The next meeting will bring formal installation and presentation of majority degrees.

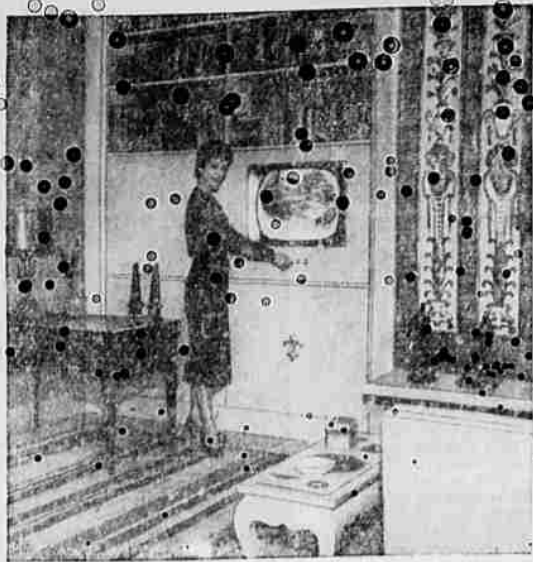

Her husband, Peter, died on the trip west by wagon train and was buried on the prairie. The four children, Mrs. J. T. Ross, Mrs. Gleason of Hubbard, Jackson White and John R. White, grew up and established their homes in this community.

Volna J. White, the son of John R. White, was born February 14, 1896 on the land claim, one of ten children of whom seven are living. The living brothers and sisters are Gasner White, Mount Angel; Merton White of Cannon Beach, Mrs. Louis Briggs (Lulu White) of Seattle, Mrs. R. P. Scheurer, (Janice White) of Eugene, and Mrs. Cal Schlador (Zeta White) of Detroit. Merton White, Mrs. Briggs and Mrs. Schlador were unable to attend the festivities.

Mrs. White was one of a family of eleven, of whom seven are living. Present for the celebration were Mrs. R. Z. Young (Grace Hampton) and her daughter Mrs. Francis Austin, both of San Francisco, California; Mrs. Carl Locke (Pearl Hampton) of Canby; Mrs. Walter Liesman (Neil Hampton) of Portland, and brothers Wayne Hampton and Merrill Hampton of Raymond, Washington.
