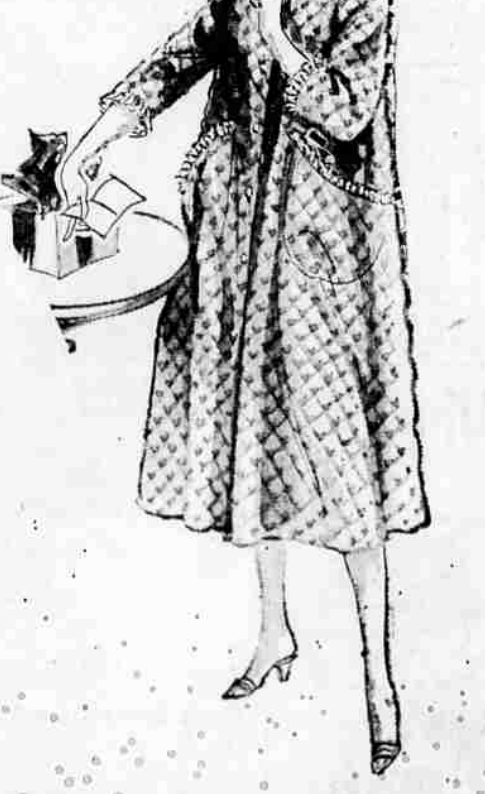

ROAST STUFFED CHICKEN
Ingredients: 4 tablespoons margarine, 1/2 cup finely chopped onion, 1/2 cup finely chopped celery (leaves may be included), 2 cups dry coarse bread crumbs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning, 3 tablespoons boiling water, 1 roasting chicken (about 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 pounds ready-to-cook weight).

Method: Melt margarine in 4-inch skillet or a sauceron, add onion and celery, cook slowly, stirring often for 5 to 10 minutes. Stir in bread crumbs; sprinkle with salt, poultry seasoning and water; toss together well. Use for stuffing body and neck cavity of chicken, packing in lightly. Roast according to favorite method.

Note: To make the dry coarse crumbs: Roll toast rolls and other pieces of leftover bread in a coarse fontaine or a ventilator. In a heavy food chopper, using a strainer, separate coarse bread from fine crumbs. Store fine crumbs for reading purposes; use coarse crumbs for poultry stuffing.
