# Court Refuses Award to Boy In Bus Ruling

The Oregon school bus law protecting only those children who are crossing only after leaving or before boarding a school bus, Oregon Supreme Court ruled Wednesday.

The decision, on appeal from Lane county, denies damages to Gerald M. Becke, a school pupil who was struck in Cottage Grove by a car driven by Norris A. Olson. Gerald, waiting to board a bus, saw his mother on the opposite side of the street. He ran to her, and thus violated the Cottage Grove ordinance against jaywalking.

Olson's car struck the boy in the middle of the block. Olson had violated the state law which requires motorists to stop while school buses are loading or unloading. But Gerald couldn't collect any damages because he had violated the city ordinance.

The decision, by Justice William C. Perry, upheld Circuit Judge William G. East.

The court denied a petition for rehearing in the case in which Dr. Ross H. Elliott, Portland chiropractor, was convicted of attempt to commit manslaughter by abortion.

The court reversed a decision of Circuit Judge P. K. Hammond of Clackamas county in which a judgment was recovered by 29 employees of the Lowe's company for vacation pay claimed to be due for 1952. The court directed that the action be dismissed.

Associate Judge Walter Toole, in the opinion, said that a new contract between the company and the union, effective April 1, 1952, reduced the eligibility requirements for vacation but defined the vacation base year as running from April 1 to March 31.

The court held, that under the plain wording of the rights for the year 1952 were determined and became vested as of March 31, 1952, and thus were governed by the contract which expired on that date.

**SP&S Places Order For 500 New Cars**

J. C. Moore, vice president, Spokane, Portland, and Seattle Railway Company, advises that the railway company has placed an order for 500 door-to-door cars, 500 feet long with 15 foot staggered doors, 50-ton capacity, steel sheathed, wood lined, with nail-on steel floors and rubber draft gear.

These box cars, which are of the latest design, will be built by the Great Northern Railway company in their shops at St. Cloud, Minn., and will cost \$4,600,000.

Delivery is expected the latter part of 1956.

Surviving besides the husband are two sons, James Kinkaid and Charles Kinkaid of Salem; two daughters, Miss Sharon Kinkaid and Miss Joyce Kinkaid, both of Salem; a brother, Paul Rorick of Marysville, Wash.; and a sister, Mrs. Jim Kratzer of Riverside, Conn.

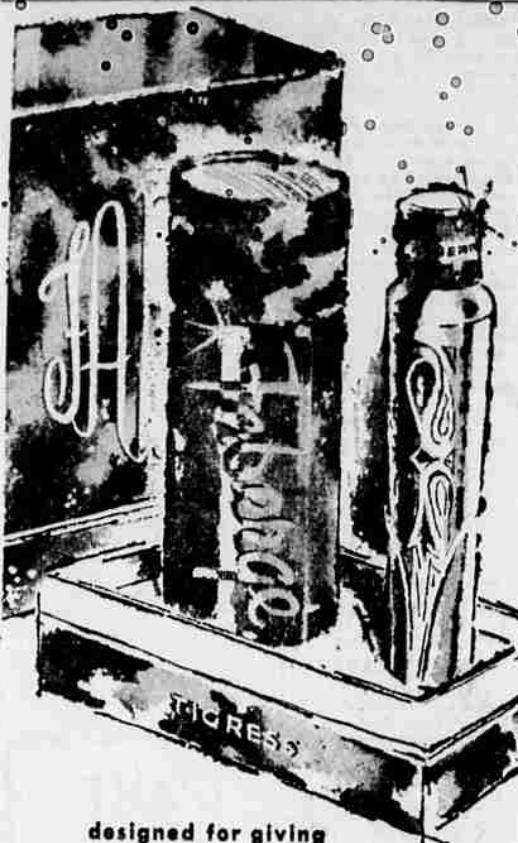

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# Umpqua Will Get Survey

The Umpqua will be the first of the river basins to be studied by the new State Water Resources Board chairman H. E. Maxey, Springfield, announced Wednesday.

