## 2 Key Men Click For Syracuse Five

### St. Louis Hawks Bested 84-80 by Tail-Enders

Brighter days seem ahead for the Syracuse Nationals, defending champions of the National Basketball Association now mired in last place, because key men Adolph Schayes and Paul Seymour are starting to click.

Schayes and Seymour combined for 45 points Saturday in a losing effort but Sunday their efforts started to pay off in an 84-80 victory over the high-flying St. Louis Hawks.

It was only the second loss in five starts for St. Louis, both to the Hawks. And Schayes and Seymour were the men who turned 'em back when Hawks, trailing from the start, twice challenged for the lead. St. Louis moved within one point at 42-41 in the third period, but Schayes sank a three-pointer and set up two quick baskets. The Hawks pulled up to 75-74 with five minutes left.

but Schayes and Seymour sank free throws and Red Rocha added a basket to stem the assault.

Seymour 35, 192, 17 points and Schayes 13 to lead the Nats, although Chuck Share of St. Louis took game honors with 20. It was the first game the Hawks played without scoring ace Frank Selvy, who enters the Army today.

In other Sunday games, the Rochester Royals beat Minneapolis 105-96, and the New York Knicks downed Fort Wayne in overtime, 119-115.

Rookie Maurice Stokes continued his fine play for Rochester with 25 points as the Royals built up a 16-point lead in the third period and breezed. Clyde Lovellette led the Lakers with 21 points.

The Knicks trailed by 10 points after three periods but Jim Baechtold's free throw with 42 seconds left tied the score. In the overtime, Dick McGuire of the Knicks and Max Zaslofsky of the Pistons staged a scoring duel with McGuire's three-point play with 1:14 remaining the clincher. Harry Gollin had 23 points for the Knicks and Larry Foust had 30 for Fort Wayne.

It's UCLA against Michigan State in the Rose Bowl football game.

The two schools, which met two years ago in the Pasadena classic, qualified for the repeat performance in Saturday's grid windups.

The Uclans won their third straight Pacific Coast Conference championship and the Rose Bowl honor with a 17-7 victory over Southern California.

Michigan State, recognized generally as the most powerful team

in the Big Ten, backed into its post-season appearance while going through the motions of a 33-0 conquest of Marquette. The Spartans gained the spot on the strength of Ohio State's 17-0 conquest of Michigan.

Indiana Win Easily

The PCC race was wrapped up in other traditional battles. The bustling Beavers of Oregon State figured in the lone upset of the day, falling before Oregon, 28-0, but still retaining a surprising second place in the circuit.

Other arch-rivalries came out as expected. Stanford clinched third place with an easy win over Cal.

California, 15-0. Washington had an unimpressive win over State, 27-0, and Oregon stann clinched Montana, 24-0, in a non-conference game.

The Jan. 2 rematch at Pasadena should be a corker. The Bruins, their powerful single wing attack pegged on Sam (First Down) Brown, disposed of USC handily despite an opening kickoff scare.

The Spartans of the Big Ten who whipped the Uclans in their last bowl appearance, 28-20, will throw a diversified offense which got better in each succeeding game this fall.

A 37-yard return of the opening kickoff by Jim Arnett, cancelled by a rare offside penalty, shocked the Bruins and 50,878 fans at Los Angeles, but they recovered quickly and ran up a 19-0 lead at half-time.

Bid for All-American

The penalty which recalled Arnett's brilliant run was answered because the entire front line of Trojan receivers was five yards too close to the kicking team.

Brown and Fullback Bob Davernport, bidding for All America honors, each scored for the Bruins and Jim Jackson added a field goal as UCLA finished with only a 7-0 non-conference loss to Maryland marring its slate. Michigan State, uniquely, also was defeated only once and also by a touchdown—14-7 by Michigan in the early fall.

The Oregon State upset resulted from the Beavers' inability to halt Oregon's running attack. The Ducks put together four scoring drives ranging from 51 to 71 yards and made no mistakes on which the opportunistic OSC eleven could capitalize.

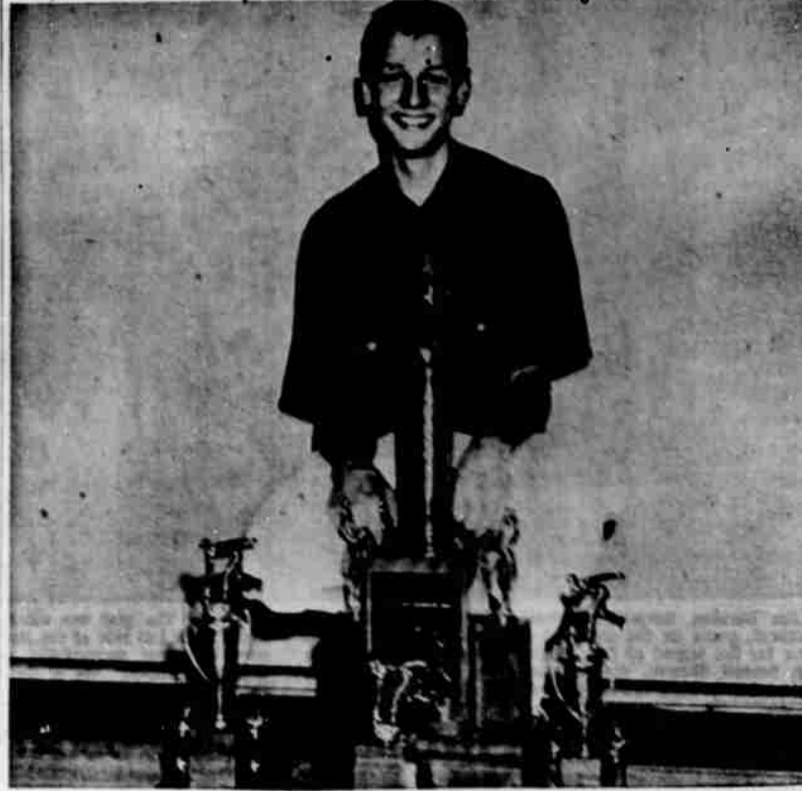
The Stanford triumph over California, its first in six years, was easier than the final score indicated as quarterback John Brodie personally outgained the entire Bear team. He completed 14 of 19 passes for 296 yards and added six more on the ground for a 312 total, compared with Cal's combined output of 207 yards.

