

AFBF Urges More Jobs in Rural Areas

WASHINGTON —The American Farm Bureau Federation today suggested more productive capacity on the farm and more jobs elsewhere as means of helping low-income farmers.

Matt Triggs, assistant legislative director, outlined the bureau's stand in testimony prepared for the Senate-House economic subcommittee on low-income families. Existence of depressed rural areas, Triggs said, "is basically a problem of underemployment and low per capita farm production."

He said improved employment opportunities in rural areas would help to ease the situation. He said there is need, too, to help train some farm workers for industrial and other jobs.

The Americans for Democratic Action charged in a letter to subcommittee Chairman Sparkman (D-Ala) that the Eisenhower administration has "heartlessly neglected" the nation's poor.

Edward D. Hollander, ADA's national director, said one of every five or six families in the United States lives "at or below the poverty line." Terming that a "national disgrace," he said:

"The facts of the extent of poverty in America expose the cruel flaws in our prosperity and in the administration's policies under which the well-to-do have grown richer while the poor remain poor or grow poorer."

Film Unit Hits At Censorship

WASHINGTON —The motion picture industry today protested to Congress against prior censorship of its output by state and local agencies.

The Motion Picture Assn. of America volunteered its statement to a judiciary subcommittee on constitutional rights, which has not scheduled testimony on censorship. The statement said "constitutional guaranty of freedom of expression has been seriously eroded" by recent Supreme Court's decisions.

It said a 1932 decision "made the motion picture a member of the press, which the First and 14th amendments protect," but "declined to confer upon films the same immunity from censorship" accorded to other media.

Contending that the restrictions on films might be extended later to other media, the statement said that if this and related decisions stand, they could offer a threat of censorship for newspapers, magazines, radio, television and other media of mass communication and information.

The film spokesmen said censorship now is applied to their product by five states—New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia and Kansas—and 50 to 200 municipalities.

Collision Kills 10 in Nebraska

WATERBURY, Neb. —A head-on collision, believed to have been the worst in Nebraska highway history, snuffed 10 lives last night—those of six teen-agers and four musicians.

Col. C. J. Sanders, head of the Nebraska safety patrol, said he could recall no other accident taking so many lives.

The teen-agers were returning to their farm homes near Ponca. The state safety patrol said a front tire apparently blew out. Their car rammed head on into one carrying the musicians, bound for an engagement at Norfolk, Neb.

The car carrying four members of the Jimmy Palmer orchestra, James E. Martello, about 30, Springfield, Ill.; Jack Renn, about 25, Pittsburgh; Lou Case Jr., about 25, Rock Island, Ill.; and Don Sheffield, about 25, of Vermont, burst into flames after the impact.

The Nebraskaans killed were Rodney Hanks, Gary Stark, Robert Rakow, Perry Book, Richard Bahn and Ronald Nobbe.

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1. Lay trussed turkey, rubbed with fat and seasoned, on two long sheets of aluminum foil, side by side, spacing the two sheets by double folding edges tightly together. Drag foil up, sliding edges together and making to shape of bird. Place wrapped turkey on rack in pan, breast side up in a hot (400 deg. F.) oven, preheated. Allow the following approximate roasting times:

8 to 9 lbs. 1 1/2 hrs. per lb. 10 to 12 lbs. 1 3/4 hrs. per lb. 12 to 14 lbs. 2 hrs. per lb. 14 to 16 lbs. 2 1/4 hrs. per lb. 16 to 18 lbs. 2 3/4 hrs. per lb. 18 to 20 lbs. 3 hrs. per lb.

2. When done the foil will be brown and the turkey will be golden brown. Insert turkey in a hot (400 deg. F.) oven for 15 minutes before serving.

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
