VANILLA WAFERS

Ingredients: 1/2 cup butter or margarine, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/4 cup sifted flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt.

Method: Cream butter and sugar in electric mixer; add egg and vanilla; beat thoroughly for several minutes. Blend in flour gradually and salt with spoon. Drop dough by rounded teaspoonfuls, several inches apart to allow for spreading, on lightly buttered baking sheet. Flatten slightly. Bake in hot (400 degrees) oven until edges are lightly browned—about 7 minutes; but watch carefully because cookies brown quickly. Remove at once with spatula to cooling rack. Cookies will be crisp when cold. Store in tightly covered container. Makes about 5 dozen thin delicate crisp cookies.
