

Home Disaster Barley Nipped In Fuel Error

ROCK FALLS, Md. — Andy Chambers, 24, thought he had bought five gallons of fuel oil for home heating at a gas station. Twenty minutes after he had left the station, the attendant discovered his mistake.

Instead of fuel oil he had sold Chambers high-test gasoline. The attendant notified Fire Chief Russell Maynard and Police Chief Glenn Kime. They asked radio station WSDR in adjacent Sterling to broadcast emergency warnings every 10 minutes.

The station quoted Keime's warning that ignition of the gasoline in a furnace would "cause a terrific explosion."

Then the station appealed for volunteers to make a house-to-house search.

Within 20 minutes, between 60 and 100 turned out, several hundred others within an hour. Throughout this town of 10,000, the volunteers trudged, knocking on doors.

Two of the volunteers, Fred Maynard, a volunteer fireman, and Wayne Farrington finally found the four-room house in which Chambers lives with his wife and three other adults.

Chambers told Maynard that he had poured the fuel into the furnace's tank and "was just going to light it when you knocked on the door."

Road Safety Drive Opens

WASHINGTON — The second annual campaign to promote traffic safety throughout the nation started today.

The campaign, involving a tally of all traffic deaths during the next three weeks, features S-D Day—Safe Driving Day—on Dec. 1.

But Vice President Nixon, urging all citizens to walk and drive safely "365 days of the year," said S-D Day "does not mean that we try to drive safely that day alone."

"It should mean to all of us," he said in a statement yesterday, "that we will not only avoid accidents on that day, but that we will try to avoid them every day."

The success of S-D Day will be measured by comparing traffic fatalities that day as compared to the 81 on the corresponding day in 1954 and for the comparable three weeks last year when 2,144 lost their lives.

Graham Ends Oxford Stay

LONDON, Nov. 21 — Billy Graham turned his attention to television films and sitting for his portrait today after winding up a 10-day revival in the university towns of Oxford and Cambridge.

The American evangelist is making films for Britain's new commercial TV system and having his portrait painted by British artist Frank Salisbury before leaving for the United States Nov. 29.

Graham preached his final sermon in Oxford yesterday to some 1,000 persons packed so densely into St. Aldgate's Anglican church that they could not kneel to pray. His message was relayed to two other churches filled to capacity.

Graham's aides said one of the first to answer his appeal for decisions for Christ "last night was British miller Roger Banister, first man to run the distance in less than four minutes."

Bishops Call for Federal Benefits

WASHINGTON — The nation's Roman Catholic bishops have urged again that private and parochial school students be given a share of government-sponsored benefits "manifestly designed for the health, safety and welfare of American youth."

The bishops said such schools "exist by right" and that "discriminatory" treatment of them is unfair.

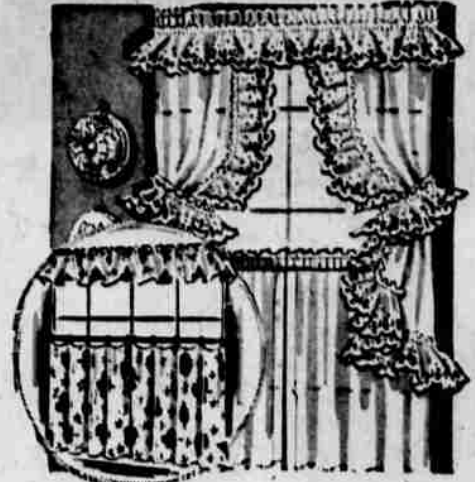

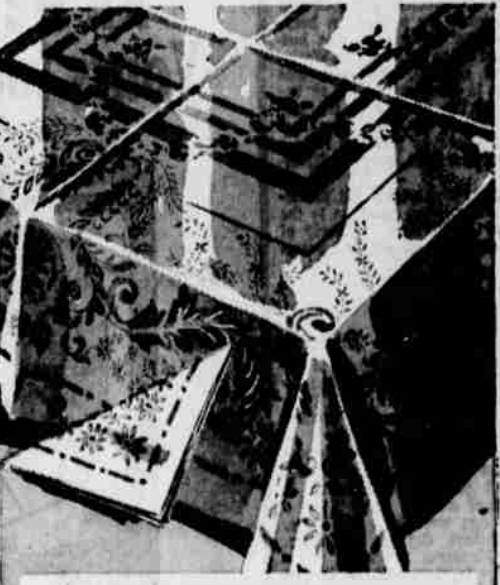
