

### Death Decreed For 'Mad Dog' Slayer of Six

PRINCETON, Ind. — The death penalty was recommended last night by a jury which convicted Leslie Irvin, 31, described by the state as a "mad dog killer," for the slaying of one of six persons he is accused of killing.

The Gibson Circuit Court jury of 12 men deliberated 90 minutes before convicting Irvin of murder in the slaying of Wesley W. Kerr, 27, an Evansville, Ind., service station operator, in a robbery Dec. 21, 1954. Sentence was delayed by Judge A. Dale Eby pending filing of appeals by defense attorneys.

Irvin maintained outward calm when the verdict was read. His only gesture was to reach over and pat the hands of his mother, Mrs. Alice Irvin of Evansville, who broke into violent sobbing.

In the packed courtroom was Mrs. Goebel Duncan, survivor of a triple slaying also charged to Irvin. Goebel Duncan, 51; their son, Raymond, 21, and a daughter-in-law, Mrs. Elizabeth Duncan, 19, were shot and killed at the Duncan farm near Henderson, Ky., March 21.

Mrs. Duncan, shot by the assailant, survived but was blinded by a bullet wound in the head.

### Sherry Fong Asks Retrial

PORTLAND — The attorney of Sherry Fong filed a motion Tuesday asking a new trial.

The attorney, Irvin Goodman, asked that the second degree murder verdict against Mrs. Fong for the death of Diane Hank, be set aside.

A 22-page motion filed with Circuit Judge Alfred P. Dobson says Mrs. Fong failed to get a fair and impartial trial. It says evidence was not sufficient for the verdict.

If the motion were granted it would give Mrs. Fong her fourth trial. In the first she was convicted by Judge Dobson set the verdict aside; in the second a mistrial was declared early; and in the third she was convicted on a 10-2 vote of killing 16-year-old Diane Hank, her occasional baby sitter and friend.

### U.P. Trainmen Vote to Strike On January 19

POCATELLO, Idaho — A strike of intermountain railway conductors and brakemen against the Union Pacific Railroad has been scheduled for Jan. 19.

H. W. Corbett, general chairman of the Brotherhood of Railway Conductors here, announced the strike date Tuesday night, only hours after union officials said their membership had voted overwhelming approval of the walkout in a mail ballot.

He said the men voted to strike "because of the fact that the carrier's representatives have declined to recognize payments due under scheduled agreements and because of the vicious discipline under the jurisdiction of the superintendent at Pocatello."

A spokesman for Union Pacific said the railroad would have no comment until it received official notification of the strike action.

It was expected the railroad would then ask for mediation.

Corbett said between 400 and 500 conductors and brakemen would leave their jobs.

He said the strike would affect Union Pacific's central and Northwestern districts, which includes lines running west from Green River, Wyo., to Seattle, Yakima and Spokane, Wash.; Portland, Ore., and Lewiston and Moscow, Idaho.

### Bateson Heads Packers Co-op

### Zero, Lower Cold Prevails In Northeast

The coldest weather of the season held a tight grip over wide areas of the Northeast section of the country Wednesday.

Temperatures were below zero over most of the inland areas and near zero along the coast. Coldest spot was Mt. Washington, N.H., with a low of 26 degrees below, with a drop of one degree from Tuesday's highest reading.

It was zero or below in many cities all day Tuesday, and little relief was expected Wednesday.

In Northern New York, Watertown reported 22 below. It was -19 at Rome, N.Y.; -18 in Massena, N.Y.; -14 at Burlington, Vt., and -13 at Rumford, Maine, and Albany.

The weather in the cold belt was generally clear and marked the second straight night of sub-zero temperatures in the New England region and sections of New York State.

New York City shivered in 7 above and in Boston the mercury edged around the zero mark.

There was some relief from the biting cold in the cold-plagued Midwest. The moderating trend which began over the Plains and into the Great Lakes region. Temperatures were 10 to 15 degrees higher than 24 hours earlier.

There were much more sharper rises in the Northern Rockies as warm winds sent temperatures soaring as much as 48 degrees after hitting sub-zero levels Tuesday morning. It was 46 above at Great Falls, Mont., after a low of 2, and at Cut Bank, Mont., the rise was from -7 to 38 above.

Rain continued along the West Coast with falls generally light. Light drizzle was reported in scattered sections of Oklahoma. Other areas were clear or partly cloudy.

### Aliens Must File Report

SEATTLE — Some 40,000 aliens in the Northwest states and Alaska are required to report their addresses to the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service in January, district immigration director John P. Boyd said Wednesday.

Boyd said registration cards are available at post offices and immigration stations. They should be filled out by the alien, he said and handed to a clerk. The cards may not be mailed.

Boyd said every noncitizen, except persons in diplomatic status and foreign representatives assigned to the United Nations, are required to register. Willful violation of the law may result in fines, imprisonment or deportation, Boyd said.
