On Television Klamath Road Bids Opened

PORTLAND — The state Highway Commission Tuesday received three bids for a grade separation on South Sixth St. in Klamath Falls with each of them running close to a million dollars.

The apparent low offer was by Tom Lillebo of Reedsport at \$899,964. The figures were being analyzed and were to be presented at the afternoon session for possible award.

Next low was Kuckenberg Construction Co., Portland, \$935,490, followed by Rogers Construction Co., Portland, \$942,278.

The project is for an 836-foot steel and concrete grade separation carrying the Klamath Falls-Lakeview Highway over the Southern Pacific Railroad tracks on South Sixth St.

A condemnation suit has been filed to get title to some of the property and speed construction.

The grade separation job, which is to be completed by August, 1957, was the biggest one on which bids were opened Tuesday. Others include:

Baker — Grading and topping 58 mile of the Boulder Gorge section of the Sumpter Valley Highway southwest of Baker, Durbin Bros., Eugene, \$44,160.

Deschutes — Grade and oil 3.65 miles of the Deep Canyon section of the McKenzie Highway seven miles east of Sisters, Allum Bros., Eugene, \$349,502.

Klamath — Grade and pave 7.31 miles of the east unit, Crescent Lake Junction, The Dalles-California junction section of the Willamette Highway, 43 miles east of Oakridge and 10 miles south of Crescent, Warren-Northwest Co., Portland, \$364,241.

Klamath and Lane — Guardrail installations on Willamette and The Dalles-California highways, Trussfab Inc., Portland, \$11,628.

Umatilla — Construct 46-foot undercrossing of the Union Pacific tracks and build 1.15 miles of roadbed on the Hinkle-Bocks corner section of the Hermiston secondary highway near Hermiston, George E. Berry, Beaverton, \$101,450.

He wants me to come out to his camp to be married since he won't be home again for about two months. I want to go, but my people say I should wait until he comes home. I am 24 and have spent most of my life working for my family; now I think it's time I thought of myself.

ANSWER: Are you sure you really love Ralph, or are you grabbing him as a means of getting away from home? Do you regard him as a future husband to love and cherish, or is he just a liberator?

Your acquaintance with him was so short I really think a second look will do no harm. Why not wait the two months until he comes home? If your meeting brings assurance of your love and his, marry and go with him.

DEAR MISS DIX: I met Oliver at a dance not long ago. During the evening I danced with him, as well as with another friend of mine.
