

# Beavers, Ducks Both Get 11-D Wins

## Top Unbeaten Court Clubs Clash Tonight

### Dayton Flyers Seeking 14th Straight Win; Dons Idle

Dayton, Temple and St. Francis of Brooklyn, three of the four remaining major unbeaten college basketball teams, put their records on the line tonight. But only the Brooklyn school appears to have a fight on its hands.

A victory for Dayton over Xavier of Ohio would put the Flyers at 14-0, an even better mark than that compiled by top-ranked San Francisco. The Dons, who have won all 13 of their games this year and 39 straight since December 1954, will be idle until Jan. 28.

Dayton, the No. 2 team in the latest Associated Press poll, is expected to have little trouble with Xavier which has lost three of its last four games.

Temple, too, is expected to have an easy time of it against Lehigh. The Owls should go through the month without damage because Delaware and Navy, neither highly regarded, follow Lehigh.

St. Francis is a slight favorite over St. John's in the expected close battle between the Brooklyn clubs. The Terriers, also 10-0 for the year, are beset by injuries, however.

In other games tonight, 10th-ranked Louisville, which faces Dayton next Saturday, takes on Eastern Kentucky; State, Kentucky, No. 4, meets Tennessee; Vanderbilt, rated fifth, clashes with Georgia Tech. 11th-ranked Ohio State is at Purdue and Alabama, No. 13, plays LSU.

Only three of the nation's ranking teams saw action last night and each came through handsomely.

Tommy Heinsohn poured in 31 points and set a team record with 37 rebounds to race 12th-rated Holy Cross to an easy 96-78 victory over American International. The triumph was "the Crusaders' 13th in 15 games and their seventh in a row.

Memphis State, No. 15, snuffed Washington University's eight game winning streak by defeating the St. Louis team 73-71. The Arnold Bros., Forest and Orby—hit for 22 and 20 points, respectively, doing most of their damage in the opening half.

Utah edged Oklahoma City 60-58 for the 12th victory against three setbacks for the country's 16th-ranked team.

## Washington Claims 12 Point Advantage Held by Home "5"

NEW YORK (UP)—Fearless Fraley's Facts and Figures:

Any basketball coach will tell you that it's tougher to win on the road than it is at home but a survey by the University of Washington sets the average difference at nearly 12 points a game.

In the past 10 years of Pacific Coast Conference play, the Huskies had a 60-20 record at home and a 32-48 mark on the road. They enjoyed a 9.3 point spread average on their own court and, while traveling, averaged 1.80 points less than their combined home-and-home opposition. That's a difference of 11.68.

A lot of coaches contend that the spread is even greater when you go into such factional field houses as those of North Carolina State, Cincinnati, Pittsburgh, Kansas, Kentucky and Dayton. New York coaches squawk that it's even worse when they play their "home" games in Madison Square Garden.

Get It Both Ways

"The referees who are 'homers' elsewhere lean over backwards in the Garden to prove that they're not," charges one coach. "That means we get it both going and coming."

You can draw your own conclusions, but Yogi Berra has swatted 508 homers for the New York Yankees in 10 years while Bill Dickey, in Hall of Famer, knocked only 202 in 37 years. And, if you like to

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—All of the basketball played in the Pacific Coast Conference last night took place in Washington or Oregon, but the only California team to venture into the area discovered the Northerners can come up with a fair to middlin' game of ball.

The Stanford Indians, sporting the best all-games record in the FCC, strutted up to Corvallis and flashed their 10-1 mark in the eyes of the Oregon State Beavers. The Beavers, with a record of only four wins in 14 games, shrugged their shoulders and plastered the Indians 69-59.

Elsewhere, results came in as expected. The Washington Huskies blocked Washington State 62-42, and Oregon trampled Idaho 84-76. The results made some changes in the standings, but the first three teams held their places. Prior to last night's games the four California teams held the four top spots, but Washington and Oregon moved ahead of the University of California on the strength of their victories.
