Drainage

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government be pursued diligently. In the meantime, it is felt that if the county would provide the engineering and legal services for the formation of drainage districts and the establishment of master drainage plans, that the formation of these districts would be greatly expedited.

The drainage situation has been aggravated by the development of suburban areas around Salem, Anderson states. He estimates that this suburban area has a population of approximately 22,000 persons and is increasing rapidly, since there are few building lots left within the city. "If all subdivisions had been carefully planned in advance as to drainage and had a master drainage plan with which to conform, then the problem of flooded homes and yards would not be with us now," Engineer Anderson told the court. "There are numerous evidences where homes and yards have been completely eroded, what slight drainage the fringe areas have had before the development was made. The result, of course, is a flooding condition. Even those subdivisions that have planned proper drainage within their boundaries find this planning to no avail if the drainage ditch downstream has been partially eroded or inadequately tiled."

Former Salem Dentist Dies

Dr. Lloyd Sanders, who formerly practiced dentistry in Salem, died Wednesday noon in Medford of a heart attack. Dr. Sanders practiced here for several years, coming here from Medford, and about seven years ago he returned to that city and resumed his practice there.

He was born in Portland about 56 years ago, and was a graduate of Oregon Dental College. In 1928 he was married to Miss Zenda Hendrickson of Prineville, and they first went to Medford immediately after their marriage. Dr. Sanders is survived by his widow, Zenda; two sons, Philip of Reno, Nev., and Steven, who is in the Navy and stationed in Chicago; also by a sister.

Services will be held at Medford Saturday.

it and anything else considered dangerous should be destroyed. This was done.

O'Keefe said he was robbed of his share by Adolph "Jazz" Maffie. O'Keefe said he turned his "end" over to Maffie to hold for him.

"I got gyped. I never got it. It was the last I ever saw of it," O'Keefe said he continued to "beef" about not getting his "dough."

After that, he said he was shot at twice in Dorchester. One shooting, attributed to Elmer "Trigger" Burke, New York gunman, now facing execution for murder in New York State, is on record. The second shooting is unknown.

O'Keefe said Burke was not in on the Brink's robbery in any way. O'Keefe also stressed "there was no inside connection. We had keys to every lock in the joint. We had a complete layout, and we didn't need an inside man."

O'Keefe was poker-faced as he stepped from the office of Dist. Atty. Garrett H. Byrne and walked into the grand jury room.

He showed no sign of emotion as flash bulbs went off and movie cameras ground.

O'Keefe was the fifth witness of the day. The others were Brink's employees who were in the Brink's office the night of the holdup, January 17, 1950.

None of the previous witnesses presented by Byrne spent more than 20 minutes with the grand jury of 19, including three women.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover yesterday announced "solution" of the case, how the robbery was committed and the 11 men allegedly involved.

Shortly before Hoover's announcement, 6 of the 11 were rounded up by the FBI in Greater Boston. Two others already were in prison on other charges, two are still at large and one died last year of natural causes.

None of the loot was recovered. Within hours of Hoover's announcement, the six newly arrested men were arraigned before a federal commissioner and held in bail totaling \$670,000.

The FBI has been working on the case relentlessly since the men went through six locked doors of the Brinks money-carrying firm on the second floor of a waterfront garage and surprised five guards.

Hoover refused to disclose how the case was broken, saying the evidence must be protected for the trial.

The six men arraigned yesterday were placed in Suffolk County Jail, Boston, pending grand jury action.

The other man already in prison is Stanley A. Gusiora, 38, doing 5 to 20 years in Western State Penitentiary, Pittsburgh, Pa., for a sporting goods store robbery.

Arrested in yesterday's FBI roundup were: Henry Baker, 49, Natick; Adolph Maffie, 44, North Quincy; Joseph F. McGinnis, 52, Boston; Vincent F. Costa, 41, Pembroke, Mass.; Michael V. Geagan, 47, Milton; and Anthony Pino, 48, Boston.

Still at large are Thomas F. Richardson, 48, Weymouth, and James I. Faherty, 44, Boston. Joseph F. Banfield, 45, Boston, the 11th man named by the FBI, died of natural causes last year.

All 11 have criminal records. Grand jury proceedings against the 10 survivors comes just five days short of the sixth anniversary of the fantastic robbery in which the men got not only the biggest cash haul but also more than 1½ million dollars in checks, money orders and securities.

Hoover said the men planned the robbery for a year. Included in the preparations were several "trial runs."
