Cold 'Monkey Tail' Favored Yuletide Beverage in Chile

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP)—It's not the traditional Christmas tree or, more often, a nativity scene.

On Christmas Eve, toys are distributed to children. Even toddlers join adults in drinking monkey tail.

Then everyone drops off to midnight Mass.

For Christmas dinner, the traditional main dish is lobster brought from the Juan Fernandez Islands, 400 miles out in the Pacific Ocean.

The country people have roast duck with apple stuffing of the highly spiced asado al palo, barbecued meat.

A more special feast is curanto, an Araucanian Indian dish prepared from a recipe, probably 1,000 years old. It is cooked in deep pits dug in sand. These pits are lined with scented herbs and leaves, then filled with layers of mutton, beef, pork and every available vegetable. Hot stones are tossed on top of the ingredients and the whole thing is covered tightly.

Whole wheelbarrows of the finished product are wheeled to the guests at long plank tables set up outdoors. No one ever has been known to partake lightly of curanto.