Green Incredible Again

Credell (Incredible) Green lived up to his nickname in Washington's rout of WSC. The big fullback gained 250 yards and scored two touchdowns, his yardage total a new national high for the year in a single game.

Leading 1289 in singles and 1241 in the all-events lead, and bowling in the same manner with his nearest competitor, Dick Phipps, the high school student snatched 1286 for the scratch contest of 2001 Phipps, finishing second, broke the old record by 25 pins.

Third was Benn Valde, last week's leader.

New Records Possible

New records were set in every event. The tournament also had the unusual feature of having the scratch champions also winning the handicap title in all departments of competition. Checks will be available at the U-Bowl Saturday afternoon, according to Tony Vittone, proprietor.

In Class A team events, Frank's Products set a record of 2329 scratched to beat the old record of 2285 set by Barclay's last year. Jayson's also beat the old record with a 2872 scratch effort and finished second.

Bob Haugen and Chet Boyce became the first to repeat their 1954 double championship, setting a record of 1309 scratch and 1365 handicap. The old record was 1197 scratch.

In Class B teams, first year for this division Salem Stars and Phipps won with a 2349 handicap score.

Lebold's single score was a lustrous 677 scratch, to give him a 732 handicap score.

ing from UCLA, College of Pacific, and now Oregon Coach Len Casanova's Ducks landed in fourth spot after starting the schedule with a young squad as green as granddad's shamrock. Thus, the Northern division, long the scene of the nose-dipping California teams, placed three teams in the top five this year.

Reasons for the upsetting finale can be classed as follows:

(A) Oregon was keyed-up after being down the week before at Stanford. OSC, "up" last week to beat California, couldn't climb that high this week.

(B) Oregon, devising a special offense just for the Beavers, ripped the right side of the OSC line, gaining at will through leftward or left tackle. The Ducks recognized the back wall traits of John Wittie, OSC's 240-pound left tackle who is a shoo-in for the All-P first team and tried his side only a few times for a few yards.

Shanley Gains 160

(C) Phil McHugh, Oregon junior end, was another reason, not letting the single wing "power stuff" run over him, a fact also true of the other linemen who held OSC to 73 net yards. Oregon, on the other hand, gained 327 net yards.

(D) Jim Shanley, soph from North Bend, toured the mud for 160 yards in 27 carries, while Dick James chugged 114 yards in 23 runs. Quarterback Tom Crabtree, playing the weak spots alertly, kept the Beavers off balance and scored twice himself.

Oregon's Casanova summed it up: "It was by far the best game we played all year. We made no mistakes of any consequence and drove harder than we have all year." Frank's comment: "They outplayed us. It's that simple. James and Shanley beat us on offense and McHugh and Stiner on defense."

Daily checks warranted by OSC fans was little Sam Wesley's run back of a punt, dancing around without blockers for 21 yards in the second quarter. With a key block to could have gone the distance and established more spirit in the Beavers.

10,000 Saw Game

The 10,000 spectators watched the Webfoots get a 5-0 TD in the first quarter, two in the third and one in the fourth. All conversations were up and down the stadium hillside. From the first play of the game a 30-yard gain by Shanley, the crowd was apparent at length by the stadium score of 3-0 after 100 yards come hope that the championship season might change the scene.

Oregon OSC got to the goal line with 20 yards in the fourth period, and in two other occasions reached the 50. The mud seemed to favor the Beavers, to excite the Ducks.

## Husky Coach In Good Again

### Victory Over Cougars Restores Cherberg to Seattle Favor

SEATTLE (AP) — Everything was Green and lovely around the University of Washington campus Monday after Coach Johnny Cherberg's Huskies closed out the football season Saturday with a slightly "Incredible" 27-7 victory over the Cougars of Washington State.

A big fat chunk of the Homecoming Day triumph, played in the slop before a crowd of 30,000, belonged to "Incredible" Credell Green, junior fullback from Richmond, Calif.

He shredded the Cougar defenses for 258 yards and two touchdowns and pulled off a pass interception that paved the way for one of his own tallies.

Washington State dominated the first quarter, twice getting into range for field goal attempts. Both went wide of the mark.

Right after the second miss by Frank Sarno the Huskies took command, scoring twice in the second and twice in the third period. Steve Hoaks got the first one on a plunge and Bobby Herring the second nry - 42-aps play second on a 23-yard pass play from Studly Lederman.

The third stanza was Green all the way. He ran 18 yards for one tally and 50 for the other, helped by excellent blocking.

The Cougars finally got their passing attack working in the last period and drove for the counter that arrested a shutout. Dennis Hart plunged one yard for the tally.

It was Washington's first victory in three starts against the Cougars and gave them a season record of 5-4-1. Washington State won only one game—from Idaho—and lost California and San Jose State.
