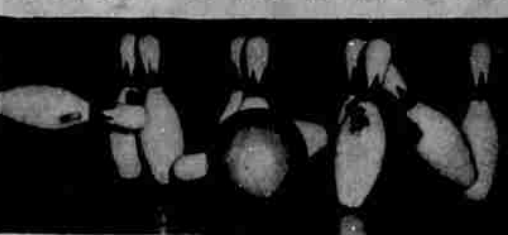


South Salem Gains District Lead; Vikings Win

200 to Get Physical Fitness Tests Here

Program Tuesday Part of Oregon 'Reply to Ike'

The physical fitness program is designed to identify those boys and girls who are below the average in strength, and to provide activities to develop those who are sub-par. Exercises Not Only Answer Gilmore explained that it is known that just exercises are not always the proper answer to improving scores of low "PFI" boys and girls. Other causes may be bad living habits, improper diet, sickness, old injuries, physical defects and emotional disturbances. A follow-up will attempt to locate these causes through personal interviews, and physical education classes will become more effective as a result, Gilmore concluded. Oregon is the first state in the nation to respond to Eisenhower's challenge, it is said. National studies show that 59 per cent of U.S. youngsters tested failed one or more of his tests while only nine per cent of European youngsters failed.

Salem is one of eight test centers set up by the Central Physical Fitness committee of the Oregon Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

There will be 80 boys and 80 girls from Parrish.

Instruments will test the following: 1. Strength of right and left grips on a manometer. 2. Back lift (how many pounds can be lifted with knees straight). 3. Leg lift (how many pounds can be lifted with knees bent and heel around waist). 4. Arm strength, based on a weight, height and number of chin and dips. Flips are from the chin and dips. Flips are from the subject's full weight.

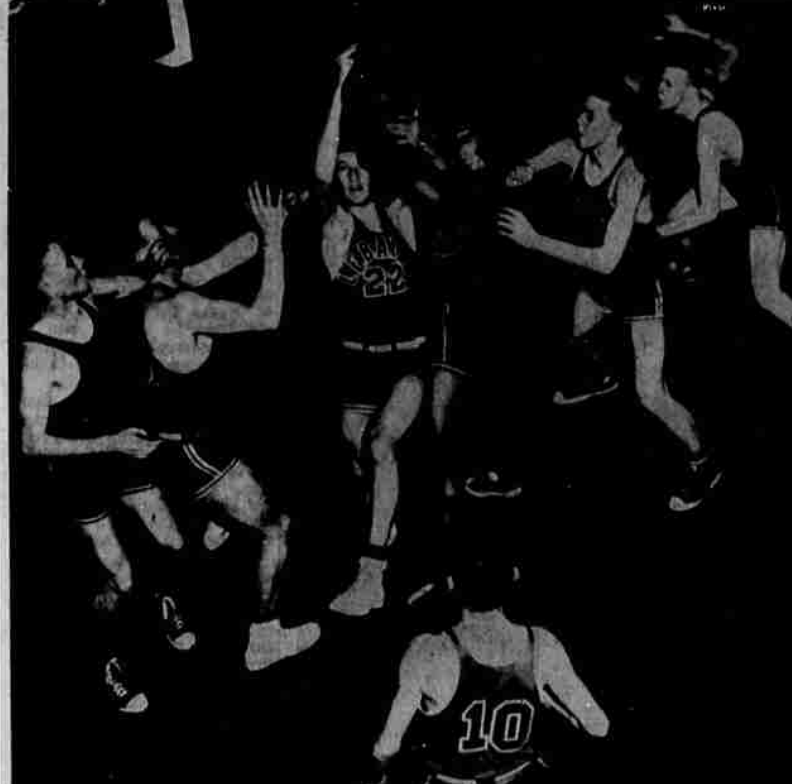
Tag Rematch Billed Tuesday

Salem Club Gains 51-48 Win In Hot Clash

SWEET HOME —(Special)—South Salem had to hold off a tremendous last quarter surge by the Sweet Home Huskies here Friday night to take a 51-48 win and move into first place in district eight play.

The Huskies held a ten point lead with five minutes left in the game, but Howard Ranels and Royce McDaniel led a rally that cut the lead to two points.

Sweet Home took a first quarter lead and managed to hold it until midway through the second quarter. The Huskies led 12-12 at the end of the opening stanza and increased it to 17-14 early in the second period.

Locals Take Lead With 6:50 remaining in the period Ken Allmer added a free throw for the Huskies, followed by two free throws by Jim Allen, two tips by Dan Moore and another foul shot by Allmer. This made the score 24-17 with 4:05 remaining in the period.

With Allmer and Allen doing all the scoring, the Huskies took a 33-18 lead with 1:50 remaining, but the Huskies cut the margin to 34-26 at halftime.

Both teams could score only six points apiece in the third period making the score 40-32 at the start of the final stanza. Daniels hit on another long one-hander and added two free throws, cutting the score to 46-44.

Russell High With 12 Daniels and McDaniels each had 18 points to tie for scoring honors for the night. Russell with 12, Allmer with 11 and Allen and Moore with 10 paced the Huskies.