The study will include existing water resources, conservation of these resources, pollution, and needs for water for domestic, municipal, irrigation, power, industrial, mining, recreation, irrigation, wildlife and fish life uses.

After the study is completed, the board will adopt a program for use of the basin's waters.

# Bell Wins in Vote Recount

**PORTLAND (UP)**—Results of a ballot recount, announced yesterday, showed that Jess Bell of Portland will retain the presidency of the Oregon State Industrial Union council.

Bell was declared defeated earlier by Francis R. Lenaburg of Willamina. But Council Executive Secretary George Brown said that unintentional errors in transcribing votes by three local unions had thrown the vote off.

The corrected vote gave Bell 1748 votes to Lenaburg's 1065.

The council is an organization of former CIO unions which will be merged with the AFL's Oregon State Federation of Labor in line with the recent labor union merger.

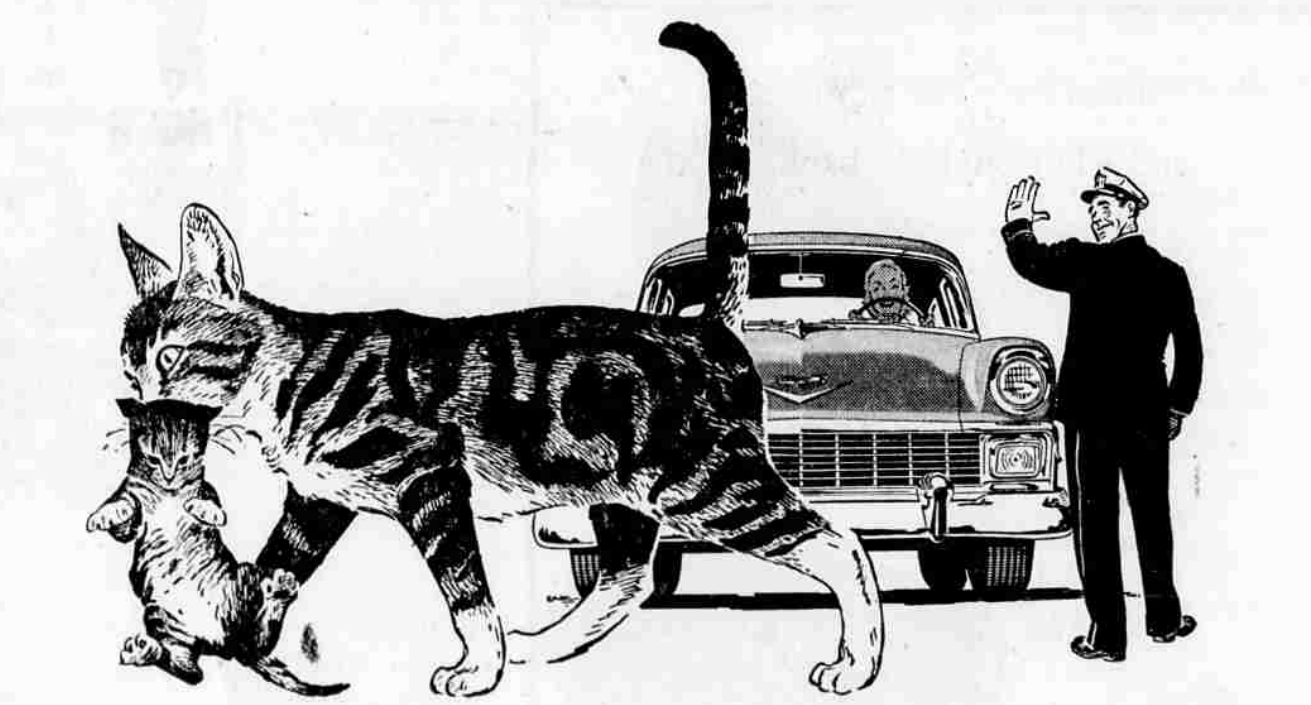
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
