# CAB Boosts Ocean Fares

WASHINGTON (UP)—The Civil Aeronautics Board has "reluctantly" granted temporary approval for increased transpacific and North Atlantic first class passenger airline fares.

The board warned airlines are getting into "an unhealthy" economic situation by providing special services for first class passengers without making special charges to finance them.

It said airlines are using tourist fares to finance first class service and told them they should stop the practice.

The board yesterday approved the proposed increases for the period ending Sept. 30. It also served notice that it expects U.S. airlines to revise their international fare structures by then so as to reduce tourist fares across the Atlantic and Pacific.

Earlier this month, the board intended to disapprove the proposed 10 per cent increase in North Atlantic fares and a 3 per cent increase in transpacific fares for first class passengers, with no change in tourist fares.

The board said it granted the temporary approval only because "a number of governments" with airlines operating in international routes have expressed concern at the possible "chaotic conditions" which might result if the board rejected the increase.

## Egg Prices Boosted—Local produce firms listed a hike in egg prices Tuesday morning. In the buying list the quotations were up to 2 cents higher on all grades, bringing AA grade up to 54 cents. In the wholesale list, large eggs generally are up to 55 cents, the mediums up to 51 cents.

## Army Reserve Plan Explained

The armed forces reserve act of 1955 will provide the country with an effective reserve, with minimum interference with essential civilian activity and at a cost the taxpayer can stand, Major Thomas P. Bays told Salem Kiwanians Tuesday.

Three alternatives are available to call by the president and the other subject to call only by congress. They are a secondary or standby reserve.

"Army training has definite value in civil life afterward," Major Bays stressed, stating that figures show the veteran earning an average of about \$500 a year more than the non-veteran of comparable age.

The draft and voluntary enlistment are still available, each followed by a period in the reserve, which will comprise about 2,900,000 men of whom one million are subject to call by the president and the other subject to call only by congress. They are a secondary or standby reserve.

# Scare From Diphtheria on Wane Tuesday

The diphtheria alarm appeared to be nearly over Tuesday in Salem although officials at the Oregon State Blind School are still taking precautions to avoid a general outbreak.

The number visiting the Marion County Health office for Schick tests and immunization fell off sharply Tuesday from the several hundred visiting Monday, Dr. Willard J. Stone, health officer, said.

Students and staff members at the Blind School are still under restriction however, but Supt. Walter R. Dry is hopeful that it will be lifted this week. Staff members and students have not been in public places since the disease was discovered February 13 in the death of Mrs. Violet Fry, housemother.

Dry said the seven-day incubation period is being extended to nine days to be on the safe side, and restrictions will remain in effect until two negative throat cultures have been obtained from every person who showed positive reaction in the tests.

# Molalla Votes School Band Instruments

MOLALLA — Numerous items were taken up at the recent February meeting of Molalla union high school board. The board voted to purchase two woodwind instruments for the band, a bass clarinet and bassoon, with Arthur Roddy, band instructor, present to explain the need for the two instruments.

Warren S. Adams, superintendent, reported that Bloch Electric Co., Silverton, had submitted a low bid estimate for wiring the law house and had completed part of the work. There was considerable discussion on the general condition of the grounds during the past year, and the problem of keeping the equipment in shape.

The teacher-salary committee reported results of their findings, concerning the salary schedule and made suggestions as to its revision. The board arranged for a meeting to discuss the matter for February 29 at 8 p.m.

# Petition for Help on Road Given Court

A petition signed by 71 individuals was received by the Marion county court at its meeting this morning asking for the improvement of an extension of McCain avenue, northeast of the city, and Satter drive.

The county road serves an area in which a new subdivision is to be developed. The petition was referred to the county engineering department for consideration.

Petitions were also received for the improvement of a county road in the Butteville area running southward from the Willamette river and for the installation of additional "stop" signs on county roads in the Marion area.

Richard Harrison of Brooks appeared before the court to ask for relief from flood waters which, he said, have inundated his property. The flood conditions, Harrison claimed, were due to improvement of the county road which shut off the natural drainage.

# Thefts Keep Sheriff Busy

Several reports of week-end thefts and vandalism were under investigation by the Marion County Sheriff's office Monday and Tuesday.

A storage room in the Wheatland Ferry north of Salem was broken into and an electric clock stolen from it, deputies said, as well as two large light bulbs, four informational signs and a 10-inch warning bell from the boat itself. The incident occurred some time Saturday night after the boat was tied up for the night.

About 100 gallons of gasoline was stolen from two trucks of the Lillebo construction company, Reedsport, at the site of a bridge project near Clear Lake, it was reported. The windshield on one of the trucks was smashed by the thieves.

A burglary at the Ernest E. Weiss home, 630 East Vista avenue, netted the thief two fishing poles and reels and miscellaneous articles of clothing among other things, deputies said.

Some guns were taken at the H. G. Brock home, 2690 Bluff street, and a movie projector was thought missing, officers said.

# Senators Hold Up Decision on Records Issue

WASHINGTON (UP)—The Senate Investigations subcommittee withheld action Tuesday on proposals that it try to force top federal officials to reveal some details of the easing of East-West trade curbs.

Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) told his colleagues on the group Monday a contempt of Congress charge "should be voted" if Secretary of Commerce Weeks does not produce some documents asked by the subcommittee.

Chairman McClellan (D-Ark.) hinted that he, too, was thinking of a court test of the right of executive agencies to withhold subpoenaed material. This was in sharp exchange with Philip A. Ray, Commerce Department general counsel.

But after a closed door meeting of the subcommittee Tuesday morning, McClellan said no decision had been made.

# Auto, Compressor Both Damaged in Sunday Collision

A collision of a car and an air compressor resulted in moderate damage to both early Sunday morning, city police reported Monday.

The car, driven by Richard Hale Gibson, 168 North 18th street, collided with a compressor owned by Vlesko and Post construction firm in the alley west of the YMCA building, officers said.

Gibson told officers he didn't see the compressor parked in the dark alley until he hit it.

# 7-Year-Old Uninjured in Bump by Car

A seven-year-old Salem youth was apparently uninjured when bumped by a car at Court and Winter streets Monday morning, city police said.

Larry Steen, 585 South 18th street, was struck by a car driven by Mae E. Wilder, 629 Marino drive, officers said. The youth was apparently more frightened than injured by the accident and ran from the scene, police said.

He was later taken to a doctor by his mother for a check of possible injuries but apparently was unharmed, she told police.

# House Votes Big Boost in Parks Funds

WASHINGTON (UP)—The House Tuesday voted a big boost in funds to build new facilities for an expected record rush of visitors to national parks.

It included in the annual Interior Department appropriation bill for the next fiscal year \$5 million dollars for construction of facilities and improvements in national parks. This is \$9,000,000 more than President Eisenhower originally had requested.

The park funds were part of the overall total of \$115,263,200 voted for the Interior Department and related agencies in a bill passed by voice vote.

The bill's total is \$10,765,000 less than the President requested but is \$79,067,573 more than Congress appropriated for the current year.

To be included in a later bill are the other big Interior Department allotments for its power activities and its reclamation programs.

Large allotments in the bill include \$85,900,000 for the Bureau of Indian Affairs; \$21,697,300 for the Bureau of Mines; \$67,688,000 for the National Park Service; \$17,813,500 for the Fish and Wildlife Service; and \$96,773,000 for the Forest Service.

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
