen river and deep snow have stranded a party of Eugene area elk hunters in the remote Salmon river country of central Idaho.

Mrs. Everett Spaulding of Eugene, wife of a well-known McKenzie river guide, said she was informed of the party's situation in a telephone call from an Idaho hunter.

Mrs. Spaulding identified the hunters as Tex Braatz, Miles McKay, and the Matthews brothers, all of Eugene; Idaho guide Ralph Smothers, and her husband who was assisting Smothers.

The group put into the main Salmon river at Sheper, near the east-central Idaho border, Nov. 9, and planned to travel 125 miles downriver by boat into elk country. Horses had been spotted along the overland trail at intervals to help carry out any kill. The hunt was to end at Riggins, near the Oregon-Idaho border.

However, Mrs. Spaulding said the group was to have returned from the Salmon "loop" hunt yesterday, but was prevented by heavy storms that made overland and waterway routes impassable.

Mrs. Spaulding said the rancher told her the hunters were not in any danger, and could be flown out of the remote area by plane when the weather cleared.

BPA Survey Boat Raised

PORTLAND — The Army Engineers' 48-foot survey boat, Bonneville, which sank in the Columbia River between Longview and Cathlamet a week ago, has been raised.

T. W. Ragsdale, chief of the Engineers' operations division, said equipment will be salvaged, but the boat probably will not be repaired. It was badly damaged, its bow crushed, by a collision with a small Japanese freighter.

The two men aboard escaped after the collision. The Bonneville, raised by a derrick boat Saturday, is being taken to Portland by barge.

RECEIVES RESEARCH GRANT

MONMOUTH — Donald G. Humphrey, assistant professor of science at Oregon College of Education, has been notified by the Oregon Academy of Science that he will receive a \$50 research grant made by the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Dr. Humphrey will use the grant in his research on the morphology of the chromosomes of certain Oregon salamanders.



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
