human factor is the most important, much more so than good buildings or proper textbooks.

Admitting that the schools are faced with many problems he pointed out that "the effective solution of any problem requires the recognition that the problem exists and a conviction that something needs to be done about it."

Furthermore, he declared, "if the problems are to be solved we must have faith that a solution can be found. We must never take a defeatist attitude."

"Since an effective solution will require some changes, and change always goes in some direction there needs to be a guiding principle of the philosophy of education," he told the teachers.

"These philosophies or goals must be accepted and understood by all parties concerned—the parents and students as well as the professional educators."

"On this basis each teacher and school should put into writing its hopes to accomplish these objectives."

Today's program was opened with a drill staged by a 20-member uniformed girls' drill team from the St. Paul Union high school under the direction of Mrs. Robert May.

This afternoon the educators saw a film on the manufacture of polio vaccine after which they divided into groups for discussion on the several educational levels. Dr. Howard Balderstone of Silverton, is chairman of the elementary group. Miss Lorraine Muesey of Parrish junior high school is chairman of the junior high school group, and Dr. George Martin of Willamette university heads the senior high school group.

Mrs. Agnes Booth, Marion county school superintendent is program chairman.

Whaley, who was just along for the ride, had little pertinent to tell the committee.

Neff, who had told his story last week, was then recalled to the witness chair.

Charles W. Steadman, the committee's counsel, asked him: "Have you at any time since October, 1955, made contributions to the campaign funds of other senators in connection with the Harris-Fulbright (gas) Bill?"

Neff said that if he understood the question to mean the personal campaign funds of any other senator, "the answer is no."

When Neff made this answer, Steadman told George "we have no further witnesses."

The committee had a 35-minute closed session after recessing the hearings.

George announced "no further decisions" had been reached, but that the committee would meet again—perhaps next week—to determine whether more testimony is needed.

"We just haven't got the material we desire," he said at one point, but did not elaborate on this.

Neff had testified Saturday the \$2,500 was from the personal funds of Howard Keck, president of the Superior Oil Co., of Los Angeles.

Neff, before being asked whether he had made contributions to other senators, was questioned as to his motives in trying to check up on Case's stand on the natural gas bill.

He replied: "I do know that they wanted to know the attitude of any senator on the (gas) bill."

"By 'they,'" inquired Steadman, "do you mean the Superior Oil Co.?"

Neff said that he did, and mentioned Elmer Patman, Superior Oil Co., attorney as one specifically interested.

Morse to debate partnership building of Cougar and Green Peter dams; and Morse said he'd be debating Ellsworth all year and would be willing to pick one specific occasion for a joint meeting.

**Plymouth Drive People Agree on Method to Combat Floods**

Residents of the Plymouth drive area, north of the city, will rely on voluntary contributions rather than a tax levy for solution of their flood problem. This was agreed on at a meeting Saturday afternoon attended by about 40 property owners.

Creation of a drainage district to include the entire Keizer area, it was decided, would take too long to afford the needed relief.

Robert Smith, an officer of the Union Title Insurance Co., was elected chairman of the meeting and appointed a committee of six to conduct a two-week drive for contributions. Members of this committee include John Majeski, Lloyd Weeks, Harvey Myskens, Merrill A. Groat, E. A. Haugsted and Smith.

One property owner was said to have offered to donate \$1000 toward the project while several others agreed to contribute \$500.

Preliminary plans prepared by the county engineer's office call for an 18-inch drain tile extending from the flooded area to the Willamette river with laterals serving several low spots where water is reported to have stood most of the winter.

The Marion county court has agreed to contribute "up to \$2000" toward the project in order to protect the county road in the flooded area. The cost of the entire project is estimated at \$12,000.
